

CLLR DONAL BURKE NEW MUNICIPAL CHAIR

At their annual summer meeting the local Municipal District Council elected Cllr. Donal Burke to the post of Chair. A native of Clonfert, Donal Burke comes from a small-farming background. His father, Dan Burke,

worked for many years as a supervisor in Bord na Móna and his mother, Nora, was a housewife who also served for forty years on a voluntary basis as an organist in their local church.

Donal qualified with a degree in Architecture from Bolton Street College in 1994 and thereafter worked as an architectural consultant in Dublin and Wicklow before moving home full-time fifteen years ago. He met his wife Alison seven years ago when he began tango-dancing lessons in Galway and they married three years later.

He adds that "from a young age I was interested in politics. Both my father and grandfather were active in Fianna Fail". He ran as a candidate for the first time in the 2014 local elections. "Being in a position to assist someone in difficulty and sort

out their problems is perhaps the most fulfilling aspect of the job but it's not without its frustrations and the constant shortage of funding made available by government to the County Council is reflected in the time taken to address rural and urban roads badly in need of repair" says Donal.

He paid a warm tribute to the work of his predecessor Cllr. Michael Finnerty on the afternoon of this election.

He hopes to concentrate on the maternity and emergency services at Portiuncula Hospital, the development of Ballinasloe and the surrounding area as an attractive area for jobs investment, improved access for people with disabilities to public facilities and the development of flood relief solutions for those families who are at risk in the town and neighbouring rural areas.

When asked how he would view this year as being successful he replied by saying, "I'll consider my term successful if we have made significant advancements in those areas over the next year".

Donal believes that Portiuncula Hospital is of major significance to the welfare of not only the people in East Galway but to families across the Midlands Region and the entire County Galway. As Cathaoirleach, he proposed at the recent Municipal District meeting that as elected representatives they seek a written assurance that no downgrading or closure of the Portiuncula Emergency Department take place. They're currently awaiting that response. He believes that it doesn't make any sense to reduce services in a well-functioning hospital and increase pressure on University Hospital Galway which is already seriously

over-burdened and where there's inadequate parking.

Donal is enthusiastic about working with the Ballinasloe Area Community Development Company and others to help provide an environment attractive to business start-ups or expansion in the town. The

announcement of 100 new jobs in the Surmodics medical device facility in Creagh has been a major step in the right direction. "As a Municipal District we have to work closely with B.A.C.D. to create the right environment in which industry would want to invest" states Donal. It is also important for close by rural villages that are under the threat of depopulation as fewer families are choosing to settle there. People aren't in a position to work from home or set up business in these locations unless they have access to adequate broadband and proper infrastructure - acknowledges Donal.

One of Mr. Burke's main focus during his time as Municipal Chair is to see improvements made to ensure public areas are accessible to those with disabilities. Donal spoke of a "woman named Caroline who avails of the services of the Brothers of Charity in Cleaghmore and who produced a booklet called 'Walk a day in our

shoes' to demonstrate the difficulties in accessing public facilities in Ballinasloe". While some new disabled facilities will be included in the Town Enhancement Scheme, there is much more that needs to be done to ensure easier access of the public areas in the town.

A major priority of his over the next year will be winter-flood alleviation measures both in the town and floodplains. "I have a major concern with the fact that the CFRAMS Study, which is intended to provide comprehensive Flood Risk Management Options in the Shannon Catchment Area, is not including solutions to winter-flooding in the rural areas north and south of Ballinasloe and doesn't appear to provide for dredging of the river", continues Donal. This means that families affected by flooding in those areas will not receive any special funding to cover the cost of damages. The only source of funding available to the Council is the Minor Works Scheme, which are difficult to get in rural areas as the Cost Benefit Analysis favours towns and more populated areas.

This town and its hinterland has a vast amount of architectural and archaeological sites of national and international interest that Donal thinks have yet to be fully exploited for our benefit. The festivals in our town, historical walking routes such as the O'Sullivan Beare and Hymany Way, sites such as Kilconnell Abbey, Clonfert Cathedral, the battlefield and centre at Aughrim, the unspoiled scenery of the Shannon and the Suck are all areas that can be promoted as an economic asset and develop Ballinasloe further as a tourist brand. The work of the Town Action Team continues quietly in the background with members reviewing the first six months of the year and finalising on plans for the next.

Once the websites & social media foundations

of over 75 local businesses are fully functioning, development on the new app will commence in earnest in Spring which will link the world wide web traffic and offerings of our service providers and retailers to the hand held devices of the new and current generation of consumers. A training and mentoring programme is being rolled out in the Autumn for all targeted business users.

Ballinasloe has fantastic sporting facilities following a €17 million investment over the past 12 years and the Sports Hub was set up to promote the facilities as ideal training grounds for out of town clubs and teams to use also. The Sports Hub brochure, online presence and first wave ambassadors are now in the final stages of production.

The Rural Economic Development Zone (REDZ) Conference which is being held in the town on Friday September 30 will examine best practice from the government funded REDZ towns and look at other opportunites for development of Ireland's provincial towns and rural villages with a range of sector representatives and delegates.

The group have met a lot of their short-term goals in turn making the town a livelier place to be and the focus will now shift to the medium-term goals.

The key building blocks of success from last year's calendar – the promotional Flyer, the Zombie Walk and the Christmas lights campaign are all proceeding.

The Action Group want to link up with neighbouring village and parish initiatives and is looking forward to being part of the Galway County of Culture Programme over the next five years.

"The project is at an early and delicate stage but I would be hopeful that links can be established between both Roscommon and Galway Local authorities with a view to bringing a renewed focus on Ballinasloe town and region. I

am anxious not to be entering into any false hope for people but I am very hopeful that we can get a joint initiative established between the County Councils which will bring some new investment and job opportunities for the Ballinasloe area," said Deputy Murphy. He is also planning to open his constituency office in town in the coming weeks, for his constituents.

The BEC Hot Desk facility allows you to hire a desk by the hour/day/week. This allows full access to Wi-Fi and fast broadband and to additional business centre facilities should you wish to avail of them.

There is no hassle of setting up furniture or internet access, as these systems are already in place. You will have access to the meeting rooms, reception and kitchen facilities. All of your business needs are under the one roof.

This gives small or start-up fledgling business a private office space and business environment at reasonable rates ie. €15 plus VAT for one day, €25 plus VAT for two consecutive days per week or €40 plus VAT for five days.

BACD and Enterprise Centre Manager Lyn Donnelly states" we meet a lot of people who can't cope with doing their first launch phase of a new start up from their garage or study and need to have a professional business environment and address – all this we can provide especially for registered goods and parcels. After a few months if the business takes off they can then rent on a licence agreement some other space from us and customise it".

The office spaces available for lease are flexible sized units, ranging in size from 130 sq. ft. to 4,000 sq. ft. They have flexible lease terms, free use of meeting and training rooms, self-service canteen, on-site centre management, nightly security patrol, access to local and national enterprise support agencies and its prime location.

Cornwall born Denise Wride is the eldest of 4 and has spent her last 25 years in Turkey and Portugal running her own businesses. Due to the recession in those countries, she moved to the area and opened up The Corner Café on Society Street, in the old Hills Sweetshop/Florist Premises.

She described what led her coming here, versus the rest of the world! "For 25 years I spent my time working in Turkey and Portugal. In Portugal I met my best friend through work, Ballinasloe girl Catherine O'Donoghue. She influenced me greatly and was one of the main factors in choosing my next path in life." With the financial situation becoming very difficult to work with there, she decided to pack up and move, arriving in the area 1 year ago.

She found life tough here at first which led her to recently opening up The Corner Cafe, "I found employment very hard to find and saw an opportunity in the town to open a coffee shop!" Her aim was to create a welcoming business which produced home baked and cooked food and to have a relaxing atmosphere. "It was a slow process trying to organise everything and painting and designing the shop myself."

NEW RETAIL STORE FOR LOCAL SVDP

CONFERENCE

St Vincent de Paul has been doing great charitable work quietly across the country, and our Conference locally is no exception. Opening their new store recently, located to the right of St. Michael's Church-they continue to keep all proceeds local and have been helping those in the community who are in need for a number of decades.

At key points in the community's past whether it be back to school, first communions, funerals, Christmas or indeed the flooding, the Volunteers at Ozanam House have been to the fore in assisting individuals and families who need practical support.

The first retail store in town was opened back in 2004, when they purchased a building on Jubilee St. They sold clothes, furniture and toys and the proceeds all went to those who were less fortunate. President Joan Hynes states "The message is very clear in our mission statement. We aim to help and bring the love of Christ to all those who need it!"

Though as time went on more space was needed to keep up with the demand and an extension to their building a few years later was not enough. There was a need for a meeting room and extra storage for sorting through the donations and collection. It was shortly after that the idea for a new home for the organisation came about. Joan went on to say that "In 2009 we began the process of planning a new premises for ourselves and all that goes with it."

Joe Sammon and Kevin Whyte, volunteer members at the time, initially purchased Delaney's old furniture store on behalf of the local St Vincent de Paul. The money used to fund the redesign and to pay back the volunteers came from the Maureen O'Connell Fund and from Town Council Wind Up Funding.

The group then used all local contractors in the refurbishment of the space. Gerry Cleary was the building designer, Paul Flynn the contractor, Gerry Markham supplied the furniture, John Lohan did the electrics, Thomas Gibbons for the plumbing and Pat Harney made the keys! Joan said that "It was important for us to keep it local and help out the community as much as possible!"

The new facility is 2,200 square feet and has 30 volunteers at different times working there. There is a meeting room for the St Michaels Conferences and the original shop is still used as a storage depot.

Talking to the Manager of the store Deirdre McCarthy, she explained what items they take and what they do with the money acquired. "We take clothes, toys and school supplies! We do take some furniture but we ask that those wishing to donate come into the shop first so we can send a volunteer to their homes to see if it is suitable first." She went on to say that the money raised from activities and shop sales is used for the needy within a 10km radius of the town.

The current committee is: President Joan Hynes, Vice President Margaret Moran, Secretary Mary McCarthy, Treasurer Kevin McMorrow, Spiritual Director Fr. Dan Donovan. Joe Sammon, Conor Carr, Mary Coughlan, Ned Price, Margaret Stock and the longest serving member Martin Healy.

The Europe Direct initiative was launched in 2005, with the European Commission aiming to create a network of accessible, local information centres in all member states. This provides an international database for all in the area.

In our town it is located on the ground floor of the new library at Society Street, the Europe Direct Information Centre includes an up-to-date collection of information packets available to all in the community, a dedicated Europe Direct PC for accessing this data from across the EU Institutions including the European Parliament and the Council of

According to our local Europe Direct Information Centre Manager Kieran Shaughnessy, the mission of this consortium is to distribute material and advice about the European Union's policies, to actively promote local and regional debate about the EU, allow the European institutions to disseminate local and regional reports and give the public the opportunity to send feedback. Also a

free Europe Direct 'Hotline' is available with direct access to Brussels for any gueries that can't be answered in house by dialling 00 800 67 89 10 11.

He has further stated that he is available to deal with general queries, and

then Cathaoirleach of County Galway, Peter Roche.

can direct those with questions he cannot answer to the proper authorities and sites. For example to EU networks operating in Ireland such as EURES (jobs), SOLVIT (commercial law), Structural Funding, and ECC (consumer

For those who might be interested in EU schemes, grant aid, programmes and supports the Centre will be able to point you in the right direction.

As well as this, they also host seminars and exhibitions. The talks and events are relevant to current EU policy, are all free, with the manager saying "they are designed to be both interesting to the general public and able to further knowledge of rights as European

They have hosted events such as '1941 - The Latvian Tragedy', detailing the invasion of the country by the Russians and the Nazis, 'The Road to Reunification' courtesy of the German Embassy and the Holocaust Education Trust exhibition 'Traces of a Memory' which was a chilling look at the loss of an entire culture from Poland during the Second World War.

HOSPITAL WATCH

Fianna Fail TD Deputy Eugene Murphy has stated that he will continue to lobby to ensure that there is no threat to maternity services or the Accident and **Emergency Department at Portiuncula Hospital in** Ballinasloe. "We have been assured that there is no intention to downgrade or close the maternity services at Portiuncula Hospital and I understand that any recommendations from an independent review of those services will be implemented."

Deputy Murphy has further stated that staffing levels at Portiuncula would improve with seven new posts including a paediatric consultant, an anaesthesiologist and a radiologist to be in place by autumn.

The Saolta umbrella hospital group has confirmed that it is reviewing five additional cases involving infant care at Portiuncula. The Health Care Group says that the cases are not part of the eighteen case 'review of maternity services' underway at the hospital since last year.

According to Ratemyhospital.ie Portiuncula Hospital has fallen 4 places in recent months to the 30th highest ranked hospital in the country. The University Hospital of Galway remains the 3rd worst ranked hospital at

Leaked reports to the National Media regarding the loss of the A & E 24 hour cover – have seen the Department of Health restate that there are no plans to close emergency departments across the country or to remove services from existing facilities. A spokeswoman for Minister for Health Simon Harris said he had not seen any recommendations or output from the Trauma Steering Group which is charged with developing a policy for a national trauma network.

Recent reports from Trolley Watch, indicate that the number of those on trolleys in Portiuncula is down from 43 to just 5 compared to this time last year, this is a drop of 88%.

There's been a 56% drop in the number of patients waiting on trolleys at UHG in the past 12 months. There have been 195 stranded on trolleys in the recent reports compared to last year's 445.

Meanwhile it has been further reported with the Fine Gael minority Government relying on the support of Independents and Fianna Fáil - and its own TDs who may oppose cuts in their areas - it's unlikely the measures would pass. One of the hospitals, Portiuncula in Ballinasloe, is in Independent Alliance junior minister Seán Canney T.D.'s constituency. He said any talk of cuts to services is "premature" while the ED at University Hospital Galway is "not fit for purpose".

Johnny Lyons is the smiling face that early shoppers see in St. Michael's Square, in Ballinasloe, each Saturday morning as he sells his home grown vegetables from the farm at Kylecrow in Killimor. Johnny is carrying on a family tradition which was started over sixty years ago by his late father, Michael, and now is assisted by his daughter Michelle-the third generation to be involved in the business.

Johnny is up at "cock-crow" and has his produce on display from 7.30 a.m. in the Ballinasloe Saturday market until 5 in the evening. "My father started out in 1955 growing and supplying vegetables to shops in Loughrea, Killimor and Ballinasloe as well as the Saturday market here. In the sixties I helped him out and then after his passing, I continued the business" explained Johnny.

Looking back over the years, Johnny said he has seen many changes in the market and the town. "We first were located beside the "Lazy Wall" then we were moved to the centre of the Square and now we are on the side. There were great characters around then like "Coffey" Bradley, Mattie Kenny and Charlie Ward-all of whom were entertaining and always had a quip for Willie McNamara when he came around collecting the Market Tolls. Nowadays we pay a Trading Permit fee to Galway Co. Council to allow us sell our produce, but the market has unfortunately got smaller" he added.

Recalling the "1963 Storm" Johnny said he was terrified that day when "slates were flying all over the town and when I got home the cocks of hay were blown away. It was frightening."

Johnny says the whole Lyons family are involved in the business and pays





tribute to wife Anne as well Michelle, Shane, Joanne and Aine for helping to keep "the show on the road." Still supplying farm produce to shops around East Galway, Johnny also finds time to do voluntary work with the Killimor Pastoral Council, where catering for the needs of the elderly is his top priority.

The affable vegetable vendor pays tribute to many customers who have supported him and his late father down through the years. "Sure where would I be without them. Even though many of them have passed away, their families still come to buy from me" concluded Johnny.



BALLINASLOE'S CONGO HERO

Former Ballinasloe resident, Cmdt. Pat Quinlan, who led 150 Irish soldiers in the 1961 Battle of the Congo is to be honoured by the Irish Army with a special citation next month when the 55th anniversary of the historical battle occurres. The survivors and families of the Irish group are to receive the special citations for bravery at a ceremony in Dublin.

Cmdt. Pat Quinlan lived in Brackernagh in the late fifties and early sixties where he was an extremely popular figure. He was very involved in the local boxing club and also became a well-known referee in the sport. Now two of his sons are involved in the making of a film in which "50 Shades of Grey" star James Dornan, plays the part of Cmdt. Pat Quinlan. Pat's son, Leo, also served as a Commandant in the Army while his grandson, Conor, acts in the film as one of the Irish UN soldiers in the siege.

The Irish unit were part of the UN peace-keeping force in the Belgian colony when they were attacked by up to 5,000 Luba warriors, where under Cmdt. Quinlan they held out for six days and escaped with few injuries. The late Cmdt. wrote two books on the conflict before his death.

21 YEAR SOROPTIMIST VOLUNTEER TO ASSUME NATIONAL PRESIDENCY BY BRIAN CIEPIERSKI

Local lady Maria Finnegan was recently elected as the National President of Soroptimist Ireland, having been the Vice President the year before. Set to take over from current President Sarah McCormack of Mullingar

in November is the first ever woman from Ballinasloe to be elected National President.

Maria Finnegan works in the Marina Medical Centre as a Practice Manager having moved here with her husband Anraoi, a local GP in the centre, and family from Galway city over 2 decades ago.

Having studied Business in GMIT, she soon found work as Practice Manager (which she is a Director with her husband) of the Marina Medical Centre and has been involved with the local Soroptimist branch since she moved here.

Though from Galway city, her mother was from Mackney and often Maria found herself back in the town throughout her youth "As

Working alongside multiple charities worldwide and locally, it has been an important aspect for many women in areas of education, violence elimination, healthcare and disaster mitigation.

The local branch was founded and set up by the late Cepta Connolly, the founder president who started the group in the town, in 1995 with the help of many women in the area, including Maria. The idea behind was to get like-minded women who are interested in giving service to the community, working for human rights and the status of women and to promote international understanding and friendship.

She was more than delighted to get involved "The main thing that attracted me to the organisation was the idea of being of service to the community and being able to help in some small way women and girls reach their goals in life! It is 21 years now since I became a Soroptimist and a founder member of the chapter here."

During her time with the club she has not been idle, holding every position the club has to offer throughout her time there, from treasurer to president, and she and all the members are very proud of their achievements to date. "We have raised €150,000 for various charities, contributed towards national

projects such as Cystic Fibrosis Association, Special Olympics and more and have a bursary of €1,000 a year for local girls in need attending college and work to make sure local funds stay local. And we have done much more!"

She has also lobbied with the chapter on many important issues affecting women, bringing them to the attention of the government and try to make the outcome the best it possibly can be. They are members of the National Women's Council of Ireland, have joined forces with the White Ribbon Campaign to end domestic abuse, running local seminars on Mental Health, Domestic Violence and drug abuse and they run a successful National Public Speaking Competition for girls to give them confidence to speak out in public!

Even now she and the club are involved in projects in Nepal, Meru in Kenya and other sun drenched countries to empower women and children to move out of human trafficking areas,

poverty, food and lead themselves to a better life!

"My aim as President will be to continue the great work being done by us all in the Republic of Ireland with my theme for the year being Respect, Rejoice and Recruit. I believe there is a lack of respect for many in our society and we need to instil more of it into our society for women, non-nationals in the community, the elderly, the Travelling community and our environment!" She also has helped the organisation put forward a Bill to the Oireachtas on repealing the 8th Amendment, and has called for clarity from the group on the details on the repeal and to become more engaged with the process.

Primary challenge for the incoming President - is that the association still relatively unknown around the country. It is difficult to get a message across to the masses even though the Organisation been around since 1921 and in Ireland since

1966.





"Many think we are an elitist group, and this has made many shy away from us. I can assure you though we are just ordinary women using our social conscience to make a difference!" And another issue is membership, there is a lack of involvement from the younger generation which is affecting the growth of organisation, mentions Maria.

She further explained the benefits "The Cub is an amazing place to make the most trusting and true friends. When I moved here from Galway City I did not know too many but when I joined the club I found amazing friends who I related to and could depend upon! And on top of this it was a place to open up, have fun and make a difference!"

Finally she had a message to any young women going to college or looking for work this Autumn - no matter what , you should keep pursuing your dreams and never give up. "Take time for yourself and do not give up on your talents or hobbies and have to confidence in your abilities, especially in the work place. More and more employers are willing to be flexible with hours and to working from home part time".

She also cautioned young social media users "Social Media is fantastic. Facebook. Twitter, etc.. but be careful, if you are not







BALLINASLOE RURAL PHONE AUTOMATION

50TH ANNIVERSARY

Ballinasloe town was converted from the old manual magneto system to automatic dialing fifty years ago this year. It was known as The Crossbar 531 system. L.M. Ericson's of Sweden who supplied and installed the system in conjunction with technicians of the Post Office engineering branch. L.M. Ericson's of Sweden first came to Ireland in 1962 and the first three automatic exchanges installed were Kildare, Newbridge and The Curragh. This was followed up by Roscommon in 1963, Tuam in 1964 and Tullamore and Clara in 1965.

At that time, it would appear that the town was not on the priority list for conversion to automatic dialing. With the construction of a new Public Office, a building was also built at the rear for the installation of the automatic exchange which it was envisaged would be a good number of years away. In 1965 the new Public Office was officially opened by the then Minister of Post and Telegraphs Mr Michael Hilliard. The chairman of the Urban Council Mr Martin Lynch in welcoming the Minister pleaded with him to make the town a priority for the provision of automatic dialing. In his speech the Minister promised that the town would have automatic dialing within a year. The problem with the Minister's promise was that to plan an automatic exchange and place the order with the contractors for the supply of the equipment for the town and the surrounding rural towns would take a lot longer than a year at that time.

To meet the target of a year for the town, the automatic equipment which was already delivered to Ennis, Co Clare was transferred here. Installation and testing commenced in January

1966 and was ready to go into service in June that year. The problem that then arose with the town's installation being expedited was that no provision was made for the fifteen rural exchanges which worked to the town as its parent exchange. Those were Mountbellew, Menlough, Castleblakney, Ahascragh, Woodlawn, Gurteen, New Inn, Kilconnell, Aughrim, Kiltormer, Killimor, Eyrecourt, Laurencetown, Shannonbridge, Taughmaconnell.

Buildings for those had to be planned, then construction carried out. Equipment had to be ordered from Sweden. Also new cables had to be erected between the town and most of the rural exchanges as phone cables

needed to be of a higher specification for automatic working. This took over six years to complete. The first rural exchange to be converted was Laurencetown and the last remaining one was Gurteen. During those years the manual exchange at the red brick building which was the old Post Office on the Main Street had to be kept and staffed by Telephonists until the last exchange was converted.

The maintenance of the automatic exchanges were carried out by Seán Keeley from 1966 until 1971. After that for the next thirty-five years it was done by Cathal Oliver.

STAFF DETAILS

The staff were divided into two sections: Clerical and engineering

The Postmaster Jim McDavitt, a Donegal native, had control of the clerical, postal and telephonist staff.

The Engineering Inspector, a Ballinasloe native, Michael Greally had control of all the engineering work, external and internal, around the town and Athlone.



He believes that it is essential to build on their work in Galway/ Roscommon in order to support the young people in their development. DUBARRY'S EARLIEST SHOE FAMILY

Matthew (Mattie) McNally, Garbally Demesne, who passed away in his 94th year, after a short illness was one of Ballinasloe's oldest residents. When Dubarry Shoemakers launched their factory in 1937, Mattie was one of their first employees, starting in the Lasting and Making department after leaving school at the age of fourteen, before eventually becoming a machine

maintenance supervisor and electrician.

It was while working there he met his future wife, Eithne Coyne, they were married in 1947 and had five children, all of whom worked with them in Dubarry. A great lover of the outdoors, Mattie's main interests were the bog and his garden. With the help of his family, he enjoyed the cutting and saving the turf, having the cup of tea under the open sky and inhaling the best of fresh air. Then it was the garden that was his next love, growing his own vegetables and priding himself in jam making-most of which was distributed generously to his family and friends. A finalist in the Tidy Towns' garden competition, he was a good cook but above all a generous and helpful neighbour, willing to donate his DIY and electrical skills to anybody in need.

Caring for his late wife for twenty-five years before her passing in 1989, with much love and devotion, Mattie loved his family and their heirs and at the time of his passing was a proud great-great-grandfather. His jovial manner endeared him to all and he liked to reminisce on his experiences over his nine decades of life. A former member of the local Choral Society, he loved to socialise with family members and was always willing to display his vocal talents when called on.

For the 1938 All-Ireland football final in Croke Park, the late Mattie with his friend, the recently deceased Rory Kilduff, were flag-bearers that headed the Ballinasloe Brass and Reed Band as they led the Galway and Kerry teams prior to the throw-in.

Pre-deceased by his wife Eithne and daughter Prim, the late Mr. McNally is survived by his sons Brendan, Martin and Matthew; daughter Martha, grandchildren, great-grandchildren, great-great-grandson, brother Noel, sons-in-law, daughters-in-law as well as many other relatives, neighbours and friends.

Many of Mattie's former workmates in Dubarry attended his funeral and obsequies, recalling with pride of having worked with a very jovial and helpful colleague over many, many years.

PASSING OF HUBERT DOLAN

For over sixty years Hubert Dolan carried on a very successful electrical business in Dunlo St., Ballinasloe. The sudden death of the Aughrim-born man came as a shock to entire town and surrounding locality where his name had been synonymous for so long.

The introduction of the Rural Electrification Scheme to East Galway in the early fifties prompted Hubert to embark on a career as an electrician. He won the Philips Salesman of the Year Award on a number of occasions and was their agent in the West of Ireland for many years. His expertise in the erection of TV aerials in the early sixties was eagerly sought, over a wide area, while his

business acumen earned him widespread respect down through the years.

Eventually deciding to retire after more than sixty years at the helm, Hubert handed over the reins to his son Hugh to continue the business. Survived by his wife Treasa, son Hugh, daughter Fiona and many other relatives and friends, Hubert Dolan will be sadly missed in his adopted town where his advice and friendship was so much appreciated.

Entertainment will be provided by local musicians and dancers both young and old, there will be light refreshments served and all members of the community are invited to join in what will be a To coincide with Social Inclusion Week, the team have collaborated with a number of organisations to schedule events throughout the week. Marian has stated that "We organised communication awareness training for all the food businesses within the town to assist them in providing a positive experience for all diners regardless of age or disability. The Team are also offering disability inclusion training to members of all sporting groups and clubs including officers, coaches and parents. All training will be provided free of charge and we are encouraging as many people as possible to get involved and make the most of this valuable opportunity.



The main hopes for this event for both John and Gerry is that it will attract more people than ever before which they believe is possible as the show boosts six All-Ireland Championship Classes in horses and it has the only donkey and mare show in Ireland.

"The Agricultural Horse Show is the only show left in Ireland run by a



voluntary committee", adds Gerry.

The event is taking place in the Showgrounds which has custom built fences made by James Tarrant, a course builder from Kerry. The grounds have been upgraded over the years and now can hold show jumping at any grade. The grounds are available seven days a week for schooling horses. Clubs are able to hire out the grounds for training purposes. It is run voluntarily by Padraic Ryan, who is the new Show Secretary.

Sometimes it is difficult to find those that are dedicated to a cause, and even more so to find one who will work for 15 years on one. Local woman Muriel Duthie is one such lady, who has for the past decade and a half, has raised

thousands of euros for her sister and the sister's husband's missionary work in Mozambique.

After her husband spent 5 weeks in Mozambique in 1991 he was inspired to help and with my sister and their 2 kids they moved there in September of 1992."They began work there at the Maforga primary school, and soon after the civil war ended. After 22 years they formed their own organisation 'Passo a Passo', designed to help kids reach secondary level, and those in need and there they have built Nhambia Christian Secondary School.

Wanting to help to the best of her abilities, Muriel decided 15 years ago that she would raise money for her family, the kids and the mission there. "I have organised a coffee morning among my friends and with their support have raised thousands of euro, the average is some €2,000, which is used for a specific project. The last two years' projects were the connection of electricity to the school and the purchase of roofing materials."

For her though this was not enough and just recently, with the idea from a friend, they have organised a one-woman show at the Town Hall Theatre on September 16th. "We are planning on donating the proceeds to the Passo a Passo school project, though it is more than

just that. They run adult literacy programmes and provide palliative care there to." Having visited the mission in the past, Muriel can attest to the good work that is being done there.

She has urged the community to welcome Coolera Dramatic Society to Ballinasloe and hopes that "the many people who have supported Lala's Mission in the past will turn up again."



Following Galway's successful bid for the European Capital of Culture 2020, Galway County Council are forming focused local committees in each Municipal District to ensure the entire county can benefit from the success of Galway 2020.

Municipal District Chair. Cllr Donal Burke welcomed the announcement of Galway's European Capital of Culture success. "We have an excellent opportunity now with designation . A large part of the success of the bid involves events centred not only in the city but across the county and we have an excellent opportunity in Ballinasloe and in our local villages to make the most of this by organising local events that will attract people to our region and make this truly a county-wide event".

The plan is for each town to have their own sub-committee they could focus on local events to celebrate the European Capital of Culture 2020. Cllr Michael Mogie Maher added that "the economic benefits are significant and the county's towns need to be proactive, The bid committee has promised to split the projects and events fifty-fifty between the city and county It is important that the entire county gains from this success "...

As part of the application they included an initiative entitled 'Small Towns, Big Idea's' which aim is to re-introduce the spirit of collective action back into rural towns in a contemporary way.

An Artist in Every Place' is part of the programme that aims to bring local artists from throughout Galway County from towns similar to our own, to work with the public to collaborate on creating art together.

The idea is that local people will work together to grow their own fruit and vegetables as a way to reconnect the people with the land. This would make the towns of Galway more self-sustainable.

In the Bid Book, Galway 2020 included the Fair Green as an area that has a large capacity which would be ideal for outdoor events. The committee are hoping to optimise locations like the Fair Green so they will be in the right condition to hold such cultural events by 2020.

The town is also ideally placed with over 9 performing Arts Venue – the largest being the Town Hall Theatre to assist with programming of live audience indoor events in the lead up and during the Cultural year.

For those who may not know, Larry Reynolds was a native of the area who, like so many of his time was forced to emigrate to **Boston in 1953. During his** time there he became highly influential

of his 3 Connacht Cup wins alongside Adrian Blaine and Noel Lyons. They were victorious with an U-18 squad in 2008, and then won it twice in a row with the senior squad in 2013 and 2014!

over the years, and they struggled to replace those that left with others that had the same enthusiasm. "The committee was a working man's committee, full of fantastic dedicated people and in recent times as they left, it has become harder and harder to keep up the good work. Johnny Walsh for example was always a great support, especially with the senior team. It is much easier to manage a team with a strong committee."



Moore History Group Re-Enact 1916 Cattle Drive

As part of Roscommon Ireland 2016 Centenary Programme, The Moore History Group recently re-enacted the famous 1916 cattle drives against the local Scottish born landlord James Daniel Arres-Mather.

During this infamous year, the landlord had his leases in Lisbeg in Galway broken by one Major Pollock and with martial law declared after the rebellion in Dublin it made the sale of his cattle impossible. This forced him to take back the meadows of Clonburren from the locals for his own animals, at the expense of theirs.

Cattle, sheep, and horses were driven out of the land and a pitched battle lasting four hours between a force of over sixty members of the R.I.C armed with batons and rifles ensued when the local residents protested, with severe injuries sustained on both sides. The bravery of those women at the fight was legendary as they formed a cordon between the men and the R.I.C.

Many of the men received substantial fines and some served prison sentences, but by 1920 the Mather's estate was sold to a committee of local people.

At the re-enactment the group went out in full costume, some descendants of the original families, and mirrored the battle fought all that time ago at the crossroad of the old Mount Welcome School in brilliant sunshine to a huge and very appreciative audience.

The cattle drive was organised by Peter Naughton and Padraic Kilduff, with costumes by Bernie Greene and catering by Maureen Duffy. A free Centenary booklet by Xandra Kilduff was distributed and afterwards Father Michael Molloy P.P., on behalf of the group, blessed

a commemorative plague which was specially designed by Padraic Kilduff and Martin Curley.

Afterwards a wreath was laid in memory of those brave people who in 1916 in Moore fought for their land with as much courage as those on the streets of Dublin. This was followed in Moore Hall with a showing of a DVD on sections relevant to the cattle drive of the memorable historic play "Mather's of Falty" written and produced by Xandra Kilduff and videoed by Padraig Costello.

Ballinasloe Horse Fair 2016 Under Threat



The Annual Horse Fair is due to take place from Sunday October 2 to Saturday October 8. Over 80,000 visitors are expected to attend bringing an estimated €8 million in revenue to the local economy.

The Horse Fair and Festival Committee are busy organising various equestrian and family fun events including; the Queen of the Fair, Soapbox Derby, fireworks, a dog show, a craft market, a vintage display and equestrian events on the Fair Green.

However, preparations have been halted due to a decision made at last year's event to remove the sulky lanes at Fair Green. The saga of what followed made Regional and National headlines with individual fairgoers mounting a demonstration on the Greeneffectively stopping the Horse of the Fair and Pony of the Fair Competitions.

This year's Horse Competitions are due to take place on Sunday October 3 and Monday October 4 but whether or not they will go ahead still remains unclear. Due to this uncertainty - with Galway County Council adamant that sulky flashing will not be permitted on the green and the Gardai worried about public order if it occours elsewhere in the precincts of the town centre - the committee are unable to seriously commit to any plans for it's equestrian events.

Fair and Festival Chairman Adrian Ahern explains that "these lunging events - including the Horse of the Fair and the Pony of the Fair have been organised for over thirty years and has attracted high quality horses and has impressed the very many international

buyers that visit. Many of the horses shown at this event have gone on to have international show jumping careers and to win or indeed to be selected to compete at Ballinasloe adds considerably to the value of the animal".

"The Ballinasloe Horse Fair is reputedly the oldest in Europe and a great celebration of the horse and equine culture in Ireland. It will be a huge loss to the future of the Fair if we are not in a position to host any equestrian events on the Fair Green" continued Adrian.

In the wake of the debacle last year; negotiations were to be held with all stakeholders but at a recent meeting ot the Municipal District Council it was outlined that the Regulatory Authorities were not changing their views on outlawing the flashing of sulkies. Several local Councillors have called for dialogue and clarity to given to how the fair is to proceed.

One of the other difficulties facing the Horse Fair are financial ones. The insurance of the event costs in excess of €10,000 and with no source of income the Committee relies on sponsors. "Without our sponsors we cannot run our events. So I am asking all businesses to step up to the plate and make a contribution towards the 2016 festival", urged Adrian.

"Our dog show, (one of the biggest in Ireland) could not have taken place last year without the support of local bakery and restaurant the Bread Basket. Without Walter's support we could not have hosted the dog show" remarks Adrian.

The Fireworks and family themed evening at the Church car park and Marina couldn't take place without the very generous support of Supermacs and personal commitment of Pat & Una Mcdonagh.

And so it is with all their events and they are deeply indebted to all of the sponsors, Ballinasloe Credit Union, Galway County Council, Jim Derwin, Pallas Foods, Ballinasloe Vintners, Gullanes Hotel...

The committee members will resume meetings in August with hopes that a solution can be found for the equestrian activities at the Fair Green.

AT AUGHRIM'S SLOPES

"Sing oh they died their lands to save At Aughrim's slopes and Shannon's wave."

Entrusted with the supreme command of the Jacobite army in Ireland, General Charles Chalmont arrived in Limerick from France on 9th May 1691 accompanied by 51 vessels loaded with arms, ammunition, uniforms and provisions. At this stage in the War of the Two Kings the Irish supporters of King James had retreated to west of the Shannon, and were determined to hold the line of the river against an expected Williamite advance.

Chalmont, officially known as the Marquis de Saint Ruhe (commonly though incorrectly rendered as Saint Ruth), was tall, well-built, and very ugly. In contrast to his title, his character seems to have been anything but saintly; contemporaries described him as vain, strutting and insufferable rude. According to one source, he behaved so brutally towards his wife that she was obliged to appeal to King Louis XIV, who dispatched Chalmont to Ireland so that the poor woman might enjoy a respite from his reprehensible conduct. Relations between himself and Richard Talbot, James's Lord Deputy, were said to be toxic.

In the conflict between the Catholic King James II and his Protestant son-in-low William of Orange, the Gaelic Irish aristocracy and their followers had allied themselves with James in the hope that the effects of the Cromwellian confiscations would be reversed and that they would be protected against religious persecution. Ironically, the Pope was backing William and had advanced him a considerable sum of money as a war loan.


Notwithstanding the support of France, the army of King James had suffered serious reverses in Ireland, particularly at the Battle of the Boyne the previous year. The Jacobites, however, did not regard their cause as beyond redemption, and they still looked forward to seeing the fortunes of war turn in their favour. It was in this mood that Chalmont set out for Athlone, where it was anticipated that the Williamites would attempt to effect a crossing of the Shannon.

After the town had been pulverised by an intense and prolonged bombardment by Williamite artillery, the Jacobites concentrated their defensive positions on the west bank of the river. Seizing the opportunity presented by the low level of the Shannon following a lengthy dry spell, on 30th June the Williamites launched a surprise attack by fording the river under cover of darkness. In the absence of Chalmont, who allegedly had taken time off to go hunting, the attackers under the Dutch General Godaard van Reede (later known as Count van Ginkel) quickly overran their opponents' defences. Having suffered a humiliating defeat, a demoralised Jacobite army was forced to withdraw to Ballinasloe, loosing nearly half its infantry to desertions on the way.

Chalmont was blamed for the loss of Athlone and he knew it. Desperate to salvage his reputation, he disregarded the Lord Deputy's orders to retreat to Limerick to await reinforcements from France, and decided to offer battle to the advancing Williamites at Aughrim. He may have been influenced in his choice of ground by hearing that

O'Sullivan Beare had defeated a numerically superior English force at the site in 1602.

Sunday 12th July had begun with fog which had dispersed by midday as the armies stood facing each other on the opposite slopes of Kilcommedan and Urrachree, about three and a half miles southwest of Ballinasloe. Ginkel commanded a mixed force of English, Irish Protestant, Dutch, Danish and French Huguenot soldiers, approximately 20,000 strong, roughly the same in number as the army of his adversary, though the Williamites had the edge in artillery. The Jacobite position was a good defensive one since a bog separated them from their opponents, but could prove difficult in the event of their attempting a counterattack.




The conflict raged from noon to sunset, during which time the Williamite assaults had been successfully repulsed until the tide of battle unexpectedly turned against the Jacobites. As he was about to lead a charge he hoped would clinch his victory, Chalmont was decapitated by a cannon ball. Confusion ensured in the Jacobite ranks, for he had failed to communicate his battle plan to his subordinates.

In another part of the field an equally disastrous event occurred. A narrow causeway led across the bog – approximating to the present-day Aughrim-Ballinasloe road – from the Williamite right to the Jacobite left flank. The Williamite General Mackay perceived this as a vulnerable point in his opponents' defences, and resolved to lead a cavalry charge along the route. It used to be thought that a detachment of cavalry detailed to defend the causeway was treacherously withdrawn by their commander, Henry Luttrell, without engaging the enemy. Recent research suggests that this was not so, and that, on the contrary, a vigorous defence had been conducted until an order to retreat had come from further up the chain of command. Eventually the Williamites broke through, taking the main body of the Jacobites completely by surprise. Finding the enemy suddenly in their midst, they proved easy meat for their opponents.



The result was a crushing defeat for the Jacobite cause on a field strewn with an estimated 4,000 corpses. Amongst the consequences of the battle were the Jacobite surrender on 28th August, the Flight of the Wild Geese, the expropriation of the landed property of those on the losing side, and the enactment of the Penal Laws. More than a century would pass before Ireland would again rise in arms.

"Aughrim is now no more, St. Ruth is dead, And all his guards are from the battle fled; As he rode down the hill he took a fall, And died the victim of a cannon ball."



Ballinasloe History Walk

- 1 Start at the statue known as The Man with the Horse, where Main Street joins St. Michael's Square. From the crossing near the statue, continue by turning right onto Main Street. The prosperity of Ballinasloe in Georgian times can be seen in the scale and classical style of the buildings here. A fine group of four frontages stand across from the statue of The Man with the Horse. With shops and pubs on the ground floor for the most part, these Main Street premises have several floors above.
- 2 Walking along Main Street, lift your eyes above the shop frontages for one of the town's characteristic sights. There are the Diocletian windows that grace several facades. They are from the years after 1805 when the 2nd Earl was in charge, A window of this sort is formed under a semi-circular arch with two upright divisions so that the whole opening is divided into three parts.
- 3 As you stand at the meeting point of Bridge Street and Main Street, you will see the Victorian frontage of a commercial premises, originally the Masonic Hall. Next to it stands a classical looking, beautifully-crafted, early 19th century stone house, currently a guest house. Beside these is a tall, fine stone-fronted classical mansion, which is now the Bank of Ireland. It was originally the town mansion of the Lord of all of Ballinasloe, the Earl of Clancarty. A friend of king George IV, the Earl was one of the architects of the resistance to the emperor Napoleon. It could be said that he was the person to whom most credit is due for the Jayout, growth and architectural character of Ballinasloe as we see it today.
- 4 At the end of Main Street, head along Bridge Street, then turn to the right to the pathway which runs to the riverscape where you can see channels flowing through the several arches of the long stone bridge over the river Suck, one of the town's most precious monuments. The Bridge has been in continuous use since the 16th century and its extension in 1754 prepared it structurally to carry even the heaviest juggernauts of today.
- 5 Walk through to the far end of the park; you will approach St Michael's Church (1852-58) that stands in a commanding position over the Square, Its architect was J.J. McCarthy, a follower of Augustus Pugin (famed for other Neo-Gothic churches in Ireland) - and the design is said to have been revised by Pugin himself. Inside are many fine stained glass window. Of particular quality are those of St. Patrick and St. Rose of Lima, of 1925, by the renowned Dublin Stained glass artist, Harry Clarke and The Raising of the daughter of Jairus by Patrick Pollen, inserted in 1958.
- 6 From St. Michael's Church now walk up St. Michael's Square back towards the Man with the Horse Statue. Take a left into Dunlo Street, an important street in the history of the town, which contains, together with other buildings of about the same date, the late-Georgian Garda Station. The Station is towards the far end of the street, on the right hand side. Also on this street, over Dolan's Electrical Shop, you can see another fine example of Diocletian windows.
- 7 Halfway up Dunlo Street, turn right up Duggan Street, which will take you to St. John's Church (Church of Ireland, 1843). It dominates the vast Fair Green which becomes a hive of activity during one week every year when up to 100,000 people throng to the October fair, Look out over the Fair Green and admire one of the grandest freestanding classical monuments in the region. Dedicated to Charles Le Poer Trench, it was designed in the Neo-Greek style by the English architect George Papworth (1781-1855). A mile past this monument on the Main Galway road, South West of the town, the Earl of Clancarty's former country house is situated, where imposing gates mark the entrance to Garbally Court. It has been a school since 1923.

Walk down Church Hill onto Society Street and turn left, arriving at the Courthouse on the right. Society Street, like Main Street, was the 19th century location for the professional classes. As well as The Courthouse, it contains the former Bridewell (or gaol) from the 1840s. Further along this street, Ballinasloe Railway Station is a must. Constructed in 1851, it is a Neo-Gothic limestone tour-de-force and a fine example of the quality of rural Irish railway architecture in the mid-19th century.
