As we face into another fresh year of challenges the familiar new year bleating back drop of the trolley scandal greets our post Epiphany blues, almost as regular as the Crib following the witches lanterns of Halloween.

Our local General Hospital did not come out the worst as reported in these pages and elsewhere and continues to survive and thrive delivering approximately 2000 babies a year, over 15,000 Operations, 22,000 outpatients visits; attended to by some 700 plus staff on a budget of roughly €64 million.

We are very fortunate as a town to have such a Medical and Health Facility developing and servicing our families and communities. We constantly hear about the difficulties of aged care on this island – how prone they are to flu, bone breakages, infections – the perennial bed blockers of the system. Anyone that tuned into Joe Duffy in the past few weeks to hear of the new professional Home Carers and their plight at the hands of Service Companies would be forgiven we were living in a Dickensian age. Countless studies from the CSO out are telling us that the demographic shift of this century is upon us – in that 60% of the islands population will be living well into their 9th decade and comprise the majority of inhabitants in less than 12 years' time. Our system can't cope now – never mind 12 years' time.

12 door knockers up from the wonderful Hospital and Healthcare campus, located in the same Brackernagh, are a band of community activists concerned with the care of the elderly, the infirm, the marginalised in our community – the Ballinasloe Social Services Centre. In so far as the nuns were instrumental in helping us with a hospital- this unique care bear team are determined to keep us all out of it, for as long as we can.

For their efforts – the State pays for 50% of their total needs – the guts of €200,000. After 9 years of horrific gouging of cuts to front line services and these are at the sharper end of the stick – meals on wheels, home help, home care, physiotherapy – these Charitable Healthcare groups as well as looking after their client groups – chiefly our elderly – (post the cruise liner generation, as opposed to retirees) and those in social need; have to go out and collect money to pay for the same services that are saving the state a small fortune – by keeping folks out of the acute care hospital system.

They are community heroes in our midst and fully deserve our support but within a 1 km stretch of the old N6 is all about what is wrong about our Healthcare's priorities and we have a few short winters to fix it!

MODERN NEW FIRE STATION UPGRADE

Plans are in place for the Fire Station in Ballinasloe to be upgraded in 2018 according to Alan Farrell, Acting Director of Services of Galway Co. Council. The station was due to be refurbished and extended before the last recession.

The town's current Fire Station which is located on Society Street has needed an upgrade for quite some time now since the back of the station was extended over 30 years ago. The new building will have enough resources to facilitate the needs of the growth of population in Ballinasloe and surrounding areas.

The Fire Service contains two Standard Fire Tenders which are to be upgraded soon, a Mobilised Water Carrier and Fire & Rescue Jeep. The site on the Fair Green side of Society Street has been home to the local Civil Defence for many decades, who work hand in hand with the Fire Service.

The Fire Unit currently employs 12 Retained Fire Fighters which hasn't changed in 3 years, two of which are female. Station officer Barry McKeon leads the force alongside Sub Officer Tom O'Grady. The crew work within a 15-mile radius around Ballinasloe, which can be tough in some case scenarios.

Speaking on behalf of crew members, Barry was unstinting about their dedication and commitment to the job. "We currently have 12 Fire Fighters employed within our station, all

of whom give 100% every day their called out. The training and skill which is needed in this job can be very tough on the body, but that still doesn't stand in our way. I can't thank my colleagues enough for what they have done for our station, without them we wouldn't be where we are today".

The Old Town Library has been in temporary use by the Civil Defence and the plans are in essence to get the Civil Defence to move fulltime to the Library facilities to free up space and upgrade/renovate the Fire Station.

Since then there have been many requests by the public and local councillors for renovation of the building, which in turn could attract new business occupants. There have been talks in the past between councillors on how they could use the building if it was adapted in the right matter, and now it looks like they have come to a progressive solution.

Mr Farrell has advised that the Old Library in Ballinasloe would be the ideal location for the new station to be placed at.

All members of the Ballinasloe Municipal District Council have welcomed the upgrading of the Fire Station and hope that much more funding will be put into the rest of the towns services in years to come. Mr Farrell has said that he will be raising this matter with the County Corporate Department soon, and will report back to the Municipal District Council.

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KILCONNELL LANDFILL DELIVERS €300,000 BACK TO TOWNS INFRASTRUCTURE

In 2008 when Greenstar/Celtic Waste were operating the landfill in Kilconnell, a condition of planning was that the haul route from Kiconnell to Cappataggle had to be upgraded to accommodate the trucks using the route. The operator of the landfill agreed to give €1 million towards this, which the total cost of the works came to €1.3 million.

Mayor of Ballinasloe Municipal District Council, Cllr. Aidan Donohue explains: "The outstanding €300,000 to complete the upgrades came out of the roads budget from the Ballinasloe area to complete these works. When Galway County Council took over the running and remedial works of the landfill upon request from both the Department and the EPA, a request was made by the present sitting councillors that the €300,000 that was taken out of our roads budget to complete the roadworks be reinstated to the Ballinasloe area".

The Department have agreed to this and now this money will be in the town's budget for 2018.

The Municipal District Councillors agreed to allocate €120,000 towards a specific project in the Municipal area at their December meeting and the remaining €180,000 be divided equally to the six councillors for nominated works in the area. It is yet to be formally decided which project the €120,000 will be spent on.

The €30,000 allocated to Cllr. Michael Finnerty will be mostly spent on Hedge Cutting, where he claims that this project may not be the most glamorous, but is effective and of benefit to all sorts of road users—pedestrians, cyclists and vehicular.

Cllr. Michael Connolly states that "€30,000 isn't a lot of money for doing any full re-development" but in any case he has plans in mind to use his allocated funding on footpaths and road works in the surrounding area.

There has been no decision as of yet by Cllr. Donal Burke on what he plans to do with his given allocation funds, as he believes that further discussions need to take place with the Council Engineers at the next meeting in February, about the priorities which are put in place on spending the funds.

According to Cllr. Dermot Connolly, his allocation of €30,000 is planned to be fairly distributed between the town's roads and small roads outside of the town itself.

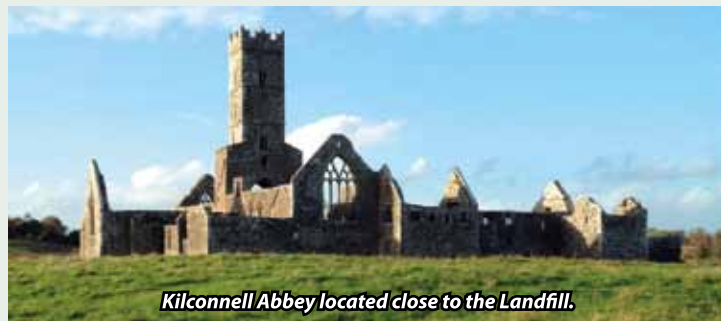
Cllr. Tim Broderick was regrettably unavailable for contact to elicit plans on his intended use of his allocated finances. LIFE will bring updates on both Cllr. Tim's allocation and more interestingly on what the €120,000 will be allocated to over the coming months.

This on top of the €88,000 awarded to the District Area last November from Minister Michael Ring's REDZ Village & Town Enhancement Scheme for footpath refurbishment will provide a welcome injection of investment.

Meanwhile as we go to print the final elements on the BIG DIG Tender are being topped and tailed with the shortlisted contractors Tenders assessment has been completed and even though the most economically advantageous tender has come in €1m over budget GCC have committed to proceeding with the project. Final negotiations are currently underway and it is hoped the project will start at the end of quarter 1 (March 18).

As soon as the contractor has been appointed (which is

to happen imminently, a liaison officer will be appointed, who will be meeting with the local businesses and stakeholders to inform them of full details and programme for the works.

The Town Team are utilising the early few weeks of the year to regroup and refocus on their mission, objectives and key priority milestones. Critical to their success so far has been the range, reach and depth of its core group but with some members indicating, for a variety of personal commitments, their need to step down the Town Team are looking for about 3 to 4 new members to share the workload.

In essence the group would like to see new members from areas such as education, health and youth. At the end of February they hope to have secured some new skills, faces and sectors for the team.

Jacinta Divilly, the Co-ordinator, reviewed in some detail the completed headline projects of the past three years:

In term of financial resources for the year ahead the Town team were granted €15k from Galway County Council activities along with €13,600 from Town & Village renewal scheme. Some €15,000 must be invested on the following projects in 2018 to secure the draw down:

- St. Brigid's Future Symposium
- Skills and Infrastructural Audit of Area and Marketing the Town as an Investment and Tourism Location
- Sports Hub Project.

A general 12 month action plan was agreed to support and prioritise activities on the following: St. Brigid's Future Symposium, Skills and Infrastructural Audit of Area and Marketing the Town as an Investment and Tourism Location; The Marketing of the IDA Advance Factory, The Sports Hub Project, Ballinasloe.ie, Xmas Illuminations (and the fundraisers and marketing events that go with it ie. Zombie Walk) Additional "Shovel Ready" projects that would require some capital assistance.

A range of other ideas are being discussed in the fields of Tourism, the Cycleway, The Environment, Healthcare, Education, Govt. Decentralisation and the Town Centre management post the "Big Dig."

Most of the Town Team members believe that a dedicated Town Centre Retailers/Business forum or action group would be best placed to micro manage some of the pressing retail and town centre management issues-like changing opening times and group marketing campaigns.

The Team hope to be in a position to outline more specific ideas and detailed plans at the time of the Development Company's AGM in Spring.

CHRISTMAS CHARITIES GIVING CAMPAIGN

The evening was presented by the fast-paced MC Pat Vaughan, who was in his costume from the pantomime, where he played "Tickles" the court jester.

In the lead-up to Santa's arrival, a number of tractors from the Ballinasloe & District Vintage Club decked out with bright Christmas lights made an

appearance, driving around the Square in a great spectacle. Santa finally arrived, with the help of the local Fire Brigade, where he was greeted with rapturous applause. After a countdown from 10 to 1, Santa pushed the button to bring the Christmas lights to town for the festive period.

"Once again the Festive Gathering, being on the last Sunday in November, has proved a winner for parents and younger folk alike. We are fortunate as a Town Team to have the involvement of over 35 volunteers, the schools, the Panto, the Musical Society and the musicians as well as the contractors and riggers who all combine to kick start our local Xmas season" stated Seamus Duffy, Chair B.A.C.D.

It is important to remember that the Christmas Illuminations project is always a community-driven one, and would be impossible without the contributions from many local businesses. Their subscriptions are up 10% up on previous years, with the Town Teams own fundraising efforts with Raffles and events – amounted to over €8,000. The total project costs came to almost €24,000. The welcome support of Galway County Council is always required for these type of events and once again the signature TREE and new illuminations helped act as a focal point for the season.

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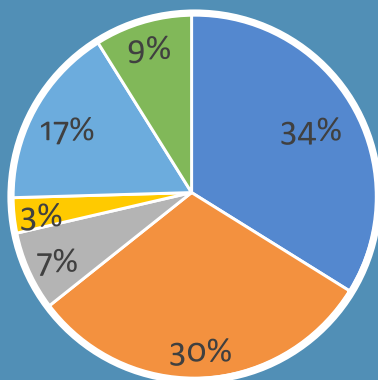
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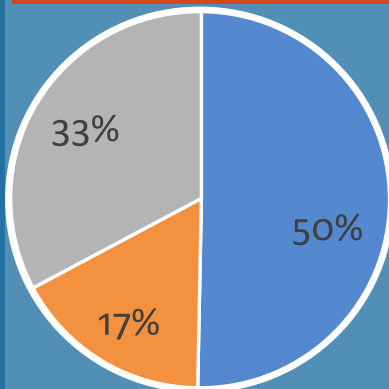

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HOSPITAL WATCH - TROLLEYS NUMBERS DOWN

It has been a busy last few months in Portiuncula Hospital coming from reports on Saolta.ie, with the launches of new services as the new chest pain clinic and staff library.

Along with this the hospital's catering department was awarded with the Happy Heart Healthy Eating Award, which is given when the food and menus in the Staff Dining Room meet the healthy eating guidelines as set out by the Irish Heart Foundation and the Department of Health.

A new fairy garden has also been put in place at the hospital grounds which was donated by Jasmine Elkhershi from the craft blog, Procrastimate.com and Grainne Brady from the gardening blog, ShannonOrchard.com. The garden is a vibrant and colourful area for children in the hospital to play in while they are in hospital.

Despite the post Xmas Trolley crisis-figures on trolley and ward watch indicate that only 5 people were recorded to be on hospital trolleys this January. This is a significant reduction compared to this time last year where there were 28 patients without a bed. In contrast to last month the figures are up by just one trolley!

University College Hospital Galway's figures remain much higher than Portiuncula as usual, with a total of 27 patients stuck on trolleys

in January. These figures remain the exact same in comparison to January of last year, but a significant rise when matched with last December where only 11 patients were on trolleys.

Portiuncula Hospital enjoys a ranking of 30th out of 69 public private hospitals across Ireland according to stats on RateMyHospital.ie, an impressive stance over the past months. In comparison to neighbouring hospitals, Portiuncula remains places above Roscommon County Hospital, and 35 above University College Hospital, who still sits close to the bottom of the League at 65.



PLANNING APPROVED FOR NEW ADVANCE FACTORY

The IDA Business and Technology Park on the Creagh Road will be home to a new 15,000 square foot facility after receiving planning permission for an Advance factory.

This site, funded by Ballinasloe Area Community Development Ltd, is ideal for potential bio-medical, pharmaceutical or bio-technical manufacturers and the full site could be ready to occupy as early as November 2018, depending on when an investor or firm decided to locate.

This site is compliment to the increase in jobs caused by the expansion of SurModics, which currently employ 140 workers, and indeed Aptar which has over 140 employees.

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SAYING NO TO NEW WASTE TRANSFER STATION

In the past few weeks anger and fear has been expressed over the new waste transfer facility proposed to take over from the old waste plant located just outside the town in Poolboy, which stopped operating back in 2005.

Hundreds of people attended a public meeting, regarding opposition to a waste transfer facility, in the Shearwater Hotel on the 10th of January.

Galway County Council granted planning permission to Sean Curran of Barna Waste for the transfer station last year planning reference 16/1286.

The proposal comprises of the construction of a 1,080 square metre transfer building to receive waste and recyclables and unload/re-load these materials within the building to larger vehicles for transfer to other waste/recycling facilities and for ancillary yardage, parking weighbridge, staff office (29.6 square metres) and all associated site services in Poolboy.

The application granted by Galway County Council permits for 23,400 tonne of waste to be transferred at the station each year. The permissible opening hours is 06.00 to 20.00 Monday to Friday and 08.00 to 14.00 on Saturdays. According to the application submitted the following is the approximated number of truck movements per day: 6 bins trucks & 12 skip trucks bringing waste to the station, with

approx two 30 tonne trucks, two 10 tonne trucks and one 15 tonne truck removing the waste from the site each day. The County Council is currently assessing a waste permit for construction waste to start the construction phase of the project and objections had to be in by Jan 24th.

Ballinasloe Area Community development Ltd (BACD) issued a detailed statement on ballinasloe.ie stating their concerns about the negative impact any waste enterprise would have on local tourism and enterprise. BACD Ltd. over the past 20 years have been working tirelessly through different projects (Ballinasloe Enterprise Centre, Ballinasloe Life Magazine & Ballinasloe Town Benchmarking Project, to name but a few) to promote Ballinasloe and attract inward investment.

They are liaising with the Poolboy Community Development Council, who are opposing this Waste Transfer Station, and have been in consultation with our local Councillors, TDs and Minister on this matter.

Officers of the Poolboy Community Development Council held a productive meeting with Minister Denis Naughten, including 3 senior officials from the Waste Policy & Resource Efficiency Division, for over an hour in Dublin on the invitation of the Minister at the public meeting in the third week of Jan.

Aishling Dolan, Group Secretary and Dr. Vincent Parson, Chair made

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a detailed submission on the feelings and wishes of both the public meeting held in the Shearwater and rationale for objection to what is currently tabled under the planning process and what might be evolved in the future with certain types of infrastructure already adjacent to the sites.

They specifically requested that no further waste permits or licences will be permitted for the Ballinasloe area. Minister Naughten noted that 'we all want the same outcome'. With his officials, he outlined the following:

The Minister does not have Executive Powers, under the Act over waste at a Local Authority Level Waste, licenses are granted by EPA only if the threshold is over 50,000 tonnes for certain types of waste. An EPA environmental impact statement is required if the waste is over 25,000 tonnes. Certificate of Registration and waste permits are managed by the Local Authority/ County Council not the EPA.

In relation to the 73 acres - the officials stated that a substantial landbank would be required of approximately 1,500 hectares for a landfill that this (73 acres) is too small. They do not know the purpose for this site. Factually there is no provision for any new landfill in the Connacht Regional Waste Management Plan - approved at Dept level.

The Minister's team pointed out that with a current planning application under consideration in another part of the Country there

is sufficient national incinerator capacity and there is no need or future demand for any other such facilities.

He acknowledged the 1999 High Court Order and the number of objections which he has received and that residents and businesses in have legitimate concerns . He agreed to notify Galway County Council (GCC) of the 1999 High Court Order and his officials committed to providing an update on the current annual EPA monitoring of the Poolboy landfill.

As we go to print, Mayor of Ballinasloe Municipal District Area Council, Cllr. Aidan Donohue, managed to secure a notice of motion on the Agenda of the Council's last meeting in January, which calls for the decision of original planning to be revoked.

As it is a notice of motion (under the bye laws and standing orders of Council) discussion and debate will happen but no decision can be taken unless it receives the majority of support of the Councillors present to be formally ratified at a subsequent meeting.

The committee of "Ballinasloe says NO" are calling out for new members to join in their campaign to help volunteering.

NATIONAL AWARD FOR LOCAL FLOOD ALLEVIATION GROUP

Flood Alleviation Ballinasloe Community Project (FAB), has recently won the Community Best Practice Recognition Award 2017 at the Irish National Flood Forum Annual Conference.

FAB was established in the immediate aftermath of the disastrous flooding of November 2009, filling the void that existed between the municipal authorities and the community. Eight years on, the people behind the project continue to lobby for flood relief measures to be implemented in Ballinasloe.

"Much has been achieved in recent years with the support of local council officials, representatives and members of the local community, the current flood defence situation is far from ideal in some areas of the town" commented Frank Kavanagh, Vice-Chairperson of Flood Alleviation Ballinasloe.

Over the last eight years, FAB have engaged with a number of projects: The Ballinasloe Flood Relief Study, which was completed and launched in 2010; Derrymullen Flood Wall completed in record time by Brian Conneely's Building and Engineering Company in 2012. They made submissions and observations to the Ballinasloe Local Development Plan, 2015-2021.

In 2016 Irish National Flood Forum Conference in Ballinasloe and later that year their flood Insurance Survey 2016 was instrumental in dispelling the statistics given by the Insurance Industry to government regarding levels of flood insurance cover where flood schemes have been completed. It proved to be the key research piece, used by politicians to debate and secure the Flood Insurance Bill through its second stage in the Dáil in November 2016.

Most recently, Kevin "Boxer" Moran, Minister for the Office of Public Works and Flood Relief, presented FAB with the Community Best Practice Recognition Award. Chairperson Michael Tully accepted the award in the Shamrock Lodge Hotel, Athlone.

The current committee comprises: Michael Tully (Chairperson), Frank Kavanagh (Vice-Chairman), John Jordan (Secretary), Pat Harte (Treasurer), Brian Conneely, Mary Cunningham, Willie Devlin, Ann Jordan, Colm McCann, Anne-Marie McCormack, Josephine Goode and John Slattery.

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Cathal Cregg, originally from Boyle now living in Ballydangan, has taken to wordsmithing as he gets set to publish his first book this year. The acclaimed qualified stone cutter and food nutritionist, plans to hit the book world in the years to come.

Cathal's working career began by carving Celtic Crosses and hand-cut lettering after completing a stone cutting/carving apprenticeship in 1982.

hundreds of Euros for each given charity. Nowadays he plans to use his writing skills to raise money for people in need all over Ireland.

Cathal started writing poetry and short stories in 2015 and has become a skilled writer in doing so. His inspiration for writing comes from life itself, the people who he meets every day and conversations with others on a daily basis.

Despite all his hard work and training Cathal



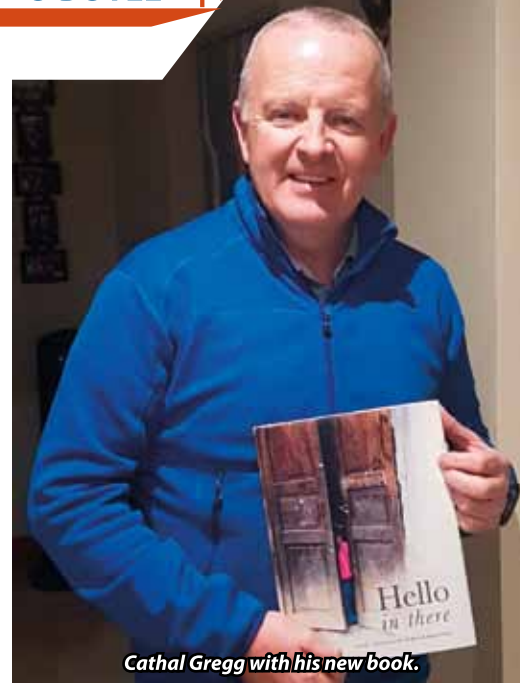

After a long cold winter, it is time to prepare to bring life back into the garden. The key aspects in any garden start from the ground up, if you haven't already then try setting up a compost area in your garden. This could simply

be a ready-made compost bin, or you could build a compost bin yourself. Not only will you have somewhere to put your garden waste, but your plants will benefit from the rich compost created when it all breaks down. To ensure the best results going into the summer months it is a good time to replace the old soil with new fresh compost.

Recycling last year's seed trays and pots is the perfect opportunity to get prepared for spring planting. February and March are a great time to start seeds such as geraniums, begonias and anthuriums. They'll need to be grown in a warm glass house or similar, to ensure good growth. To find out more about early seed propagation drop into your local garden centre. Roses are cherished by the Irish gardener. Now is the perfect time to prune rose bushes and repeat flowering climbing roses. This can be achieved by shortening back the shoots that flowered last year and removing old wood. Early pruning means early flowering. By adding pot ash and old farm yard manure to the soil around your roses, you can give them the extra nutrients to spur on their growth.

Early Spring is a great time to prune fruit trees and soft fruit bushes, well before sap begins to rise. Take care to shape the trees and bushes appropriately. Remove excessive branches to promote better sunlight and air circulation for

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BALLINASLOE WOMAN ELECTED CHAIR OF CIF

Ballinasloe's Tara Flynn has recently been named Chairperson of the Construction Industry Federation. Tara, from Creagh, has been actively involved in many aspects of the community, namely with Pdraig Pearses where he is currently the Minor Football Board Chairperson. She is also the current Vice-Chairperson of the Garbally College Parents' Association.

Tara started working with her father, Paul Flynn Snr. almost 25 years ago. Their company, Paul Flynn Construction, is very much a family run business with Paul Snr. emphasising traditional values in all dealings with clients. "Quality and integrity are the cornerstones to our reputation" Tara commented.

She has been an active and dedicated member for the Construction Industry Federation (CIF) for many years, having first gotten involved by attending the CIF Western region meetings in Galway. "I was elected Vice-Chair of the CIF Western Region in 2016, and most recently I was elected Chairperson" Tara detailed. 2016 also saw her elected on to the Master Builders' and Contractors' Association.

"I am truly humbled and honoured to be named the first lady Chairperson of the Western Region, and will do my very best for our members while I am in this role. We have such an array of competent builders and consultants, and one of my aims as chair is to increase our membership and attendance at our CIF meetings" she stated.

As Chair of the CIF, Tara has reflected on how construction companies in the west have struggled over recent years and the changes that have been prompted.

This is a time of recovery, but due to geography and other factors, this recovery seems to be happening at a slower pace

Now, nearly a half-century later, our company is also a leading figure in educational, commercial and fit-out sectors nationwide," she commented.

"At the recent CIF Annual Conference in Croke Park, one of the speakers, Mark Farmer of the UK's Cast Consultancy, did a presentation on how the construction industry must change and modernise to progress. This struck a chord with me, as I believe our industry has huge potential to adapt and innovate. We are constantly evolving and even though we are still in a very challenging and competitive market, we are making progress."

Construction in the west, however, has seen a recent pick up, which Tara notes. "Planning has recently been applied for on behalf of BACD for a factory on the IDA site, with the support of the Ballinasloe Credit Union Social Fund. I would be hopeful that this could attract investment from a major company, which in turn would create employment for the area. It could be a big project for the region."

"It's very encouraging to see there are a number of major projects coming on board to boost the Western region: NUIG are planning to build a 2nd phase of student accommodation and Knock Airport is to spend approximately €15 million between 2017-2019." The potential Apple data-centre in Athenry is another key player that Tara is hopeful for. "It was regrettable that they had objections, as they have invested heavily in this project. It would be a major game changer for the west of Ireland," she added.

Having recently attended the opening of the Gort-Tuam motorway, Tara is glad to see the continued linking of the west. "It's a major infrastructural spend for the area. I feel there is a need now to move on from this and try to connect Cork-

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Limerick-Galway-the North West. The more we can increase our connectivity, the more benefits-social and economic-we will see for the region. Ballinasloe has seen a number of benefits on the Dublin-Galway motorway, for example."

Moving closer to home, Tara has continued to be active with the Padraig Pearses GAA Club. The Senior Hurling side recently ended their 30 year championship drought. "It was absolutely amazing, and one of the most historic days in the recent history of the club. To win our first Senior Hurling title in thirty years brought such excitement to the club, its members, supporters and sponsors. It was a joy that we could finally bring home the Micky Cuniffe Cup to Woodmount."

As well as her role as Chairperson for CIF Galway, Tara is also a member of the newly-formed CIF diversity and inclusion working group "Building Equality." "Through this group, we hope throughout 2018 and beyond to promote careers in construction to all, and to change the common perception that our industry is male only. As the industry recovers and we have an increase in activity, we need more young people taking up trades and other careers in construction. The industry must respond to the increased demand for these skills. It's wonderful to see initiatives like those by Seamus Brady of Castle Ceilings who has created a traineeship programme that attracts people back into the industry" Tara added.

Technological advances as a key instrument in how the industry can improve, Tara feels, explaining "I believe very strongly that we need to take full advantage of technology such as Nzeb, Lean Construction and BIM as this is the way forward. This will become a major focus throughout 2018, and as such, the CIF Western region will host a seminar on nZEB in January to highlight the relevant information to its members."

It was a red letter for the parish of Aughrim, in East Galway, when their 150-year-old St. Catherine's Church was re-opened after fifteen months of renovation works, which resulted in a complete transformation of both the inside and outside, thanks to a huge input by local craftsmen, artists and the Pastoral Council.

At the Dedication ceremony by the Bishop of Clonfert, Dr. John Kirby, pride of place was given to members of the local Church of Ireland and their Rector, Rev. John Godfrey, who had kindly given their Holy Trinity Church to their neighbours for the Saturday evening mass and other religious ceremonies while works were carried out on St. Catherine's. Bishop Kirby said "The presence of Rev. John Godfrey along with some members of the Church of Ireland, and the exchange of plaques, is a noteworthy feature."

The Parish Priest, Fr. Gerry Geraghty, told the congregation "As we, the people of Aughrim, celebrate the re-opening of St. Catherine's Church, I hope and pray that this momentous occasion may be

one of great joy and sincere renewal in the parish community. As we re-open this Church today, we celebrate once more the joys and hopes of this community. We give thanks for the outstanding commitment shown by so many in the restoration project. Thanks to the many members of the Pastoral Council, past and present, whose vision and toil has brought us to this great day. St. Catherine's Church will proudly stand as a true sign of the faith and dedication of the people of Aughrim parish. I hope it will be a place of comfort and encouragement in our moments of grief and anguish and a place where we find a true home in all our joys and hopes."

He concluded by thanking the Church of Ireland community for their generosity in placing their church at their disposal, for the past fifteen months, while renovation works were ongoing. "It was a real ecumenical gesture and one we, hopefully, can reciprocate at some stage" said Fr. Geraghty. And at the end of the celebratory Mass, Fr.

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Geraghty and Rev. John Godfrey exchanged engraved plaques which marked the appreciation and cooperation that marked the historic event.



Tom Hannon, chairman of the Pastoral Council, welcomed chief celebrant, Bishop Kirby, priests from the neighbouring parishes and especially Rev. John Godfrey and members of the Church of Ireland community. He gave a brief description of the works carried out, paying special tribute to "a cohort of local talented artisans, volunteers and staff from the Community Involvement Scheme, too numerous to mention" He also

thanked contractors Paul Flynn Construction and Architect Gerry Dolan for their professionalism in executing the works.

The first project was the construction of an extension, on the northern side of the building, consisting of a boiler house, toilet with disability access and a new entrance porch. A new altar, ambo, chair and tabernacle, in Italian marble, which were created by Tony Dolphin, adorn the new sanctuary while the interior of the building is totally redecorated. There is a new lighting and sound system, gas central heating, while the stations of the cross were restored by Seamus Feerick and original seats have all been reinstated, looking like new.

The roof and interior walls are insulated while the stained glass window, featuring St. Catherine, looks down on a new redesigned and carpeted gallery that includes seats which were originally in the chapel at St. Brigid's Hospital in Ballinasloe. Outside trees were removed while paths and walkways were tarmacaded. Mr. Hannon said there are still some works outstanding but these would be done "in due course, budget allowing."

Concluding, Mr. Hannon said a "huge thanks to the parishioners, who contributed so generously to the second collection over a long period, which helped to provide finance for this extension and renovations as well as the continuous commitment and encouragement provided by our wonderful parish priest, Fr. Gerry Geraghty, which made all of this possible. We are eternally grateful to Rev. John Godfrey and his parishioners from the Church of Ireland for offering us the use of Holy Trinity Church while the works were being carried out. It has been a mutually enriching spiritual experience for everyone."

The works were financed by the parishoners through a second collection taken up at weekend masses, which started ten years ago, and the sale of Church land.

Afterwards Rev. John Godfrey told me how the Church of Ireland became involved, saying it was back in 2015 that Fr. Geraghty told him of the proposed renovation works in St. Catherine's. "I discussed the possibility of helping out with the Select Vestry of the Aughrim Parish Union, by offering the use of our church when works got under way and they were delighted to oblige. It was a milestone in ecumenical co-operation" he said.

When Fr. Geraghty decided to celebrate the first mass in Holy Trinity Church on Saturday evening, 6th August 2016, it was a historical event. Rev. Godfrey told the congregation "On behalf of everyone in Holy Trinity Church, the Aughrim and Ballinasloe Unions and the Bishop of Limerick, I'd like to offer you the warmest of welcomes here tonight. It's great to know that after years of planning and waiting that work is now under way on your Church."

The Rector said "Whether it's in your own home or in your parish church, getting the builders in is never an easy business-whatever way you look at it, there's a lot of upheaval. That's why I was delighted when Fr. Gerry suggested a way of keeping

that upheaval to a minimum by celebrating your Masses here in Holy Trinity, whilst the builders are in. It's great that you will be able to maintain your routine of prayer, here in the village, over the coming months. But more than that, I want you to know that you are doing a wonderful thing for the Church of Ireland community here, by allowing us to offer you this gesture of hospitality. It does our hearts a power of good to know that you are happy to come to us here. I wish you every blessing here over the coming months-but please know that it is we who are blessed by your presence."

Speaking at the Re-dedication ceremony, Rev. Godfrey quoted Bishop Kirby's words at the start of Mass, "May all our worship here be gathered into unity in the heavenly Jerusalem." He said "With those words in mind, I am deeply grateful to Fr. Gerry for his invitation to representatives of Holy Trinity Church and I to worship here with you today. It's great to see St. Catherine's Church looking so well, and to share in the excitement in coming home to your own church.

One of the wonderful by-products of this renovation project has been the simple gesture of hospitality offered and received, as you have been saying mass in Holy Trinity Church for over a year. That simple gesture done us all good: it has been a sign of Christian unity here. That's why we are delighted to be able to worship with you here in St. Catherine's, as a further sign of our unity for which we have all prayed today. I can't tell you how much good it did us to know that you, the living stones of St. Catherine's, were lighting up Holy Trinity with your prayers over the last while. It has been like having two churches beside the rectory here. Thank you for lighting up our church with the life of your church" concluded Rev. John Godfrey.

The Battle of Aughrim in 1691 was a fierce duel between the Williamites and the Jacobites but the last two years have seen an ecumenical movement in the locality that has cemented a greater friendship and understanding between the Catholic and Church of Ireland communities, which to say the least, is unique in rural Ireland.

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MONSIGNOR McHUGH CELEBRATES 50 YEARS OF PRIESTHOOD

A Taughmaconnell-born priest returned to his roots when he celebrated the Golden Jubilee of his ordination to the priesthood. For Monsignor Canon J. Daniel McHugh it was a nostalgic occasion as he celebrated masses in Curraghboy Church and St. Ronan's Church, Taughmaconnell which were attended by his sister Geraldine as well as cousins, friends and childhood acquaintances.

Monsignor McHugh hailed from Curraghboy, Taughmaconnell but went with his parents, James (Babe) and Geraldine, to live in England in the late 40's. He grew up in Coventry where he attended St. Osburg's Primary School in Keresley and then Bishop Ullathorne Grammar School. Having been ordained to the priesthood in the Holy Family Catholic Church in 1967, Fr. McHugh was later engaged by Mercia Sound Radio Station as a commentator for the Papal visit and Mass at Coventry Airport in 1982.

On 24th September last, parishioners, friends and family members joined 35 priests and Deacons to celebrate Monsignor McHugh's 50th Anniversary of his Ordination to the priesthood at a packed St. George and St. Theresa's Church in Dorridge, Coventry, where he had ministered for the past sixteen years. Right Rev. Robert Byrne, Auxiliary Bishop of Birmingham, was the chief celebrant of a Mass of Thanksgiving, assisted by Bishop Philip Pargeter as well as other clergy, many of whom had travelled from the Archdiocese of Birmingham. The Mayor of Solihull, Cllr. Stuart Davis and the Mayoress attended as well as the Knights and Dames of the Holy Sepulchre and the Order of St. Gregory while children from St.

George and St. Theresa's Primary School played a special part in the singing of the Mass.

The chairman of the Parish Council, Tony Taylor, thanked Monsignor McHugh for his sixteen years of service to the parish. Included in his achievements were he said "the erection of the Calvary Cross next to the Presbytery, the Parish Mission, Annual Pilgrimages, Support for the Parish School and a planned Baptistry." Afterwards the congregation joined in celebratory refreshments in the parish centre.

But Monsignor McHugh never forgot his roots. He always loved coming back to the Taughmaconnell area on holidays and had a strong bond with so many of his childhood friends. As well he was a frequent visitor to Our Lady's Shrine in Knock, to which he had a special devotion. Following the celebrations in Coventry, Monsignor McHugh decided to offer special masses in both Curraghboy Church and St. Ronan's Church, Taughmaconnell to celebrate his Golden Jubilee. His sister, Geraldine, travelled over for the festivities and was joined by cousins, friends and parishioners at the masses before retiring to McHugh's Tavern for refreshments and a big family reunion.

Then in the company of friends, Monsignor McHugh attended the opening of the October Fair in Ballinasloe-an event he first witnessed over seventy years ago-before returning to resume his ministerial duties in Coventry.

As part of the annual drive behind Ballinasloe Social Services to fundraise practically 50% of their care programmes running costs, they are hosting their bi-annual Boutique Pop-Up event on Saturday, February 24th from 10.00am to 5.00pm in the Emerald Ballroom. Items such as new clothes and unwanted gifts, which have been donated by the community, will be available for purchase.

Over 500 people attended the Boutique Pop-Up held in 2015 with over 50 volunteers also in attendance to stage and run the monster event. With thousands of donations from the community, the event raised over €6,000. All proceeds went to the "Meals on Wheels" service which delivers over 15,000 hot meals annually to recipients within the Ballinasloe and Hinterland area.

Social Services manager, Teresa Coughlan, said "The volunteers are the backbone of the organisation and they always help us fundraise much income." Teresa also expressed her thanks to the community as they received so many donations that many of them were donated to other local needy charities after the event.

According to the Health Service Executive's (HSE) Nursing Home Support Scheme the average weekly costs of care for an elderly person over the age of 65 is €1,354. Over 140 people within this bracket avail of the Ballinasloe Social Services with an average weekly budget of only €55 without taking into consideration that 40 children who also rely

on the service. The government through the HSE chiefly supplements 50% of the service's annual budget requirements of €400,000, with the rest of the money coming solely from fundraising. With an aging population in Ireland, these figures stress the significance of the service's volunteers and the impact that fundraising and community involvement must have on saving the tax payer considerable sums folks being able to live independent healthy lives with community support and focused intervention – provided by the Staff and Volunteers at the Social Services.

The Boutique Pop-Up event is one of the many fundraising events held throughout the year and Teresa is urging people to participate, stating "We rely so heavily each year on the confidence that we will fundraise enough money to accommodate for everyone that really needs our services. Most people are not aware of the amount of time and commitment that our volunteers devote to this cause and our numbers are truly significant for just one community."

At this year's event proceeds will primarily go towards renovating the day and dining rooms to accommodate for increasing users. These improved facilities will provide services in which the Town's older citizens can avail of a home away from home environment daily, giving carers a well-earned break.

Ballinasloe Social Services are now appealing for new/nearly new clothing, branded goods and unwanted gifts for this event. Donations can be dropped into its premises in Upper Brackernagh. For further details call the Centre on 090 9643217.

SADIE GOODE of Mountpleasant, who has died, was widow of the late Michael Goode, a former Rate Collector in the town. She was a niece of the late Bishop of Clonfert, Most Rev. Dr. Dignan.

Cllr. AIDAN DONOHUE, the current chairman of Ballinasloe Municipal Council, was a member of the Sarsfields 1972 Co. Senior Hurling Champions, who were feted by Galway GAA at the Co. Hurling Final in December.

TERESA MCCARTHY of Sarsfield Road whose death occurred, was predeceased by her husband Mike, who together with her late brother, Pat Hughes, were deeply involved

in the setting up of Tynagh Mines in the early sixties.

MATTIE KENNY, a former employee of Square D in Ballinasloe, is steering Dublin and Leinster hurling champions, Cuala, to an All-Ireland semi-final clash with Liam Mellows of Galway. The Abbey-Duniry native is manager of the Dublin side that won the All-Ireland club title for the first time last year and is assisted by ex-Galway player Greg Kennedy from Loughrea.

THE LATE GUS COLOHAN of Harbour Road was a life-long member of the Clonfert PTAA. He was an avid member of Comhaltas and won several trophies for traditional Irish step-dancing.

JOHN LEONARD from Kilmalaw, had the honour of turning the key for a viewing evening of Aughrim's New National School. The 93-year-old past pupil was joined by former principal, Jo Scannell, to celebrate the historic event. The school will be officially opened later this year.

DYMPNA DOOLEY, Ard Mhuire, Ballinasloe, who died in her 100th year, was the last surviving member of the Dooley Family of The Corner House, in Dunlo St., which was a well-known establishment for over one hundred years. She was predeceased by four sisters and five brothers.

AUGHRIM VILLAGE had over 10,000 lights illuminating the area for the Festive Season. It was over 2,000 more lights than last year, while the outdoor crib was a major attraction.

TIM SWEENEY of Fohenagh, who passed away at the age of 88, was captain of the Galway senior hurlers in 1961 when they defeated Clare in the Munster championship. He played a major part in Fohenagh's county championship victories of 1959 and 1960, being their top scorer. He was regarded as one of Galway's best-ever hurlers in the 1950's and early 60's.

AGNES HURLEY from Derrymullen, Ballinasloe is among a group of former schoolteachers that have volunteered for a five week trip to Gambia in West Africa where they will work with local teachers as part of the Catholic Education Secretariate.

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TAUGHMACONNELL N.S. TRIP TO CLONMACNOISE BY: ISABEL & RÓISÍN

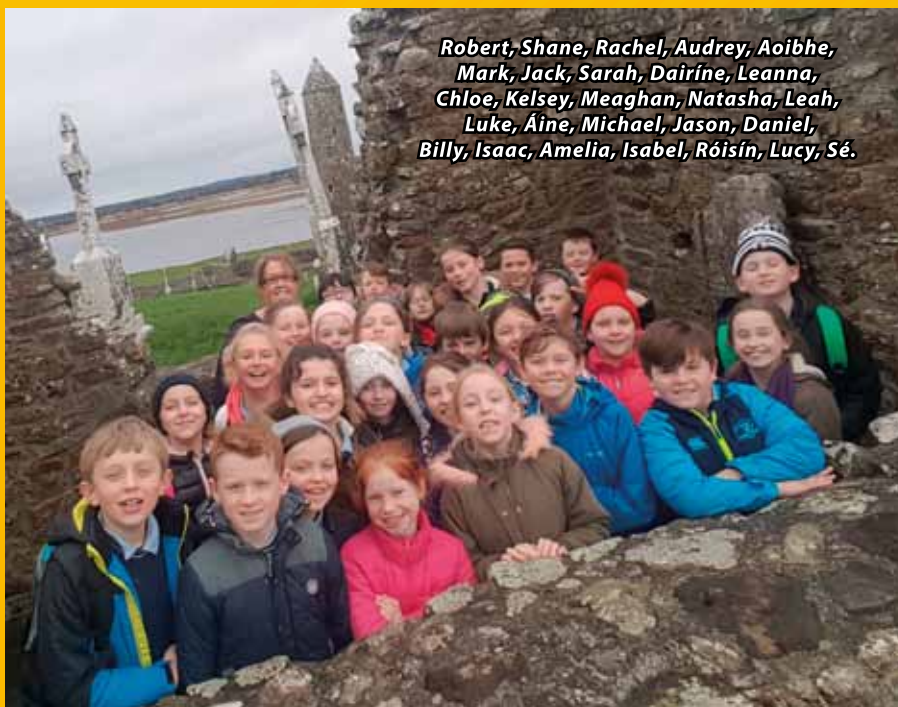
3rd and 4th Classes went to Clonmacnoise. It took us around 25 mins to get there. The bus trip was fun. We played games and sang songs.

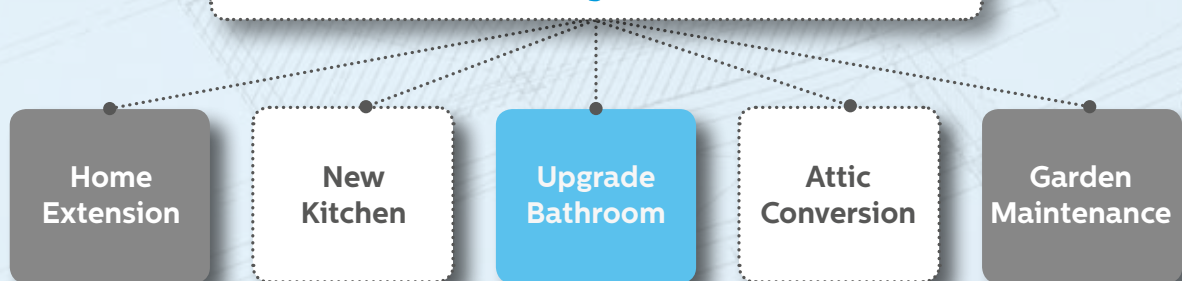

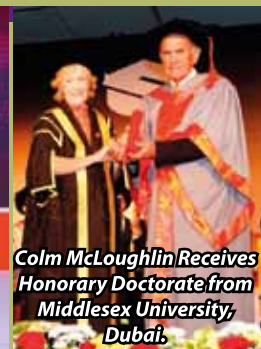

VERONA PARKER R.I.P. – KARIBA'S REAL BOSS!

I had never seen an entire street close down as a funeral passed by, until the saddest day last September when Verona was laid to rest. Kariba's Restaurant, where she worked for 12 years, closed its doors and as the funeral cortege stopped outside, her colleagues gave her a rousing round of applause. Businesses on the rest of Society Street drew their blinds and staff lined the pavement in tears.

I found myself laughing at how much I couldn't say about my aunt Verona, as I compiled this piece - Let's just say she had 'words at will', a 'very colourful' turn of phrase and a filthy laugh that is now legendary. My sisters and I imitate it all the time. Distinctly Verona.

I asked family and friends for just one word each to describe the woman who meant so much to all of us. Hilarious was the first response. Quick-witted. Vivacious. Fearless. Straight-talking. Anyone who knew her would agree. But also, Generous. Kind. Brave. Impatient. (Ah speed it up for F*ck Sake) was one of her frequently used phrases. Beautiful, memorable and a Legend.

Her colleagues in Kariba's described her as 'The Real Boss' of the restaurant. Owners John and Marian recalled many tales but one in particular of her kindness, and how "when there were still student boarders in Garbally College and they would sneak downtown after class, Verona would hide them from view, making sure they got extra

chips and any scones or Danish's that were left at the end of the day".

They added..."She called a 'spade a spade' and would put us, and sometimes the customers, in our box very quickly! That was Verona's way of doing things and then there was the Kariba's way of doing things, but we never interfered with her way as we loved her so much. She was an absolute treasure" stated John and Marian.

She was just 12 when I was born and she made no secret of the fact that my arrival was not welcome, taking over from her as I did, as the baby of the family and making her a very young auntie. As years went by the small age gap became a positive thing as we shared clothes and make up and had many nights out on the town.

Verona absolutely loved music and singing and spent years as a member of Ballinasloe Musical Society where she always sang louder and longer than everyone else. A party just wasn't a party without Verona. 'Don't cry for me Argentina' was one of her favourite party pieces as was Patsy Clines 'Crazy' and woe betide if you sang it too slow or in the wrong key!!!!

As a young teenager, spending time in her house, I remember her washing the kitchen floor, wearing high heels, using the mop as a microphone and singing loudly to Rod Stewart 'Do ya think I'm sexy'. What a cool auntie I thought she was. She loaned me that Rod album. I have it still.

Kariba's have honoured her years of loyalty and friendship with a framed photograph hanging proudly in the restaurant. So the 'Real Boss' can still keep an eye on things and we can have a coffee and still see her there behind the counter. Our world is a sadder place without Verona but Heaven is having all the craic.

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The Oat Gallery Bookstore on Bridge Street is a gateway to many worlds of fantasy and adventure. However, there are also links to Ballinasloe's past in the form of photo albums with photos of the Gallery Players, a former theatre group in the previous building, are a reminder of the shop's history.

Micheál Breathnach, the long-term owner of the store, was involved with the Gallery Players and maintains many photo albums, highlighting their productions and performances. The theatre in the upstairs of the store had long been used by different theatre groups.


"We started in 1992, in the theatre upstairs" Micheál explained, "Our first play in August that year was the Irish Hebrew Lesson." Michael's involvement came by accident-Barry Lally and Declan Kelly were looking to put on a play and asked if Michael would be interested. "I asked them where would they stage it, and they said 'well that's why we asked if you'd be interested!'"

Their plays were directed and performed by Ballinasloe locals. Thomas Kilduff (RIP), Barry Lally, Paul Hughes, Mary Fahy and Micheál himself all got chances to direct performances over the five years the group were active.

The Gallery Players got to travel across Ireland with their productions, bringing their plays to a larger audience. "In 1994, we brought 'The Pot of Broth' by WB Yeats, to the Aran Islands. We performed in Irish, after Barry Lally translated the script. It was 'An Pota Anraith' when we staged it," Micheál commented. "We were invited by the County Arts Officer at the time to Inisbofin for an Arts Festival. We all had a fantastic time."

In 1994, the Gallery Players performed their "Gaol Gate" weekend. They produced three plays for the weekend - "The Gaol Gate", "Home Burial"

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and "Riders to the Sea". The three shows, each directed by a different person, over such a short amount of time illustrated the talent in the group. While performing "Riders of the Sea", the cast realised the issue of using seaweed. "By the end of the run, the seaweed we used as a prop smelled like a corpse! It added some realism to the play, by God it was awful" Micheál recounted.

The Players' production of Tarry Flynn was especially memorable for Micheál. "We ran that play for a month" he commented, "and every night, the audience would be from all parts of Ireland. People from all over came to see it." During the run of Tarry Flynn, Garth Brooks played in Ireland for the first time, performing at the Point. "After the first five nights, we decided to do the next weekend, and we joked that people were swapping Gareth Brooks tickets for Tarry Flynn tickets!"

A special part of the memories, Micheál regarded, was how enjoyable their performances were. "There were times where we broke from the script and had to improvise our way back, sometimes when we couldn't help but laugh with the audience, we were just having so much fun.

When we produced "Anybody Can Rob a Bank", we must have staged a different show every night! It was brilliant to be a part of."

Looking through the photographs, Micheál remembers each face fondly. Though not everybody involved is still with us, their stories are immortalised in the album. He is happy to recount his experiences and memories of the Gallery Players and the laughs they had over their active years.

A key occasion, he mentioned, was one of their outdoor productions – the "Queen of the Fair Bullocks." In this theatre-meets-reality piece, the Gallery Players usurped the then Queen of the October Fair, thus crowning the late Thomas Kilduff as the new Queen.

Though the theatre group has been dormant for almost 20 years, the memories and photographs sustain it. The group fed into the continuation of the performing arts tradition in the locale. Micheál continues to run the Oat Gallery Bookstore on Bridge Street, where he is always open for a cup of coffee and a chat.

With Sports Capital Funding secured for the building of a new All-Weather training facility the inclement weather and pitch maintenance problems will hopefully become a thing of the past for the local Rugby Club.

The season is coming into its final half, and despite the weather's best attempts to spoil matters, most of Ballinasloe RFC youth teams are still heavily involved at the top end of the league tables-a tremendous testament to the dedicated coaches, players and parents.

The adverse weather does however put pressure on the playing pitches. With home league quarter-finals and semi-finals coming up, pitches need to be minded for the all important matches. This puts pressure on training schedules whilst trying to protect the pitches, but still trying to find suitable space to train on. With all

these issues arising, the club's committee have been emphasising the need for an all-weather surface training area in the clubs grounds, or anywhere nearby.

Having secured Sports Capital Funding recently for this sole purpose, it is hoped that works will commence at the end of this season on the construction of a new 65m x 30m 3G All-weather pitch, which will hopefully be ready for the start on the new 2018 / 2019 season in September. "This new surface won't deteriorate under any condition, so that the late text on a Wednesday evening cancelling training because the pitches are unavailable will be a thing of the past" according to P.R.O. Declan Murphy.

The Sports Capital Funding will only go so far and so the Club has commenced a series of fund-raising events which it hopes will be well supported by both members of the club, supporters and the local people.

Recently, the Connacht Squad visited Ballinasloe and carried out an impromptu training session for the students of Garbally College and Ard Scoil Mhuire. A number of players also visited the three local primary schools which proved a huge hit.

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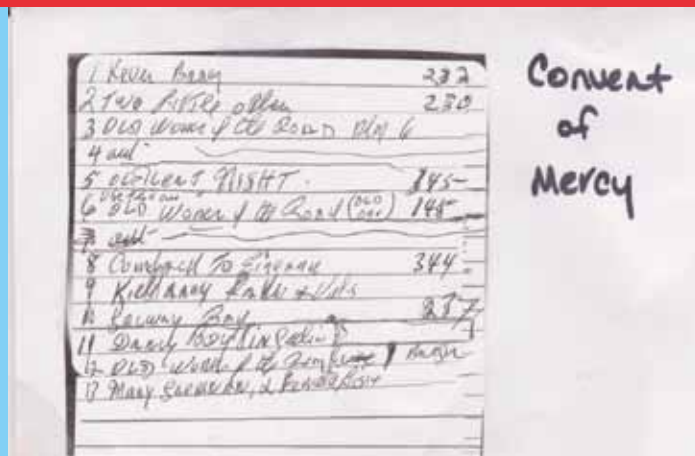
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SEARCH FOR CONVENT CHOIR PUPILS OF YESTERYEAR

Martin, originally from Clontuskert but lived in New Jersey, USA, was

an accomplished fiddler and host to his own radio programme "The Irish Roadshow." On his travels, he recorded many CDs, many of which he brought back to America and have never been heard locally.

Martin, who passed away in March 2014, took great pride in his music collection and often referred to it as the greatest library of Irish music and songs in the world. His daughter, Máiread remembered "He spoke of the many trips he took back to Ireland to record the fabulous sessions. My family often listen to the CDs he made over the years and we love to hear his voice when he introduces the songs" she added. "He came a long way from recordings in pubs, from reel to reels to albums to cassettes and ultimately CDs both on the radio and then what would have seemed impossible when he started out."

While researching material for a second recording, featuring material from Martin Costello's vast archive, including material played by local musician the late Pat Corbett, Enda Creavan (Creagh) obtained a number of CDs from Mairead, one of which was a recording of the local Convent of Mercy School Choir. This material is undated and there is no further information other than the track listings.

Enda is hoping to track down the members of the choir to find out more about the recording. "This music has never been heard here before as it was brought to America after recording" stated Enda. "I feel it is very important to archive this music as it is an important part of our local history."

The recording features the songs: Kevin Barry, Two Little Orphans, An Old Woman Of The Road, Come

A Ballinasloe archery enthusiast representing NUIG competed in the Archery Indoor World Cup in Nimes, France at the end of January. It was a dream come through for 21-year-old Christopher Riddell, who is a third year chemistry student at NUI, Galway. With a personal best score of 524/600, Christopher was the second best placed Irish senior and is now ranked 120th in the world. His aim now is to make the Irish team next season.

Christopher who is son of Robert and Finola Riddell, got involved in the sport in his first year in the Galway College and is now Vice-captain of the archery club there. His coach Joe Gill studied under one of the top archery coaches in the world, Korean Kim Hyung Tak and has been instrumental in Christopher's achievements to date. Competing in the Irish National Open, the Ballinasloe man qualified 13th in the individual rankings winning his first head-to-head match but lost out eventually to the silver winner.

Together with fellow students Mark Walsh and Josh Coughlan, they defeated Rebel County Archery Club in the team section as well as the Irish team packed Wicklow Club before finally losing out to the Dublin Archers trio. However the Galway side were awarded silver medals in the National Recurve male team event. After this Christopher was part of the student inter-varsities team that won 2nd place mixed team in the first IV and was 10 points short of contributing to another second place mixed team in the second IV.

"It was a wonderful experience competing at Nimes where the best archers in the world, including the World Champion and Olympic Gold Medalist were taking part. The competition was tough with each archer shooting 60 arrows to qualify for the final 32, battling it out for the medals" said Christopher, who will now be shooting for the rest of the student league and then the student nationals where he hopes to be placed highly in the rankings.

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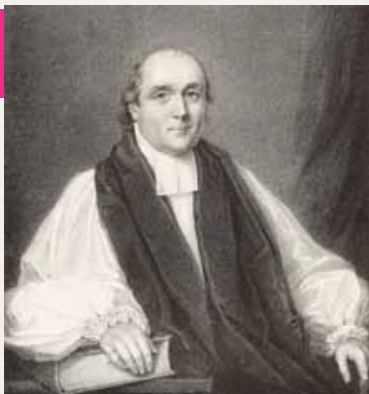
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ARCHBISHOP TRENCH

Power Le Poer Trench was born on 10th June 1770 in Sackville (now O'Connell) Street, Dublin, one of the nineteen children of William Trench of Garbally, later First Earl of Clancarty. He entered Trinity College in 1787

where it was said that he was "more addicted to country amusements and social intercourse than to the acquisition of learning". Nevertheless, despite his apparent lack of application to his studies, he received his B.A. degree in 1791 and took holy orders the following year.

Appointed curate to the parish of Creagh, he took up residence there, acting as his father's agent and as a captain of yeomanry. In the latter capacity he scoured the country day and night for rebels, though many were saved from the gallows by his intervention. He combined in a "remarkable manner the athlete, man of business, and devoted minister", riding, as late as 1820, at the head of detachments of dragoons against Whiteboys and Ribbonmen.

Consecrated bishop of Waterford and Lismore in 1802, two years later Trench was translated to the diocese of Elphin, and in 1819 he advanced to the archiepiscopal see of Tuam.

Towards the close of the 18th century the Methodist principles of John Wesley began to exert a profound influence on many clergy within the ranks of the Church of Ireland, and these became known as Evangelicals. They believed in a literal interpretation of the Bible and advocated a revival of piety and zeal, as well as an active missionary policy directed at people who were not members of the Established Church. What this amounted to in practice was a vigorous campaign of proselytising involving the commissioning of itinerant preachers, the circulating of scriptural texts and engaging the Roman Catholic clergy in polemics.

Initially opposed to Evangelicalism, Trench eventually changed his views and became one of the movement's most enthusiastic exponents. He appointed young clergymen who were burning with fervour to convert Catholics to the Church of Ireland faith,

and, relying largely on donations from English dioceses, managed to increase the number of resident clergy and build new churches in the west of Ireland. Needless to say, all this activity met with a frosty reception in the Catholic community, prompting the folk poet Anthony Raftery to compose a bizarre comment in Gaelic verse.

Trench supported preaching in the Irish language in the hope of communicating better with the local population. He at first declared that after 1832 he would ordain only men who could speak Irish; when that proved impracticable, he proposed unsuccessfully that a college should be set up in Tuam where clergy could learn oral skills in Irish. Having campaigned to have a chair of Irish established in the divinity school at Trinity, his advocacy bore fruit when a professor of Irish was appointed there in 1840.

The Archbishop was an exceptionally charitable man with a social conscience. During the famine of 1822 he toured Mayo and Galway reporting starvation deaths and nettle-eating and urging immediate help "lest thousands die of actual hunger". He obtained relief funds of over £26,000 between June and August which he quickly distributed to the needy. Rising every day at 4.00 a.m., he personally visited poor households to bring food, some of which was provided from his own resources.

Not slow to give expression to their gratitude, the recipients of his benevolence "discovered that it was the purpose of the Archbishop's steward to begin reaping his grace's cornfields, then ready for the sickle, on a particular morning. They resolved to anticipate the appointed reapers. When the steward arrived with his own labourers, he was met with an immense concourse, all supplied with reaping-hooks, marshalled under several overseers elected by themselves, and preceded by a piper, who headed the procession. They instantly set to work, and with hearty goodwill cut down and stooked all the corn in an inconceivably short time, not suffering the steward or the men he had engaged to interfere".

However, Trench's charity and social conscience seemingly did not always apply in his dealings with particular individuals. Henry Stratford Persse, a great-granduncle of Lady Gregory, in a letter dated 7th April 1822 from Galway City to three of his sons who had emigrated to upstate New York, described the pitiful plight of a curate who had been ejected from his parish – for what reason is not known – by the Archbishop: "Doctor Coffey and his family are

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in great distress. They have pledged all their things and are really at the last stage of want. What are we to expect from relations after this? What, the Archbishop of Tuam, a cousin german with an income of £20,000 a year and livings in his gift of thirty or forty thousand more, lets his cousin german starve in Galway after taking from him his curacy of £300 per year that he enjoyed before his grace got the archbishopric of Tuam! Recollect this always as another proof of the indifference of relatives and also think of the inhumanity that makes poor Coffey now poor and in want because the relation was removed and the stranger filled his place”.

Implacably opposed to non-denominational, secular education, particularly the proposed national school system, Trench declared in 1829 that “no education is better than one not founded upon the sacred

word of God”.

A man endowed with considerable personal charm and one of the foremost figures in the Ireland of his day, Trench never allowed his religious views to colour his relations with individual Catholics, amongst whom he enjoyed popularity to a remarkable degree. His charm, however, availed him nought with King George IV whose enmity he incurred by opposing his majesty’s attempt to divorce Queen Caroline.

Power Le Poer Trench, the last Church of Ireland Archbishop of Tuam, contracted typhoid fever, dying at his residence in Tuam on 26th March 1839. Interment was in the family crypt at Creagh Cemetery. During his final illness he was attended by, amongst others, Dr. Colohan of Ballinasloe, whose consulting rooms were in Main Street.

COULD BALLINASLOE SHOW BE THE OLDEST OF ITS KIND IN IRELAND?

Anthony Grenham from Ballydangan is a collector of vintage and antique items and is always on the lookout for old items, particularly ones of a local interest

In his search, Anthony has recently come across a real gem linked to the Ballinasloe Show with a prize medal, presented 202 years ago by the Farming Society of Ireland, to a Thomas Going Esq. for the best half-bred heifer exhibited at the Ballinasloe Show in October 1816. The Farming Society of Ireland held its shows both in Garvey’s yard in Ballinasloe and in Smithfield in Dublin and its presence in Ballinasloe is marked by an inscribed door lintel which is still in place on a wall just off Main Street.

What makes this find even more special is that until now the Ballinasloe Show was credited with having a start date of 1839 however this medal now proves that the Ballinasloe Show was in existence in 1816.

In addition the Iverk Show, held every August in the Showgrounds in Piltown, Co. Kilkenny, credited with having a start date of 1826, has long claimed the title of being “Ireland’s Oldest Agricultural Show”- a show that attracts crowds in excess of 20,000.

Could Ballinasloe claim this title and rejuvenate our show to mirror its former self whereby local farmers exhibited animals and livestock of the highest quality, local housewives displayed their delicious baking and splendid needlework, and who could forget the fabulous garden produce grown and displayed by locals such as Tom Quinn and the late Charlie Soden???





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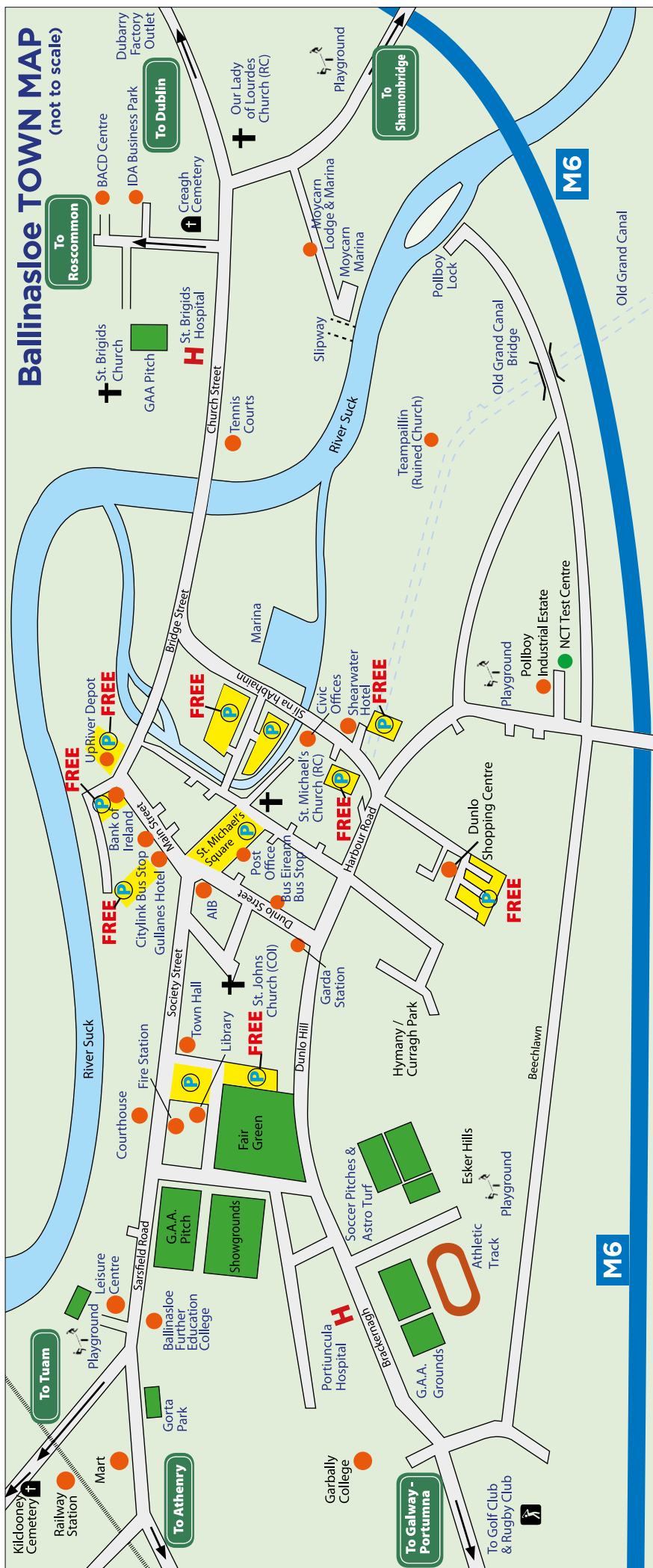
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Ballinasloe History Walk

1 – Start at the statue known as *The Man with the Horse*, where Main Street joins St. Michael's Square. From the crossing near the statue, continue by turning right onto Main Street. The prosperity of Ballinasloe in Georgian times can be seen in the scale and classical style of the buildings here. A fine group of four frontages stand across from the statue of The Man with the Horse. With shops and pubs on the ground floor for the most part, these Main Street premises have several floors above.

2 – Walking along Main Street, lift your eyes above the shop frontages for one of the town's characteristic sights. There are the Diocletian windows that grace several facades. They are from the years after 1805 when the 2nd Earl was in charge. A window of this sort is formed under a semi-circular arch with two upright divisions so that the whole opening is divided into three parts.

3 – As you stand at the meeting point of Bridge Street and Main Street, you will see the Victorian frontage of a commercial premises, originally the Masonic Hall. Next to it stands a classical looking, beautifully-crafted, early 19th century stone house, currently a guest house. Beside these is a tall, fine stone-fronted classical mansion, which is now the Bank of Ireland. It was originally the town mansion of the Lord of all of Ballinasloe, the Earl of Clancarty. A friend of king George IV, the Earl was one of the architects of the resistance to the emperor Napoleon. It could be said that he was the person to whom most credit is due for the layout, growth and architectural character of Ballinasloe as we see it today.

4 – At the end of Main Street, head along Bridge Street, then turn to the right to the pathway which runs to the riverscape where you can see channels flowing through the several arches of the long stone bridge over the river Suck, one of the town's most precious monuments. The Bridge has been in continuous use since the 16th century and its extension in 1754 prepared it structurally to carry even the heaviest juggernauts of today.

5 – Walk through to the far end of the park; you will approach St Michael's Church (1852-58) that stands in a commanding position over the Square. Its architect was J.J. McCarthy, a follower of Augustus Pugin (famed for other Neo-Gothic churches in Ireland) – and the design is said to have been revised by Pugin himself. Inside are many fine stained glass window. Of particular quality are those of St. Patrick and St. Rose of Lima, of 1925, by the renowned Dublin Stained glass artist, Harry Clarke and The Raising of the daughter of Jairus by Patrick Pollen, inserted in 1958.

6 – From St. Michael's Church now walk up St. Michael's Square back towards the Man with the Horse Statue. Take a left into Dunlo Street, an important street in the history of the town, which contains, together with other buildings of about the same date, the late-Georgian Garda Station. The Station is towards the far end of the street, on the right hand side. Also on this street, over Dolan's Electrical Shop, you can see another fine example of Diocletian windows.

7 – Halfway up Dunlo Street, turn right up Duggan Street, which will take you to St. John's Church (Church of Ireland, 1843). It dominates the vast Fair Green which becomes a hive of activity during one week every year when up to 100,000 people throng to the October fair. Look out over the Fair Green and admire one of the grandest freestanding classical monuments in the region. Dedicated to Charles Le Poer Trench, it was designed in the Neo-Greek style by the English architect George Papworth (1781-1855). A mile past this monument on the Main Galway road, South West of the town, the Earl of Clancarty's former country house is situated, where imposing gates mark the entrance to Garbally Court. It has been a school since 1923.

Walk down Church Hill onto Society Street and turn left, arriving at the Courthouse on the right. Society Street, like Main Street, was the 19th century location for the professional classes. As well as The Courthouse, it contains the former Bridewell (or gaol) from the 1840s. Further along this street, Ballinasloe Railway Station is a must. Constructed in 1851, it is a Neo-Gothic limestone tour-de-force and a fine example of the quality of rural Irish railway architecture in the mid-19th century.



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
