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WHERE ARE THEY NOW? PARAIC GULLANE,

A Ballinasloe-born doctor is now regarded as a national and international leader in Head and Neck Surgery in Canada and the USA and has delivered keynote presentations to the medical profession in over 83 countries, lecturing on all aspects of Head and Neck Oncology.

Padraic Gullane is the eldest of four children born to the late Michael and Bridget Gullane, Main St., Ballinasloe, in 1945. He received his primary education in the local St. Grellan's NS before attending Garbally College, as a dayboy, for his secondary studies. Padraic helped out in the family business at the weekends and during school holidays with his brothers Eamon, now residing in Galway but formerly the owner of Harry's in Kinnegad; Tomas, the current proprietor of Gullane's Hotel and sister Anna, now a GP in Portlaoise.

Dr. Padraic Gullane received his Medical Degree from Galway University in 1970 and then embarked on a surgical career, obtaining his Fellowship in Otolaryngology-Head and Neck Surgery from the Royal College of Surgeons of Canada in 1975 and the following year was selected as the McLaughlin Fellow

before pursuing advanced training in Head and Neck Oncology with Dr. Sebastian Arena in Pittsburgh and Drs. John Conley and Marquis Converse in New York.

The Ballinasloe man has received numerous honours and awards during his career including the "Harris P. Mosher Award" in 1990 for his


Thesis submission for membership in the Triological Society and was awarded "The Commemorative Medal for the 125th Anniversary of Canadian Confederation" in 1992. In 2004 he received the Millennium Society Award from the American Academy of Otolaryngology; the following year he was presented with a Distinguished Award by the Academy before receiving the "George Davey Howells Prize" from the University of London in 2005. In May of 2006 he travelled to Sydney


to accept the "Royal Australasian College of Surgeons Honorary Fellowship" and a year later came to Ireland where he was presented with the Medtronic Alumni Award from the National University of Ireland, in Galway for his contribution to "Health Care and Medical Science."

In recognition of his distinguished achievements, Dr. Gullane has also honoured with **Honorary** Membership of the Royal College of Surgeons in England in 2010, and the Royal College of Surgeons in Ireland in 2012. He was also elected to Fellowship of the Canadian Academy of Health Services and was appointed as a Member to the Order of Canada by the Governor General of Canada, cited for his inspiration of young surgeons and his contributions to the field of Head and Neck Surgery.

In 2014, to recognise his outstanding contributions, an endowed Chair was

named in his honour at the University Health Network/University of Toronto and in February last was appointed as a Member to the Order of Ontario by the Lieutenant Governor of Ontario for his achievements. He has also facilitated the establishment of four University Hospital Chairs (Head and Neck Surgery, Reconstruction, Radiation Oncology and Basic science) from private funding donations in excess of \$14.5 million.





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Dr. Pat, as he is affectionately known by his peers, has published 337 papers in peer-reviewed journals and 92 chapters in textbooks as well as 10 books on various aspects of Head and Neck Surgery. He is currently a member on the Editorial Board of ten journals and has served as president of the American Head and Neck Society, the North American Skull Base Society as well as the Canadian Society of Otolaryngology. He has been invited as a visiting professor to over 83 countries, delivering more than 830 keynote presentations on all aspects of Head and Neck Surgery.

Padraic Gullane has lived in Toronto for the past forty years and still resides there with his wife, Dr. Barbara Cruickshank. He has two children Kira, who recently graduated from Limerick University with a post grad in medicine and John. The world-renowned medical specialist still keeps in touch with his siblings and his home town. "I love getting back to Ballinasloe, whenever I can. I have so many friends there and memories of growing up in Main St., the Old Log Cabin and playing by the River Suck" he said.

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MAURA HOPKINS RUNS FOR FINE GAEL

A 31-year-old Occupational Therapist from Ballaghadereen in Co. Roscommon is the Fine Gael candidate in the General Election for the Roscommon/Galway constituency. On a directive from HQ for a one candidate strategy, Sen. Michael Mullins withdrew in favour of Cllr. Maura Hopkins who was then unanimously selected to contest the new three-seater.

The only daughter of Michael and Kitty Hopkins, Maura has taken a career break to campaign vigorously in the new constituency, which sees Ballinasloe town in particular, moved away from the traditional Galway East stamping ground. Maura's first venture into politics was last year when she was elected to Roscommon Co. Council, having won a seat on the Boyle Municipal District Council in the local elections. Then she was the Fine Gael flag-bearer in the Roscommon-South Leitrim by-election following the departure of Luke "Ming" Flanagan to Europe. Here she achieved over 5,500 first preference votes-finishing a creditable third out of ten candidates.

A regular visitor to many parts of East Galway through her involvement with Macra na Feirme where she attended agricultural shows and ploughing matches, Maura said "I come from a farming background, I drive a tractor and I have a green cert. I am well aware of the problems small farmers on Suckside are experiencing and am very concerned with the increasing number of rural burglaries which are terrifying the elderly and those living alone. I only hope the new initiatives announced by Minister Fitzgerald will help to allay the fears of many people in the fight against organised gang robberies."

For the past nine years, Maura Hopkins has been working with stroke patients in St. James' Hospital, Dublin as an occupational therapist. "I welcome

the new stroke machine at Portiuncula Hospital but not enough is being done for those affected, after hospitalisation. I have always been an advocate of stroke care but I have witnessed the lack of proper rehabilitation services for these people afterwards. I will fight for better after-care and I also want a stroke machine in every hospital in the country" she added.

Maura has the backing of Dr. John Barton, who is playing a major role in her campaign, with both pledging to maintain the services at Portiuncula Hospital which they say are paramount to the people of East Galway and Roscommon. "I know mothers from my home town and different areas of Roscommon who have had their babies born in Portiuncula. It has a magnificent tradition and we now want to ensure the vacant consultant and nursing posts there are filled without delay. Travelling to UCHG in Galway is not practical for many people in this region, that's why Portiuncula and Roscommon Hospitals are so important. I also want the Mental Health services to be properly resourced throughout the region" she said.

Welcoming the upgrading of the new water and sewerage scheme in Ballinasloe, Maura says the inconvenience caused for many during the works will be well worth it in the long run. "Thanks to the Government initiative through Irish Water, it means we will now have clean, healthy water to drink. During my by-election campaign there were over 22,000 people in my constituency on a 'boil water notice' which was totally unacceptable in this day and age. Thankfully that has been largely rectified with only a small number now affected" she added.

Fully aware of the huge job losses in Ballinasloe town over the years, which affected most of the areas in her constituency including Ahascragh, Ballygar, Creggs, Caltra, Castleblakeney, Glenamaddy, Clontuskert, Moore and Lawrencetown, Cllr. Maura complimented the BACD on their initiative in creating over 170 jobs at the centre in

Creagh, through small enterprises as well as the varied businesses in the Poolboy Industrial Estate. "The recent publication of their Town Action Plan is a positive way of communicating with the wider public and could help smaller towns to progress. I have been encouraged with the number of new shops that have opened in the region and I would appeal to everyone to Shop Local for Christmas and the coming

year. The quality of life in this area is very good and while it is only natural for our young to travel, we welcome their return and hope they put their skills to the best use for the local community. We are now crying out for nurses, construction workers and people in the hospitality sector and tourism-surely a positive indication we are on the way back" she explained.

Maura, who is also a speech and drama teacher, says

it is very important for this new constituency

to have a full-time Government TD and if

elected she will open a constituency office in Ballinasloe town. "Though I have only been on the campaign trail for a few weeks, I am impressed with the people I have met and the support I have received. With the help of Sen. Michael Mullins, Co. Cllrs. Michael Finnerty, Aidan Donohue and Peter Keaveney I have had meetings with groups in Newbridge, Caltra, Glenamaddy and Clontuskert and listened to their concerns. I am a positive and hardworking public representative who would love to be elected as Fine Gael TD for this constituency when the General **Election comes around. Despite being** a Roscommon woman, I would also pledge my allegiance to the electorate west of the River Suck in Dail Eireann" said the aspiring Maura.

Concluding she added "As a young woman passionate about the region, I believe the next five years offer huge potential for our rural communities. The economy is moving in the right direction. With more people back at work, we will have extra resources for essential public services like Gardai and healthcare, to invest in creating more employment in the West and support our rural towns and villages."

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WESTERN AUTOMATION RECRUITING STAFF

Pat Ward, an East Galway native, explains both his achievements and downfalls through the journey of setting up his own business, Western Automation Research & Development and his plan to further develop his success.

Pat was raised in Galway and moved to England in 1963 at the age of 16. He worked as a labourer in a steelworks factory for two years. He then joined the Royal Navy with a dream of becoming an electronics engineer. "I managed to convince my superiors that I could make the grade as an electronics engineer, and they sent me to the Royal Navy Electronical College in Hampshire", he mentioned. Pat duly qualified and stayed in the Royal Navy for eleven years.

In December 1976, Pat left the navy and worked with Thorn EMI for three years. "I was very unhappy in my work there, but in 1979 I saw an advertisement in a UK trade magazine for electronic engineers", he stated. The advert was placed by a Square D Company, based in Ballinasloe. Pat was successful in applying to Square D and he joined the company in October 1979, initially as an industrial automation engineer. The automation project was completed in two years, and he was then moved to research development and product development. Pat became familiar with a new technology at Square D for Residual Current Devices (RCDs), which is a technology used to remove electrical power from a circuit or load

when a dangerous electrical current is detected flowing through equipment or a person's body. Essentially, RDC technology provides protection against electric shock.

Pat enjoyed work at Square D, but unfortunately the American owners decided to shut down the R&D operations at Ballinasloe in 1984. "I missed the challenge and joy of product development, and over the next six months I pondered my future, and finally came to the conclusion that I had to move on from Square D. I was offered several jobs, but they would have required me to move home again", added Pat. In late 1984, he decided to start his own business as an independent provider of RCD technology to switchgear companies in the UK.

In January 1985, Pat started work in his own company, Western Automation Research & Development Ltd in Ballinasloe. The name of the company comes from his surname; Ward and from the fact that he was based in the West of Ireland, he had worked in automation research and development. "I was lucky my name wasn't Shaughnessy", added Pat.

For the first 10 years, Western Automation struggled to survive and on several occasions, came close to shutting down completely. From 1991 to 1994, Pat studied for and was awarded a Diploma in Professional Management by the Open University, and a Master's Degree in Management Practise by Trinity College Dublin. In 1995, the tide started to turn for Western Automation and they have made great progress since then.



The company celebrated their 30th anniversary earlier this year, with good cause. Western Automation is now recognised as a world leader in RCD technology, with customers in ten countries worldwide. They currently employ 35 people in Ireland, Spain and the USA.

Today the company is mainly involved in product design and development with a relatively large number of engineers.

Currently, their biggest problem is recruiting skilled people. "We have engineers from Ireland, Spain, Poland, Romania, Ukraine and the UK, who all do wonderful jobs for WA, but we really would like to see more Irish engineers apply to work here" stated Pat. "We are virtually unknown in Ireland, and in fact we are hardly known in Ballinasloe." The company currently have vacancies for electronic engineers, mechanical design engineers, quality technicians and engineers, Supply Chain Management, R&D management and more.

In 2015, Joseph Hession set up his own business, Hession Electrical Services in New Inn. The business specialises in the repair of all starter motors and alternators, which includes agricultural, automotive, marine, commercial, quads and lawnmowers. Along with this

service, Hession Electrical Services also supply new and reconditioned units.

Joseph originally started his business because he received numerous enquiries about the repair of starters and alternators. "I took it upon myself to research this line of work, only to find that there was no one providing this service in the local area. I felt that it was a genuine opportunity for me to open a business", he expressed.

Joseph grew up on Station Road, Ballinasloe and attended St Michaels Vocational School, where he completed his Leaving Cert in 1995. His achievements include a four year FÁS qualification in construction plant fitter, as well as receiving a certificate as a mechanical technician and an auto electrician.

Joseph started working in Domac Plant and Tool hire in Ballinasloe, where he served an apprenticeship as a Construction Plant Fitter and qualified in 2001. He gained 17 years of experience in repair of a wide variety of construction equipment.

"I always had a keen interest in the electromechanical side of my work and is a sector which I have good knowledge of, with the relevant electrical and mechanical qualifications", he added. Joseph, now married, has been living in New Inn, Ballinasloe for the past 13 years. Along with running his own business, he is also employed locally in a second job, as a light commercial vehicle tester in Peter Donohue's Ltd.

Since Joseph started his business in March, the feedback has been very positive from the customers. "Due to the fact that I work a full time job as a light commercial vehicle tester, Hession Electrical Services strives to keep down time, be it agricultural, automotive or commercial to a minimum", mentioned Joseph.

Josephs plan for the future is to grow his business and eventually give it his full attention because at the moment, he works full time.

Maureen Cahalan hails from Loughisle in the parish of Killimor. She remembers happy eventful and childhood with her two younger brothers Francis & Gerard. She was the first born in the household in 73 years and attended Raheen N.S., continuing to the Mercy Secondary School in Callan, then went on to a secretarial

school in Loughrea, and recently she enjoyed life in University College Maynooth as a mature student.

She gained her wings in retail at Curley Bros Kiltormer. On her late Mother's urgings she applied for a Jewellers retail and secretarial position on a traineeship basis.

After being made permanent she studied Jewellery making, design, and finishing through the National Association of Goldsmiths in the UK. Maureen's ambition and drive brought out her creative side and combined with her retail and organisational skills, she found her career niche.

In 1975, Maureen purchased her business from retiring jewellers where she has spent the past four decades and she continued studying every other year of her business life. She is a Member of the National Association of Goldsmiths of Ireland & UK (NAG), a member of Registered Jewellers of Ireland (RJI), studied valuations and became a Registered Valuer.

Maureen was the first lady to be appointed RJI President of Ireland and during her 30 months in office, she brought two national conferences to Ballinasloe and a major golf tournament.

Looking back at stand out memories - The John Paul II's visit to Ireland in 1979 was magical and electrifying for Ballinasloe, "Most of the Youth were camped in the Fair Green the night before and we had to engrave every possible medal, disc and piece of Jewellery for them with the date and their initials. It was such an exciting day, we were open until 10.30pm that night supplying and engraving" before over 300,000 young people got to the track in Ballybrit to see the Polish Pontiff.

Whilst the country suffered a deep recession in the 80's, Ballinasloe was used to almost full employment, factories setting up, schools, and two hospitals with training colleges. "You would not get a bed such was the demands from the commercial and medical sectors. Ballinasloe doing very well and we all appreciated this wonderful bonus which we had never experienced before" commented Maureen.

For Maureen, the 80's was a mixture of many things apart from business, her daughter was born in 1983, her Dad passed away in 1984 and her mother later that same year. Suffering from bereavement is a major shock and Maureen will testify in losing both her parents whom she adored and learned a lot from, left a huge distance in her life.

However, the arrival of her daughter Maire kept her happy and busy. Her son Andrew was born in 1985, so the 80's for Maureen were busy and memorable in the circle of life.

It was easy to cope as she had her best friend and wonderful late husband Andy by her side to support in every aspect of their lives. Andy also trained in the jewellery business and was very successful in jewellery repair and manufacturing. They won the contract for the Eurovision Contest the year of Celine Dion's win, followed by winning the design and manufacture of the Awards for the College of Art and Design in Dublin. Cahalan Jewellers enjoyed business on a very private basis with Government Agencies and RTE.

The current downturn and the "Experts" who encouraged large retail stores outside the town, which has hollowed out the town along with the abolishment of the UDC, leaving all decisions now coming from Galway City, through the County Council; worries Maureen.

"The fact we are treated as a border town with no one officially or specifically interested in the progress and good of the town centre, is very worrying and disturbing. Our town however has made good progress in the very

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recent past with shops beginning to fill up again with new business, and hopefully this will continue but it will need all our collective support. There are a cohort who continually and constantly push the town for all the right reasons, We have many benefits to our town but at times we find it difficult to hit the right note when we are promoting and telling people what we have to offer."

Maureen set up Community Hearts in 2001 as a result of the kindness she received from her neighbours, customers and friends after the sudden death of her beloved husband Andy. Through Community Hearts, Maureen organises events and activities which support Ballinasloe's local charities. In better times she was able to help fund the major charities but now she concentrates on supporting those nearer to home.

Maureen believes online shopping has a mixed effect on core retail activity in the town. Her research in this area, shows that couriers seem to deliver in one week and collect 95% of the parcels for return in the following weeks.

"Ballinasloe Owner Retailers will usually put items aside for their customers who can pay off by week or by month and this is something they cannot do online. Our town's Retailers have supported this business model for years, our customers appreciate flexibility and show this through their loyalty", says Maureen.

Specialist shops like Cahalan Jewellers will always thrive by creating and embracing trends and being prepared to keep up with the times, according to this seasoned Jeweller.

"We built a private engagement ring room and went into partnership with an Antwerp Diamond Company, which allows us to sell diamonds at better prices than nationally. We also offer personalised service from our established network partnership customer repairs - be it watches, rings, bracelets or necklaces. We repair any jewellery new or antique. We also carry a large range of antique jewellery, silverware and china. One of our specialities is sourcing any item our customers' requests, at very competitive prices. We uniquely design a range of jewellery pieces and special gifts with our in-house express engraving service."

I also try to help others in our community and be nice to people because this is important to me. Ballinasloe and its surrounding communities are welcoming and friendly, by building on this gifted tradition of looking out for each other and harvesting positive relationships, we can, as a people overcome any obstacle", concludes Maureen.

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M6 MOTORS-HEADING FOR FIFTH ANNIVERSARY

M6 Motors is a car dealership based in Ballinasloe. The company deals up to 30 quality, used vehicles in many different makes and models - from Audi and BMW to Toyota, Kia and more.

Local man, Alan Naughton started the company in 2011 after completing a Bachelors Degree of Business Studies at the University of Limerick. Although the company was set up during the worst years the motor industry has seen to date, it has grown to be one of the household names for second hand cars in the west of Ireland.

"What started as a two man team has now grown to employ six people in Ballinasloe, with a combined 40 years' experience in the motor industry including two qualified mechanics", added Alan.

M6 Motors has come a long way since opening an office in Croffy's Court on Main Street, with only a handful of vehicles. After the first year, the company started to grow very quickly, which resulted in M6 Motors moving to a larger premises at Dolans Service Station in Creagh.

HOSPITAL WATCH

Cleaning staff at Portiuncula Hospital embarked on industrial action, in a dispute over the hiring of private contractors.

The staff, who are members of the Services Industrial Professional and Technical Union (SIPTU), say hospital management is in clear breach of established agreements and is showing a total disregard for their objections.

The union recently staged a two-hour work stoppage in protest at the decision to extend a contract cleaning arrangement to the hospital's emergency department.

While there is a mix of staff and contract cleaners at the hospital, SIPTU says its members have always been rostered to cover clinical areas.

"This shows total disregard by management of its obligations under the Lansdowne Road Agreement and has happened without any engagement or agreement. The hospital had sanction to fill three vacancies directly. This approval was secured in December 2014 but the posts were never filled", Pat Flannery, Regional SIPTU Industrial Organiser.

The union says it served three weeks' notice of its intention to stage a work stoppage and that it will escalate its action if necessary.

The Saolta Hospital Group, which oversees the management of Portiuncula, says every effort will be made to minimise disruption to patient services.

Following the two-hour work stoppage protest, "We have confirmed a meeting with the Workplace Relations Commission on December 4th, in the hope of coming to an agreement with hospital management, as they are in clear breach of established agreements for hiring of private contractors", stated Pat Flannery.

Nurses working in Emergency Departments around the country are to be balloted on industrial action, the Irish Nurses and Midwives Organisation (INMO) has confirmed.

The move is in response to the "persistent and deepening levels of overcrowding" in Emergency Departments nationwide, which has led to "significant risks" for patients and staff, the INMO insisted.

It pointed out that overcrowding is continuing, with last month recording the highest number of patients on trolleys to date.

According to the Trolley Watch figures, 7,971 patients were left waiting on trolleys for a hospital bed during October, with the worst effected hospitals being Beaumont in Dublin (803) and University Hospital Limerick (763). Portiuncula Hospital hosted 101 patients on trolleys in the past month.

The number of patients waiting on trolleys last month nationally was 14% higher than the same period in 2014 and 53% higher than the same period in 2013 but Portciuncula saw a decrease!

This figure of almost 80,000 patients on trolleys between January and October is 26% higher than the same period in 2014 and 36% higher than the same period in 2013.

"Our members have had enough and we believe patients have had more than enough. The latest figures confirm the measures taken to date have not, are not and will not, alleviate the problem, leaving patients and staff continually exposed to totally unacceptable care and working environments," commented INMO general secretary, Liam Doran.

Responding to the news, the Minister for Health, Leo Varadkar, said that he was "disappointed" with the decision to ballot nurses. "Industrial action won't get a single patient off a trolley. We have a plan to address ED overcrowding which is currently being implemented and which is supported by the INMO. I ask that all efforts be focused on working together to implement the plan," he said.




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DAVID COYNE – LOCK KEEPER



Ballinasloe's Lock Keeper, David Coyne has been in charge since May 18th 2001, when the lock officially opened. He speaks passionately about his job at the lock and how he runs a tight ship with health and safety being the main priority, "I love my job, and there is no such thing as hard work." He also expresses his worries for the future of the lock, due to plans to automise the facility.

David returned home from England in 1979. He bought a site very near to the lock, where he built a house with his wife. David began work with Waterways Ireland, initially as a general operator both at the lock and the marina. When the interview for a job opportunity as Lock Keeper arose, David took the interview and thankfully, was rewarded the job. Due to living so close to the Lock, David is on hand at all times for emergency situations.

The lock was originally built because of the island that lies across from it. It boasts an eight foot drop from one side to the other,

therefore a lock was put in place to cater the drop. Prior to the lock being built, the land held an old mill. The current wall entrance to the lock consists of stone from the old mill, as there was no stone wastage throughout the building process.

It is one of the newest and best maintained locks within Waterways Ireland, "It is absolutely spotless. There's a lot of work done, such as power washing to keep the lock at its pristine standard", mentioned David. It is very much an advanced lock for the simple reason that there are four ladders available to help any boaters, who have fallen overboard.

During the winter months, David works a short day from 9am to 12.30pm, as the volume of boats is down due to the short days and dull weather. The hours are then made up during the long bright summer days when he works from 9am to 8.30pm.

"Every morning I come in, I have six different charts to fill out – from water levels on both sides, to rainfall for the MET office. All of that is going to be missing", added David. He has a special unit in his office looking out over the lock, which allows him to open and close the sluices and gates and let water levels up and down.

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"As many of us know, work has begun to operate the Lock automatically", added David. Although two sluices have been removed, along with property cut out to fit electrical panels, it will take a long time to fully develop the automatic functions, therefore an official open date has yet to be confirmed. "I don't think they understand the size of the lock in question. The lock is 96ft in length, 28ft wide and 20ft deep, where I can fit six 30ft boats at one time", he stated. It is completely different to a canal, where boats travel through a stream one by one, which is much more manageable.

The automatic system would require boaters to travel through the lock manually, by getting off their boats to use a card and a machine to open the gates. "I don't think people are going to come up if they know the lock is automatic, because it entails a lot of work for them and people don't like having to get off their boats, especially when you have elderly people", mentioned David. "They like me being there to turn on the lights, open the gates, give them the ropes, tie them up and help them up out of the boats and send them on their way into Ballinasloe."

"I've had people falling into the lock and have had to try get them out. Two incidents occurred slightly down the lock, where someone fell getting off their boat. Another person miss-judged the water level and jumped off the boat, landing face first into the rocks and an ambulance had to be called", added David. "Simple little things like that shows a machine can't replace the work a lock keeper does."


David puts a huge emphasis on health and safety within the Lock. "The most important aspect is that boaters get through the lock in a safe manner", he stated. David takes note of all complaints coming through the lock and over the past few years, has noticed a frequently recurring complaint from boaters coming down from the Marina, about the anti-social behaviour it beholds. "I think it has affected the boat trade, as a lot of people are afraid to leave their boats for fear of damage", mentioned David.

"Anybody who comes through, even the fishermen, are told no drinking on the premises", added David, as he is afraid with the new automatic machines there will be no-one to control the anti-social behaviour at the lock, "they come in over the closed gates, in particular on Friday or Saturday nights." David ensures that everyone who comes to the lock signs an indemnity form, which essentially covers the lock of any damage or accidents.

Flooding has proven to be a huge problem at the lock. From November 9th to the 16th 2009, the lock saw 155mm of rainfall, which would put 18ft of water into any river. "I had the sluices fully open at the time, which was relieving the water from the town. The town was very badly flooded, the worst I've ever seen", he said. "That is where you need somebody at the lock for the likings of letting off water in emergency conditions to bring it back to a safe environment."

Due to the Bord na Mona water bridge being 7ft and 2Inch lower than the motor way bridge at the lock, they are governed with the amount of boats which can get through. David is constantly getting calls from the higher companies, asking what the air draft of the burning water bridge is because if the water goes too high, they can't get under the bridge, which is a huge deterrent.

"I have had 27,600 boats traverse through the lock and on average nearly 60,000 people, who are all visiting and spending money in Ballinasloe", stated David, who has noticed a slight drop in boating in recent years. "I've gotten to know nearly all of the private boats that have come through the lock. They love coming to the town and they love the traditional music available here." David has been assured he will not be out of work, as he will be given an alternative job elsewhere, possibly Portumna, but it won't be as a lock keeper. "I don't know what will happen to this place when I'm gone", he wonders.



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POETRY BOOK LAUNCH IN HONOUR OF KILCONNELL'S SEAN O'BRIEN BY CIARA BERESFORD

After the recent and sudden passing of Mr Sean O'Brien, locals decided to pay tribute to the popular man by putting together a book celebrating his life and his poetry.

Sean was born in 1941 to Thomas and Mellie, in the townland of Ellagh, Kilconnell. Being an only child, Sean left school to work on the farm as finding secondary education was not for him. He was a highly intelligent man, who used his quick wit and calm manner to help enhance the lives of others.

Having never married, Sean set about making Kilconnell community his family. Over the years he was involved with many groups and schemes including FACT week, Tidy Towns, Lough Acalla Development, Hall committee, the school board, the singing circle, Marca and Kilconnell Development Company, to name but a few.

In the past few years, he was involved with the setting up of Kilconnell Community Park in the village. In the early 1960's, Sean became involved with St Gabriel's GAA Club and was elected as secretary. When Sean was the chairman in 1970, it was decided the club needed to raise money to buy the land known as the Cow Plot, the Land Commission giving the club five years to pay for it. Sean, being an innovative man, suggested a Carnival, which became the first of many. In all, Sean was involved with St Gabriel's GAA for over 40 years.

"While Sean was alive many of us were aware he was fond of poetry and had become the subject of his witty verses! He wrote about topical issues of the day such as NAMA, Ming Flanagan, The Gathering and farm life", mentioned Liza Taylor, assistant PRO of Kilconnell Community Development Company.

After his passing, much more of his writing was discovered – mostly written on scraps of foolscap paper, the backs of bingo books and old copy books. So we decided to share the amusing rhetoric of "Sean Sure."

"Being important to many different people for many different reasons, we asked Sean's friends and neighbours to contribute to the book. Martin Gormally, Eugene Hession, Brendan Hogan and myself consolidated all the information and photographs for Kilconnell Print & Design to transform into a book", added Liza. The book contains some of Sean's poems, memories and tales from people who knew him, along with a beautiful pencil portrait of Sean by Michelle Callanan.

The Sacred Heart Funeral Home, Kilconnell and Kilconnell Hall Committee sponsored the book, which means all profits made are donated to the Heart Foundation - a charity Sean supported during his lifetime.

Recently, a launch event was held after Sean's month's mind mass in Kilconnell Hall, where many were invited to obtain a copy of the book for themselves. Among the hundreds of attendees was past TD, long-time friend and contributor to the book, Joe Callanan; Sen Michael Mullins and Cllr Tim Broderick. A cousin of Sean's, Pádraig O'Ceithearnaigh made a heartfelt speech before receiving a book along with Fr Hugh Briody, who kindly blessed the book.

So far, over 500 copies of the book have been sold, with another run on. At only €5 availble from Kilconnell shops, the Hall committee members and from Kilconnell Bingo – it makes an ideal stocking filler.

DAMIEN HYLAND-FROM BRACKERNAGH TO BOND

Damien Hyland, son of Mary and Kevin Hyland, Brackernagh, Ballinasloe, is a model maker living in London. He works with props and special effects for films and television, such as Cadburys, Star Wars, Batman and the Avengers and kindly shares his wise advice for anyone interested in the film making industry.

Damien grew up and was schooled locally but moved away a long time ago for work purposes. "My parents are still living in Brackernagh, so I still find myself back home a few times a year", he added.

"I always loved movies. I was a teenager when Terminator 2 and


Jurassic Park came out, so I was a perfect age to be influenced by what I saw", states Damien. In 2004, he got involved in the industry when he heard of a model making job happening in Elstree studios, just outside London.

The project turned out to be a massive model of Gotham city for 'Batman Begins', which was one of the last times anyone used models and miniatures. "Computer graphics really took over in the years since, which is sad but I'm lucky enough to have worked in that

department before it bowed out", added Damien. "Since then, a lot of the people who were classed as model makers, turned into prop makers, including myself."

In 2006, Damien graduated from the London South Bank University with a Bachelor of Science degree in Special Effects Design, which was by a guy who ran the special effects department for BBC in the 90's. "He was really good at getting us to achieve impressive results for very little money", mentioned Damien. "There really isn't anything you can learn in a classroom that can replace just doing the job. I learned more in six months in a workshop than the entirety of the four year course."

At present, Damien is still based in London, but is hoping to focus more on working in Bray, Co. Wicklow in the coming years, as his







fiancée, Michelle and step daughter are currently living there. "Ireland is gradually opening up to the world of film making and with new studios in Wicklow and Limerick, there's never been a better time for anyone seeking out a career in film and television", he mentioned.

For the most part of Damien's business, he's a prop maker. "In a lot of film work, the worlds they are looking to create, are fantasy based. Any object handled by the actors, whether it's a specialised vehicle or a piece of furniture, it nearly always has to be made from scratch" stated Damien. "That's where someone like me comes in handy, to build whatever the production designer, concept artist or director may need - they can be really odd and random ideas too."

"Last year, I made a couch for a 'Go Compare' television advert that had a lot of gizmos and mechanisms in it. It had to raise up in the air and turn into a bed, as well as drive on the road" expressed Damien. "I was only given two weeks to make and test everything - so there was a lot of late nights and early mornings... and a lot of empty pizza boxes."

A few years ago, Damien and his team made an amphibious ice cream van for Cadburys and took it to sea from the beach in Blackpool. They then brought it down for a spin in the Thames the following week. "It was a really unique moment in my career; watching people gather on London's bridges, trying to get a look at what we were up to" he added.

To date, Damien has gained many achievements throughout his career. He worked for the prop making and special effects team for 'Avengers: Age of Ultron', where he was awarded a credit at the end of the film. "It was a big moment for me. You can work in huge crews on a movie for years and only five or six people from your department may get a mention" stated Damien.

A major highlight for Damien was getting to work with Ridley Scott on 'The Martian', which recently aired in cinemas. "I've been a big fan of his for years, so it was amazing to see how he worked. He could come up with a random idea and we'd have to scramble around and make it, so it could be filmed the same day. A lot of running around but it was good craic" shared Damien.

Damien has spent the last six months working on 'Star Wars: Rogue One', which will be out at the end of 2016 and is just about to start working on 'Star Wars Episode VIII'. "You can spend ages inside a workshop building something and not really seeing its context. When it gets to the set and is lit up properly with the actors and creatures in their costumes - it all comes to life and is definitely the best part of my job" he expressed.

Damien is really keen to get working back in Ireland again, "As much as I love working in the UK, my life is back in Bray. It's hard being away from my fiancée all the time - she is an incredibly patient woman" he shared. Damien hopes that things will get busy enough over the next few years, for Ireland to really prove itself in the film industry. "The potential is definitely there and the infrastructure is growing. I'd like to see us making an impact on the film world, which I'm really looking forward to" added Damien.

Damien's advice would be to "Keep making stuff. Any skill from sculpting or painting to woodwork, metalwork or fabrics. I'm trying really hard to get to the stage where I finish any job I start, even if it's just making a shelf at home. It can be tricky to find the time but I do think it is good advice to pass on - keep making stuff and always finish what you start."

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INAUGURAL HALLOWEEN ZOMBIE WALK SUCCESS

Over 2,200 people of all ages descended on the woods and nature trails of Garbally Park for two nights on the lead up to the Halloween Weekend for the towns first ever Zombie Walk.

Set in the Parkland of the historic Clancarty Mansion, complete with it's own resident Ghost – the White Lady – the 3.5 km walk was bedecked with a cast of over 40 witches, zombies, goblins, pixies and Garbally House staff of the 18th Century who had left

their tombs to haunt the walk.

" At €3 admission this event was never obviously about making money but really about bringing our community together for a traditional celebratory time of year and being able to create with huge co – operation – a memorable and worthwhile event "stated Jacinta.

The event net of costs raised a small surplus for the performing groups – who produce annual shows and performances in the Town Hall Theatre.

It is hoped to make the event an annual fixture on the Towns calendar for the Halloween Mid Term Break.

KEVIN WHYTE COMMITTED COMMUNITY VOLUNTEER (29/05/1949 – 19/10/2015)

Kevin's life began in Cork City in 1949 where he grew up with his parents Jack and Teresa, his three brothers and two sisters. Despite moving to Dublin at the age of 16 he always considered himself a proud Corkman!

While working in insurance in Dublin he met his wife Philomena. In 1983 Kevin, Phil and their four children, Karen, Finola, Lisa and John, moved to Ballinasloe and quickly became involved in all aspects of life.

Kevin was predominantly a family man. He was very proud of his children's achievements and in his latter years his ten grandchildren were a source of great joy to him.

Throughout his working life Kevin held a number sales-related jobs and was regarded as a very persuasive salesman. In his work in sales he travelled all over the country.

In 2004 he was instrumental in setting up a new telecommunications company locally -TalkXtra where he worked until he became ill in December 2014.

In terms of priorities Kevin's work with voluntary groups came second only to his family. He gave huge amounts of time and energy to many organisations including Comhaltas Ceoltóirí Éireann, the Chamber of Commerce, Ballinasloe Area Community Development, Fianna Fáil, The Knights of Columbanus, St. Teresa's Special School and critically the St. Vincent de

Paul. Many members of these groups provided Guards of honour at his funeral.


Kevin has had a long association with SVP in Ballinasloe - visiting people in need and offering practical support and information. In recent years he was asked by the Western Region of the SVP to form a new conference to meet the needs of people in the Mountbellew area. This he did with the help of local volunteers

> and remained President of this Conference until late 2014.

> Kevin also became a member of the St. Augustine's Conference in Galway, tasked with distributing the Maureen O'Connell Fund the largest legacy ever willed to a voluntary organisation in Ireland. Kevin became Vice-President of this conference and held this position until his death. Up to last summer a total of €8.5m of the MOCF has been spent or approved

for 60 beneficial projects in Galway city and county, including many in the Ballinasloe area.

Kevin was diagnosed with cancer in December of 2014 He will be remembered fondly by his family, friends and many associates.



THE PASSING OF FR. VIVIAN TWOHIG


The passing of Fr. Vivian Twohig, a former parish priest of Mullagh and Killoran, marked the demise of a remarkable man that survived a helicopter crash in New York and continued to minister his priestly duties for over twenty years after suffering a stroke, which confined him to a wheelchair.

The eighty-year-old cleric grew up in Creagh, Ballinasloe where his parents were both national schoolteachers. His mother, Mai, started teaching in the Convent of Mercy but later spent thirty-six years in Newtown where Vivian attended before moving onto Taughmaconnell NS where his father, Michael, was the master for forty-six years. Then it was on to Garbally College for his secondary education before Vivian commenced his studies for the priesthood in St. Patrick's College, Maynooth.

Ordained on 19th June 1960, Fr. Twohig celebrated his first Mass in Our Lady of Lourdes Church, Creagh attended by his parents and family. Later that year he joined the teaching staff in St. Molaisses College, Portumna where he would remain until 1981. During the school holidays, Fr. Vivian travelled to different parts of the USA, helping out with ministry work. On one of those excursions he and 27 others were on a helicopter tour of New York City when they crashed into the Hudson River. They spent forty minutes in the icy waters waiting to be rescued

but, fortunately, nobody was seriously injured.

Fr. Twohig was appointed Curate in Kiltormer in 1981 and two years later became Parish Priest of Mullagh and Killoran, a position he held for twenty seven years before retiring in



2010. However in 1989 the popular churchman suffered a stroke which necessitated hospitalisation in Ballinasloe, Galway and the Rehabilitation Centre in Dunlaoighre. He was

determined to return to his flock and despite being confined to a wheelchair he adapted to his restricted lifestyle but continued to minister his duties in his beloved parish for another twenty years. His fighting spirit epitomised the character of a man that was resigned to his fate but never wilted in the execution of his pastoral duties. He was greatly assisted by a community that cherished his presence and his bravery.

For the past five years, Fr. Vivian had resided in Mill Race Nursing Home in Ballinasloe where he celebrated the Sunday morning mass, right up to a few days before his passing. His remains reposed at Portiuncula Hospital Mortuary where large numbers turned up to pay their respects. Parishoners lined the route when his mortal remains arrived at St. Brendan's Church in Mullagh and over forty priests joined the Bishop of Clonfert, Dr. John Kirby, for the funeral mass. Afterwards Fr. Twohig was laid to rest in the Church grounds, just across from his former residence. Among the attendance was the former Bishop of Ardagh and Clonmacnoise, Dr. Colm O'Reilly, who was a classmate of Fr. Vivian's in Maynooth and a life-long friend.

The late Fr. Twohig is survived by his sisters Florence Glennon, Ballinasloe and Maureen Lydon, Athlone; brother-in-law Michael, niece, nephews, relatives and friends as well as Bishop John Kirby and the priests of the Clonfert Diocese.

Every year in early November, a teacher from the school, Ms. Gilligan asks us to participate in the Christmas Shoebox Appeal.

We get an empty shoebox and cover it with Christmas wrapping paper. Then we decide if the box is for a girl or boy, and what age group it is for.

After that, we fill the shoebox with various items such as pens, pencils and copies for writing, a toothbrush, toothpaste and soap for washing. A hat, scarf and gloves to wear and finally a treat such as sweets, make up or a cuddly toy.

It is a really nice thing to do. Our Christmas Shoebox "might not change the world but, it might change the world for one child."



Last year, in Scoil An Chroí Naofa, we donated over 50 shoeboxes. This year we hope to beat that and send even more to children less fortunate than ourselves.

At St Gabriels N.S Kilconnell we do an ACE programme, which stands for Activity Confidence Eating. We are the only school in Ireland that have received a platinum award in the ACE school programme. The programme encourages everybody to take part in different activities and promote health amongst children. Ms Slattery is the co-ordinator of the ACE programme.

We have lots of sporting activities including hurling, football, basketball,



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rugby, handball and cycling. Every second year we have swimming lessons. JJ Carey from Ballinasloe rugby club gave us rugby training. Padraig Downey trained us at hurling. Debbie Donnelly gave us basketball lessons and Mike Malone trained us at football. We also had a day of cycling training.

We had Marchathon earlier this year, where some of the children marched 26 miles over a month. Once a year, we have a school 7 km run/walk where the children are joined by parents and other people who wished to take part. We have an active schools week when all the children take part in fun games including a skipathon.

We did some gardening in the school garden. We planted vegetables, some trees and also made a willow arbur with Debbie Donnelly, with each class making a different part of it. The third class children do cookery lessons every year. There is an ACE committee, with one child from every class participating. The committee do a food audit everyday on the children's lunches by checking for fruit, vegetables and water. The students are given clear refillable water bottles every year to encourage us to drink plenty of water. We had many mini chefs at the school and they made yummy smoothies.

Some of the 5th and 6th class students do 'Big Buddies' for the junior and senior infants, to help them in the school playground. They also do playworks, where they make new games for the infants to play. Ms Slattery does a 'Zippys Friends' programme, where children are encouraged to talk about their problems or feelings at school. She also does a 'Friends for Life" programme, which helps children sort out their arguments and stay friends. 4th class students got to pick adult role models. They chose Joe Callanan and Debbie Donnelly, who are two parents that do lots of work at the school. There is something for everyone in the ACE programme and we really enjoy it!

BALLINASLOE BRASS BAND PARADES ROLE IN 1938 ALL-IRELAND FOOTBALL FINAL

In 1938, a year before the hostilities of World War 2 broke out - Galway and Kerry qualified to contest in the 51st All-Ireland Football Championship Final. Cyril Dunne, son of John Dunne and grandson of Willie Dunne, relates the triumphant story of how both his father and grandfather preformed at Croke Park that day.

In the weeks leading up to the final, Galway were notified of the Artane Boys Band's decision to go on strike which meant there was no available band to play at the opening ceremony of the All-Ireland final.

John 'Tull' Dunne, captain of the Galway team and later secretary of the

Galway Football Board, asked his father Willie Dunne, who was a leader and drummer of the Ballinasloe Brass Band, if the band would be willing to substitute for the Artane Boys Band at the All-Ireland final. The band agreed to travel and play at Croke Park.

As there was a junior sector in the McNally were chosen as mascots to travel to the final.

The band travelled by train to Dublin on the morning of the All-Ireland game to Westland Row Station (Pearse St.). On arrival, they were taken to the Grosvenor Hotel for a meal and from there, marched to Croke Park. "On the way to Croke Park a local man donned a Galway hat and scarf and walked behind us all, pretending to collect money in his cap for the band", recalls Rory Kilduff. "As we arrived at Croke Park the local with the hat, scarf and money disappeared into the crowd."

Before match throw-in, the Ballinasloe Brass Band took their positions on the pitch, with Rory and Mattie leading the parade; one carrying a Galway flag and the other with a Kerry flag.

The match was witnessed by a record crowd of 69,000 supporters classic exhibition of football ever seen in Croke Park" according to event in Ireland according to the scribes of that time.



After the match, the Band along with their junior mascots made their way to Westland Row Station and returned home to Ballinasloe. The Brass Band and Ballinasloe Mascots were hoping to get a return invitation to play at the All-Ireland Final replay but unfortunately missed out on another opportunityas Artane Boys Band were available again. The replay was won by the Tribesmen Galway 2-4 to Kerry 0-7.

The mascots who are now both in their 93rd year have vivid memories of their great day out in Croke Park on All-Ireland Final Day in 1938.

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


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BALLINASLOE FOOTBALL 100 YEARS AGO

In 1915, Derrymullen won the Ballinasloe Town senior football league, clinching the trophy following a 2-4 to 1-1 win over Culliagh in the game refereed by Joe Dunne. Four teams participated in the League-Derrymullen, Culliagh, The Town and The Asylum, (St. Brigid's Hospital). In an extract from the "East Galway Democrat" of that year, it stated "A large crowd of spectators attended and intense excitement prevailed throughout" as both teams clashed in the vital game played on the Fair Green. The report also stated "The Brass and Reed Band played a fine selection of music during the progress of the game" which was led by Joe Dunne, an uncle of John "Tull" Dunne.

SEVEN IN-A-ROW TEAM

Over one hundred years ago the Ballinasloe senior Football team won the Galway Co. Championship by defeating Clifden for the start of their historic seven-in-a-row Co. Titles. The 1913 win heralded the greatest ever era for the East Galway town, who went on to retain the Co. Titles in the following years-1914, 1915, 1916, 1917, 1918 and 1919. The successes resulted in many Ballinasloe players being selected on the county teams, where at one stage there were thirteen Ballinasloe men on the Galway senior football team. It was accepted at the time that the introduction of the St. Grellan's Town League by the late Fr. Broderick played a vital part in raising the standard of football in the town.

The Ballinasloe team who were Co. Senior football champions 1913-1919: Gilbey Jennings, Joe Dunne, Jack Hanniffy, Stephen Bradley, Denis Egan, Peter Keighrey, Michael Shanley, P. Fallon, Peter Higgins, Johnny Egan, Paddy Ganly, Larry Raftery, Josie Walsh, Tom Egan (capt.), Paddy Roche, Michael "Knacker" Walsh.

The officers of the Ballinasloe GAA Club at that time (which comprised Football, Hurling, Handball, Cross-country Running, Cycling and Athletics) were: President-J.J. Whyte, Vice-president-A.J. Staunton, Treasurer-M. Murray, Secretary-T.J. Keating.

Heather Payne is a fifteen year old soccer fanatic from Ballinasloe, who is powering ahead in large strides in her sporting career. The transition year student shares how her love of soccer came about, her international highlights and her plans for the future.

Heather's love of soccer came from playing with her older brother, Conor in the front garden of their house. Similar to her brother, she decided to attend Tony Coyne's soccer training on Sunday mornings in St. Brigid's Hospital Ballinasloe at the age of eight, "this training further enhanced my love for soccer", added Heather.

Her first soccer trial was at u10 level, where she was selected by Jason Fallon for the u10 and u11 boys' team for Ballinasloe Town in the ADSL league. Heather played with Ballinasloe town FC up to the age of 14 where Jason Fallon and Noel Lyons continued to coach her. From playing with Ballinasloe, she was selected to play with

the ADSL Academy and trained with them every Friday night. "I travelled with the Athlone Academy to Wales and Bolton to play in

Heather was selected to play for the Connaught school girls' team at the age of 12 in the u15's schools Interprovincial. The following two years, she was selected to represent Ireland in the Bob Doherty International tournament which was held in Repton and Glasgow playing against England, Scotland, Wales, Northern Ireland and Czechoslovakia. Due to the FAI rules, girls are not allowed to play with boys, so at the age of 14, Heather joined Salthill Devon's Girls team in Galway.

"Due to my successful tournament with the Irish u15's, the following

year I was selected to play with the Irish u16's at a UEFA development tournament which was held in Dublin playing against the Czech Republic, Austria and Denmark", she states.

Earlier this year, having won the Irish u16 cup, Heather was requested by the Irish u17 management to train with them and was subsequently successful in being selected for the team which participated in the UEFA u17 Championship, which was held in Reykjavik, playing against France, Switzerland and Norway.

"It can be difficult to balance school work and training, especially as we go away to training camps at different times during the year", admitted

Heather. "Earlier this year, I was preparing for the Junior Cert prior to the UEFA Championships in Iceland, therefore I had to try and manage my time for study accordingly."

This year she remains with the Irish u17 panel and has recently returned home from a successful tournament in Turkey, where the team topped the group having played Ukraine, Andorra and Turkey. At the moment, the team

are preparing for the elite phase of the u17 UEFA championships, which will be held early next year.

"Playing for Ireland, for me, is like a dream come true I am very proud to represent my town and country internationally. I am honoured to be part of such an elite group and I have made many friends from different parts of the country. As a group on trips away, we get along very well and even though we are playing at a high standard of soccer, we still have good fun. The highlight of these trips would have been my game against Andorra as I scored two goals. My plan for the future is hopefully to continue to play soccer for Ireland at a senior level and possibly get a scholarship to America to play soccer", shared Heather.





THE SCHOOLS FOLKLORE COLLECTION

In the years preceding the Second World War the Irish Folklore Commission launched a project whereby pupils in the country's primary schools were asked to record items of folklore gathered from older members of their communities. Known as the Schools Collection, it reflected the sectarian and rural bias of its time in as much as only Catholic-run schools were invited to participate, while Dublin City schools were also excluded.

Material was grouped under 55 headings, with each school at liberty to choose as many or as few topics as it wished. The initiative was not, however, unanimously welcomed by our literary elite. For instance, the poet Patrick Kavanagh facetiously suggested that the money might be better spent supplying the bards of Ireland with free cigarettes!

It is now possible by going online to peruse the local results of the scheme at dúchas.ie/en. Here it becomes apparent that of the two Ballinasloe schools involved, the Boys' National and the Convent of Mercy, what the latter produced was by far the more interesting and detailed with 15 topics covered. Curiously, while all the sources are meticulously recorded, not one of the contributing pupils is mentioned.

The Boys' School chose 11 headings with 36 pupils named as contributors, of whom Joe Higgins of St. Joseph's Place is believed to be the sole survivor.

Willie Ward, the headmaster, wrote a perceptive introduction tracing the beginnings of national schooling in Ballinasloe to a location at the junction of Bridge Street and Main Street on a site at present occupied by the Oat Gallery apartment building. Later the school moved to what is now Jubilee Street before once more re-locating in 1910 to rooms at the back of the Town Hall.

Ward believed that the dearth of local knowledge evident in his pupils' submissions was probably due to the fact that the movement of population in towns was much more frequent than in

rural areas. "In the surrounding countryside," he wrote, "there are farms which have been in possession of the ancestors of the present owners for many generations, while in business premises in the town very few second generation owners exist. This accounts to a large extent for the fact that tradition is barren as far as Ballinasloe town is concerned." In support of his argument he furnished a comprehensive list of 130 local businesses, only 17 of which were operated by a second generation.


A reading of some of the pupils' contributions prompts us to question the relationship between folklore and history. To take two examples, one boy writes that a Fr. Burke on a sick call on Christmas Eve in 1864 was drowned in the canal, while another relates that a priest drowned in the canal in the 1890s collecting for charity on a Thursday night.

Fatal accidents at the Canal Basin were not uncommon, but there seems to be no evidence that a clergyman named Burke ever drowned there. Both pieces very likely had their origin in the following account based on a newspaper item dating from 1888:

A watchman at Ballinasloe Gasworks reported hearing screams coming from the general direction of the adjoining Canal Basin sometime between 11.00p.m. and midnight on a date in January. The following morning a body was recovered from the water and taken to the Workhouse on Station Road where an inquest was later told that the deceased had been identified as Thomas Ryan, a 68-year-old former Catholic priest, a native of Loughrea, though not a member of the Clonfert diocesan clergy. He had done a stint on the American Mission, and on his return to Ireland had been silenced some nine years before his tragic demise because of chronic drunkenness. Ryan had recently arrived in Ballinasloe, taking lodgings in the Market Square, and had spent the day prior to his death cadging drink in local public houses.

The comparison here between folklore and fact serves to remind us that the former is not history. What history involves is the reconstruction and interpretation of the past from its documentary remains, whereas folklore is concerned with communal memory, and memory, as we know, tends to blur and distort past events and to view them through the prism of present-day preoccupations and cultural values. Eighty years ago a story involving discreditable conduct by a cleric would not have been entertained. Should we then be surprised that the sad and sordid fate of a silenced priest had undergone a process of sanitization and transmutation by the time the event was recorded by schoolboys in the 1930s?





THE EARL AND THE SHOWGIRL

William Frederick le Poer Trench, future fifth Earl of Clancarty, was barely 21 years old when he married Belle Bilton, a music hall dancer, in 1889. The marriage caused a sensation at the time and is worth recalling both as an example of true love and as a reminder of a remarkable lady.

The fourth Earl was incandescent with rage and as the law of entail forbade him from disinheriting his son completely, he is said to have begun to have the timber on his estates felled in order to make them as worthless as possible. William Frederick le Poer Trench was forced to live off his wife's music hall earnings with one newspaper noting that he was "no more capable of earning his living for himself than a cow is capable of composing a comic opera". This process was halted when the illtempered fourth earl, collapsed and died in his library in London in May 1891.



The story handed down by all generations of townspeople tells how the new Earl and Countess arrived at Garbally and finding the gates locked against them, were obliged to scale the walls. It may seem unlikely, yet Belle Bilton was a remarkable lady who later reportedly performed a dance for the gentry of Connaught at Garbally House where she raised her right leg to the point where the big toe almost touched the lowermost light of a chandelier. They were scandalised and she was delighted.

Being light on her feet and a stage acrobat of sorts, she would hardly have found the scaling of a wall too troublesome. Matters did not end there and the keys of Garbally were only handed over after the fifth earl was driven to Coorheen House in Loughrea to remonstrate with his stubborn mother.

The new couple were held in disdain by Galway society to the point that at a hunt ball in 1893, most ladies left the floor when Frederick and his Countess began to dance. Despite this, Belle quickly became a firm favourite with the people of Ballinasloe and stories of her kindness to local


> people who were ill and her charity to the less well off were in circulation until recent years. She even had her effigy cast by the wax museum in Dublin and won over the respect and affection of Queen Alexandra, the wife of King Edward VII. Belle was not long for this world, however, and after suffering from cancer for some years, died aged 39 on the last day of December 1906 at Garbally House, some 104 years ago!

> As her funeral slowly made its way from Garbally to the place of interment in the precincts of St John's Church on Knockadoon, the hearse was filled to capacity with floral tributes and the tenantry of the demesne bore the coffin the entire

journey. Every business was shuttered and virtually every man, woman and child in the district lined the streets to bow, curtsey, sob or throw flowers as the coffin passed. The outpouring of grief was both genuine and extraordinary and despite Belle's humble origins, those who followed the coffin included Lord Ashtown, Lord Clonbrock, the local magistracy and every merchant of note.

When the Gaelic League came to rename Victoria Street in 1946, they opted for 'Duggan Avenue' in honour of the revered Bishop of Clonfert Dr Patrick Duggan. Had they chosen to rename it in honour of Belle Bilton, who lies within Knockadoon's apex, there would surely have been few objections to honouring the memory of the simple but abundantly generous showgirl who danced her way into local hearts.





Ballinasloe History Walk

- 1 Start at the statue known as *The Man with the Horse*, where Main Street joins St. Michael's Square. From the crossing near the statue, continue by turning right onto Main Street. The prosperity of Ballinasloe in Georgian times can be seen in the scale and classical style of the buildings here. A fine group of four frontages stand across from the statue of The Man with the Horse. With shops and pubs on the ground floor for the most part, these Main Street premises have several floors above.
- 2 Walking along Main Street, lift your eyes above the shop frontages for one of the town's characteristic sights. There are the Diocletian windows that grace several facades. They are from the years after 1805 when the 2nd Earl was in charge. A window of this sort is formed under a semi-circular arch with two upright divisions so that the whole opening is divided into three parts.
- 3 As you stand at the meeting point of Bridge Street and Main Street, you will see the Victorian frontage of a commercial premises, originally the Masonic Hall. Next to it stands a classical looking, beautifully-crafted, early 19th century stone house, currently a guest house. Beside these is a tall, fine stone-fronted classical mansion, which is now the Bank of Ireland. It was originally the town mansion of the Lord of all of Ballinasloe, the Earl of Clancarty. A friend of king George IV, the Earl was one of the architects of the resistance to the emperor Napoleon. It could be said that he was the person to whom most credit is due for the layout, growth and architectural character of Ballinasloe as we see it today.
- 4 At the end of Main Street, head along Bridge Street, then turn to the right to the pathway which runs to the riverscape where you can see channels flowing through the several arches of the long stone bridge over the river Suck, one of the town's most precious monuments. The Bridge has been in continuous use since the 16th century and its extension in 1754 prepared it structurally to carry even the heaviest juggernauts of today.
- 5 Walk through to the far end of the park; you will approach St Michael's Church (1852-58) that stands in a commanding position over the Square. Its architect was J.J. McCarthy, a follower of Augustus Pugin (famed for other Neo-Gothic churches in Ireland) and the design is said to have been revised by Pugin himself. Inside are many fine stained glass window. Of particular quality are those of St. Patrick and St. Rose of Lima, of 1925, by the renowned Dublin Stained glass artist, Harry Clarke and The Raising of the daughter of Jairus by Patrick Pollen, inserted in 1958.
- 6 From St. Michael's Church now walk up St. Michael's Square back towards the Man with the Horse Statue. Take a left into Dunlo Street, an important street in the history of the town, which contains, together with other buildings of about the same date, the late-Georgian Garda Station. The Station is towards the far end of the street, on the right hand side. Also on this street, over Dolan's Electrical Shop, you can see another fine example of Diocletian windows.
- 7 Halfway up Dunlo Street, turn right up Duggan Street, which will take you to St. John's Church (Church of Ireland, 1843). It dominates the vast Fair Green which becomes a hive of activity during one week every year when up to 100,000 people throng to the October fair. Look out over the Fair Green and admire one of the grandest freestanding classical monuments in the region. Dedicated to Charles Le Poer Trench, it was designed in the Neo-Greek style by the English architect George Papworth (1781-1855). A mile past this monument on the Main Galway road, South West of the town, the Earl of Clancarty's former country house is situated, where imposing gates mark the entrance to Garbally Court. It has been a school since 1923.

Walk down Church Hill onto Society Street and turn left, arriving at the Courthouse on the right. Society Street, like Main Street, was the 19th century location for the professional classes. As well as The Courthouse, it contains the former Bridewell (or gaol) from the 1840s. Further along this street, Ballinasloe Railway Station is a must. Constructed in 1851, it is a Neo-Gothic limestone tour-de-force and a fine example of the quality of rural Irish railway architecture in the mid-19th century.

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
























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
