The legal dispute over the delivery of the Town Centre Big Dig further embittered already fraught relationships between town and county. 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BIG DIG PROGRESS ADVANCING SLOWLY BY DONOGH MOORE



It is Phase One works that have been taking place on Society Street, and since the area between the central Junction and Church Hill has been reopened, works have now progressed further up the street, from Church Hill to the car park beside the convent. Having undergone a full road closure, Society Street will reopen once the above works are done, which is scheduled to be in May. Works will continue between the car park and Sarsfield Drive, with the road operating under a single lane arrangement, in other words a staggered one way system.

St. Michael's Square will undergo a period of resurfacing, with one side of the square closed at a time. These works are aimed for completion by mid-April. Phase Three works are due to commence on Dunlo Street's parking bays and footpaths from mid-April onwards, and these will finish up in time for Society Street's reopening.

The Ballinasloe Municipal District Council was briefed on the current status of the ongoing works in the town recently. Ciaran McAlary, of Ryan Hanley Civil and Structural Engineers, updated the present councillors on when this phase of the Town Enhancement Scheme, which are currently taking place on Society Street and rendering it impassable, and the St. Michael's Square works will cease.

Phase One and Two of the works include all below ground work such as the laying of new sewers, surface water pipes, watermains and some ductwork. Phase Three includes the construction of new footpaths and street works, together with new street furniture, signage, lighting and trees.

Following the reopening of Society Street and the completion of these works, a full road closure will be enacted on Dunlo Street, to facilitate further Phase Three works. However, pedestrian access will be available throughout. Phase Three works will continue on Main Street and Society Street throughout the remainder of the year, and moving into April and May of 2020.

It is inevitable that a degree of disruption to will be caused by the Phase 3 works, however the project team are committed to minimising the inconvenience caused at all times. The aim of these works are to deliver a project which the business and community in Ballinasloe can be proud of for many years to come.

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FLOOD RELIEF PROJECT WORTH €8.6M SET TO COMMENCE

Consultant engineers are set to be appointed to the Ballinasloe Flood Relief project, Denis Naughten TD has recently confirmed. This project, which will see an investment of over €8.6 million being allocated to the town, sees a myriad of construction and development works take place, all with the intention of preventing the town from flooding in the future.

The proposed works under consideration by the engineering team to protect the town include the construction of 530 metres of new flood defence walls, alongside over five kilometres of flood defence embankments and a demountable flood gate. As well as that, construction will take place of two new six metre-wide flood alleviation arch culverts at Ballinasloe East Bridge. Works will also commence on the riverbank both upstream and downstream of the bridge to 35.5 metres to maximize the efficiency of the flood alleviation culverts. Two separate Lock Gates are also set to be constructed across the Canal, and a sluice gate across the channel, which will flow into the marina from the canal will be built.

Under this same scheme, more upgrades are to be applied to existing infrastructure, alongside the new construction taking place in the town. Upgrades are to occur on existing culverts which will see them widen to a two metre diameter, allowing for more water to pass through them. The existing Kilclooney Road Bridge on the River Deerpark will also be upgraded to comply with Flood Alleviation regulations. The riverbed both upstream and downstream of this bridge will have works done to it, all with the intention of maximising the efficiency of the upgraded bridge. Finally, maintenance works of the west and east channels will occur, to ensure their full capacity can and will be utilised in the event of a flooding emergency.

The announcement of these works builds on the investment of over €400,000, which has already been allocated in conjunction with Minister Sean Canney, the former Minister of State at Office of Public Works and Flood Relief, for flood relief measures in Ballinasloe, South Roscommon and East Galway.

Deputy Naughten added: "To complement the flood measures to date and those planned for the local area, work is ongoing on the River Shannon itself, south of where it meets the River Suck, to remove blockages in the flow of the river that have a direct impact on flooding south of the town."

"Other projects throughout County Roscommon & East Galway are currently under consideration and further measures will take place along the River Shannon over the coming months which will have a direct impact on flooding problems along the River Suck and River Shannon."

A representative from the state body Office of Public Works also gave a presentation at a recent Municipal District of Ballinasloe meeting, held in the local County Offices, where technical details were presented to present local councillors.

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PER CAPITA SPEND ON TOWN CITIZENS DECREASED MORE THAN NATIONAL SHORTFALL IN 7 YEARS BY C CROFFY

There are lies, damned lies, and then statistics as the saying goes, and it's difficult to compare the monies being spent on our town from Municipal Sources when we had a rating authority – the Urban District Council and Municipal District Council – but based on public documents, the CSO and official statistics and minutes of various reports and meetings, the LIFE team have extrapolated some facts that may assist in forthcoming debates for local elections.

There is a view within the community that the level of investment being spent from recurrent resources – (not the capital works that were funded by the prudent management of the old urban, from landfill receipts and handed over to the County in 2014) – has been severely depleted.

The way budgets are presented and passed are completely different from the methods used when the town had its own Urban, and the headings or cost centres have since changed i.e. there is no cost centre for Water Services anymore (handled by Irish Water) and no costs pertaining to Development and Planning (all done centrally).

Secondly the presentation of budget in this county does not break down income according to Town or Municipal Districts, so it's very difficult to examine in detail the state of rates, unrecoverable rates, and property tax per annum. It's impossible from public data to get evidence of loss of revenue from on-street parking during the big dig as there are no receipt figures for the preceding years.

A lot of services are provided centrally from Council, with costs apportioned across the 5 municipal districts – there does not appear to be a per-capita or per-rateable business threshold for that allocation. Finally the elephant in the room is the way County Councils have to allocate their non-national road schemes, repairs, constructs to their municipal district based on the kilometres of roadway in each area.

Take Loughrea Municipal District budget in 2019; €7.4m – up from €5.7m with some €5 million of this for roads. What the roads figure does is cloak the resource depletion, so one can quickly look at a total spend of €3.95 of the old Urban and €4.7 million of the new Municipal District in 2013 and 2018, up a total of 19% and another 20% to €5.7 million in 2019, and argue that in GROSS cash terms more is being spent, but when one digs a little deeper it's shocking – what has been axed.

When the Urban passed its last budget in 2013, it didn't have the full payment of local property tax. The CSO tells us (2011 and 2016 counted the Town Urban Area, not Municipal District) we have about 2,800 residential dwellings. Based on the average cost of sales of house in the locale for 2018 – the average band would be €315 per house – a cool €880,000 (80% of this tax is maintained locally). This is on top of water charges and refuse costs, and last summer Councillors had to use notice of motion funds to restore a grass cutting/estate maintenance service! Rates based on the 2013 Budget and increases since then should be in the order of €2.1million. In effect, the local businesses and local residents are contributing some €3 million towards the annual costs of Galway County Council.

From what can be seen from the 2019 Budget – some €603,573 is being spent Directly on the District but undoubtedly there are shared county wide resources – like Fire Service, Library Service, Heritage Service, Community and Enterprise Services, Insurances, Salaries and Wages to be added on top of this figure.

The commercial rate for the County can only be

increased once the rate for the former Town Council area has achieved parity (part of the merger negotiations). This rate currently stands at €66.59 which is unchanged since 2009, and the Ballinasloe rate is €61.00 which is being merged slowly since 2016, but prior to that had been unchanged since 2008. The local Rate will be the same as Galway in 2020, according to forecasts. For comparison – Ballinasloe €61; Galway County €66.59; Roscommon €71.44; Mayo €73.92; Clare €72.99.

A final consideration is that overall Galway has been faring disastrously in national allocations, once from the Car Tax but now the Equalisation Fund (The Residential Taxes). In 2008 the County Budget was at €160m – in the last decade reducing every year, and in 2018 stood at 30% less at €112m. This savage cutback has put – to be fair to the local authority – huge limitations on services, staff, discretionary funding etc. etc.

The amount approved by the District Council for Investment in



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Economic Development and Promotion for 2019 is €7,690 which represents 2% of the County's total spend of €400,000 for 2019!

From our crude and perhaps overtly simplistic analysis of the figures – removing the Road Expenditures and dividing the money allocated to the other cost centres - Town Citizens had a total amount of €2,777,683 spent on the town which equated to €417 per capita in 2013. Doing the same maths against the Municipal District Council area of 26,100 persons, with a Budget of €5,868,704 the average is €29 per capita in 2019. It is a long way off a 30% reduction!

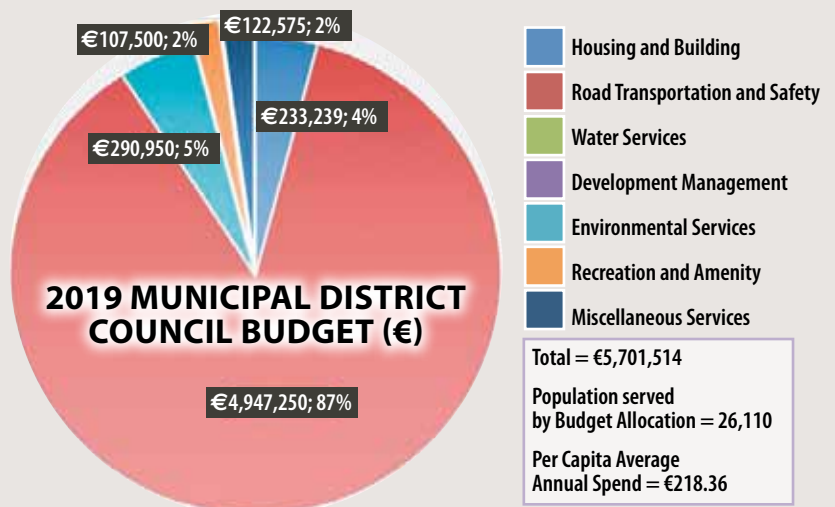
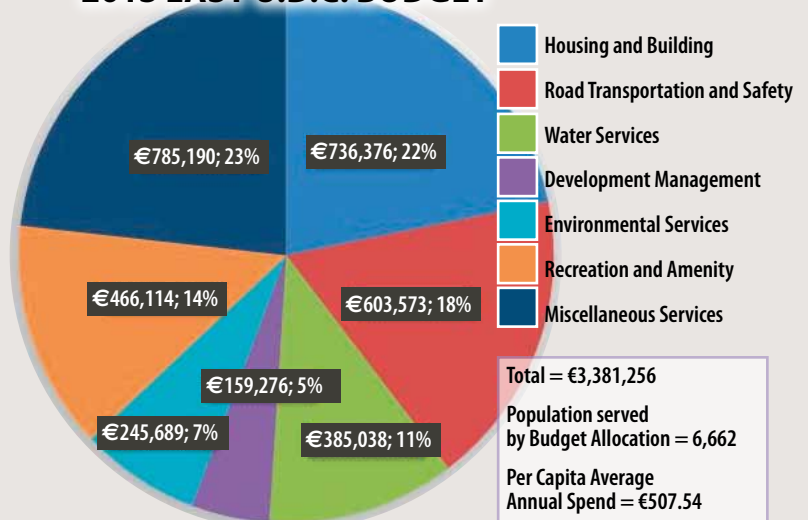
The Municipal Districts concept has not been kind to former Urbans all over the country. The above (and accompanying graphs) would suggest that we have slept walked through a raiding of our larder, but strangely it is the elected Councillors that have the statutory duty to pass the budget annually. It is one of their only three functions in the administration of local government; Elect the Mayor or Cathaoirleach, Amend/Adopt the Annual Budget and Approve the Development Plan for the County or Area Action Plan. Everything else we will read in the flyers is eye candy.

We cannot blame officials for the adoption of budget, but by law it is only the members elected that have the power to determine where the money, raised locally is spent within the country.

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FORMER POLL TOPPER JOHNNY WALSH NOT CONTESTING LOCALS

Former Mayor of Ballinasloe Johnny Walsh's name will not appear on a ballot paper for the first time in 20 years as he will not be contesting the May local elections due to family commitments.

Current Labour Party activist Johnny stated that it was an extremely difficult decision to make not to contest the local elections on this occasion. "Local politics is an ongoing huge interest and indeed passion of mine but after some reflection, I came to the decision that I simply could not devote the necessary time to an extensive election campaign given my family commitments".

He was expected to put in a very determined bid to secure a seat, given the fact that on a very bad day for the Labour Party locally and nationally, he had received a very credible 670 number 1s in the 2014 County Council elections and could have seriously challenged for a seat with around 180 more votes. Johnny is currently a member of the National Central Council of the Labour Party and had gained considerable political experience while working for a few years as an Oireachtas assistant.

He was elected on 3 successive occasions to the former Ballinasloe Town Council and served on the Council for 15 years, topping the poll in 1999 and never out of the top 3 in subsequent elections.

Since the abolition of Town Councils in 2014, Johnny has been involved in an extensive campaign at national level to reintroduce Town Councils to every Town with a population of 5,000 plus. This has resulted in the Labour Party introducing a Bill which has passed 1st and 2nd stages with all political parties and groupings supporting the Bill except naturally the Fine Gael and government supporting independent deputies.

Labour Party Leader Brendan Howlin will be introducing it at 3rd stage (Oireachtas Committee level) in the next few weeks and it's anticipated that the Government TDs

will now come on board and support the bill or at the very least will not obstruct or delay its passage through the final stages to ensure it becomes law.

Johnny believes that Restoration of Town Councils will be a big talking point in the forthcoming local and European elections and has called on all candidates to express support for and actively campaign for support of the bill through the Oireachtas.

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ROLLOUT OF NEW BROADBAND SCHEMES

Two crucial internet service providers, Eir and Imagine, have announced plans to invest in the Ballinasloe town and surrounding areas' broadband services.

Eir first announced their plans to bring fibre internet connections to every single premises in the town in the first wave of a new ambitious plan. This is set to provide speeds of up to 10,000 megabytes per second for local businesses. Eir also announced that they will eventually roll out the same initiative to all other towns in the country, with a population over 1,000 inhabitants, over the next four years.

Imagine, a direct competitor to Eir, are also to bring wireless broadband to the town. This new scheme will see Ballinasloe have 5G coverage throughout the urban and rural surrounding areas, with speeds of up to 150 megabytes per second. These services will be brought to the four telecommunications masts that surround the area, meaning that nearby communities, such as Castlegar Ahascragh, Redmount Hill, Eyrecourt, Killbegley and Cappataggle will all benefit from the new investment also.

The news of these new investments to the town only further grows the platform that the town is a more than suitable candidate for "hotdesking" and remote work. "Hotdesking" is the practice of using desks on a rota, rather than having one's own desk, and the town has a myriad of spaces that could be used in this capacity.

Independent TD for Roscommon-Galway, Denis Naughten lauded the implementation of faster internet speeds, and spoke of the town's future as a business hub. "All of this investment now complements the new digital hub that has been developed on the top floor of the Library on Society Street which makes Ballinasloe far more attractive for new job creation in the digital economy".

Some of the origins of the schemes now being rolled out, occurred in the early months of Denis's stint in the Department of Communications and Climate Change.

Senator Maura Hopkins commented that "This rollout will see intervention in communities right across Roscommon-Galway with areas such as Ballinasloe Town and Mountbellew being included. Given this 5G service does not require the installation of fibre cable, it will provide a much higher standard of connection to rural communities outside of our towns and villages."

5G internet connections are the successor to the current 4G services available around most of the country, which means that Ballinasloe will be at the forefront in terms of the technological services it can offer potential entrepreneurs and businesspeople alike. Senator Hopkins further mentioned that "This commercial rollout, which is separate to the National Broadband Plan will see 155 areas nationally covered by this new service by June 2019. By June 2020 this will have increased to over 300 areas."

Enet is currently working with Galway County Council to put fibre into new ducting being laid as part of the work ongoing in the town centre. This will build on the three fibre optic cables that are already running through the town between Dublin and Galway, which are connected to the transatlantic cable running from County Mayo to the US.

This service from Imagine will be available to between three and four hundred customers at each individual location. There will be an installation cost of €150, and a further monthly cost of €60. Those looking to avail of the service can register at imagine.ie.



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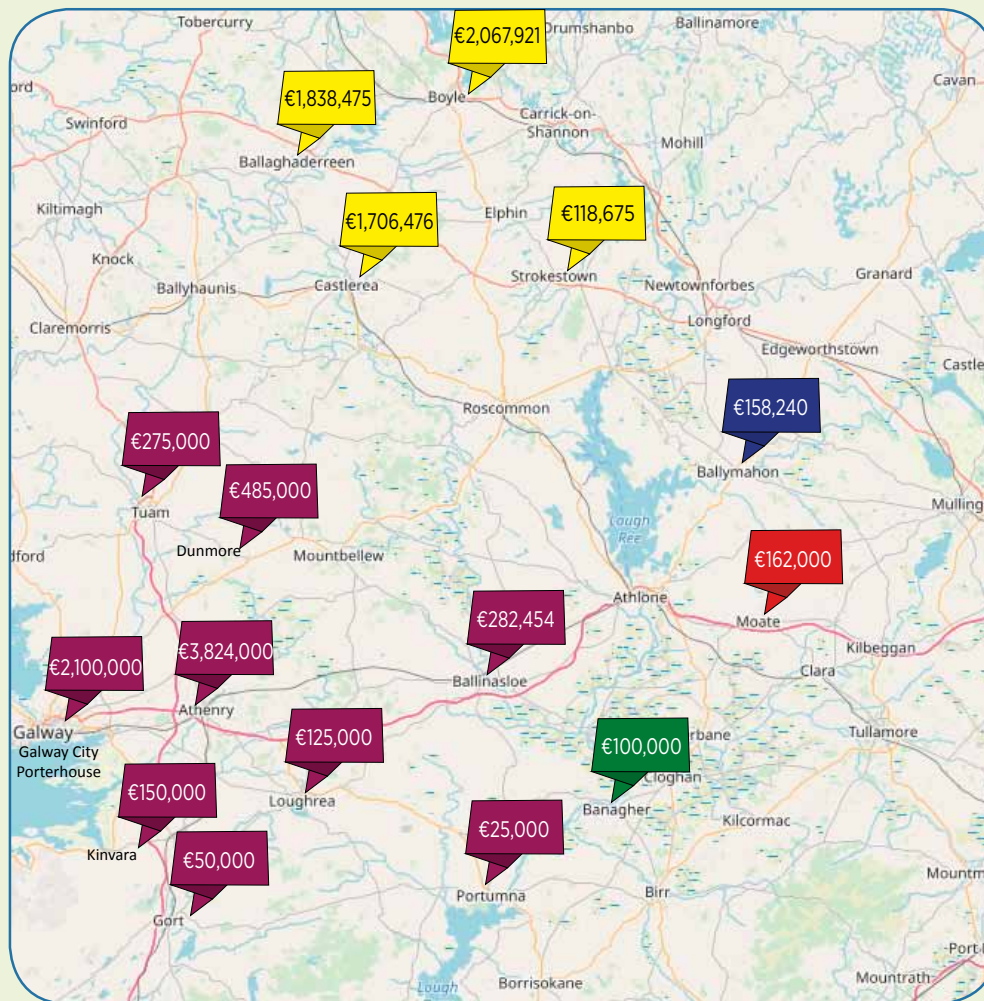
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TOWN LOSES OUT ON THREE YEARS OF RURAL DEV. FUNDS

Recent announcements by the Government were hugely anticipated to deliver some much needed capital grant aid for development projects in the locale but instead, with Galway County awash with over €10 million and Roscommon County to the east of the town obtaining over €5 million, we in Ballinasloe obtained zero on the third round.

Countless other towns who had no benchmarking done in the last five years, no town action plans, no town teams and no formalised partnership (which we have) with their local authority till late in the day; have apparently done much better under these national schemes.

There is huge disquiet and dismay at BACD Board level and town team grouping that either the Department systems and analysis is failing to understand our needs and asks or there could be political reasons behind the rejections.

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Council in the wake of the announcement left participants puzzled as to how an Advance Factory with full planning and support from IDA And EI all in place could not be demised as a "Shovel Ready Project".

Huge amount of management and Town Team time and energy are going into the making of these detailed applications and bids which under the terms of the scheme must be forwarded through the Local Authority. Many businesses, members of the company are openly asking what the development company and town team are doing in the wake of barrowloads of Exchequer money being invested in a necklace of towns around them but nothing for here.

In a detailed report to the Directors of BACD & Galway County Council the Manager and Town team outlined the narrative of the last three application rounds. In summary:

In 2015, BACD Ltd applied directly to the department for funding and were successful in being granted €60,500. Since then all applications made by BACD have had to go through Galway County Council who in turn put the applications together and submit them directly to department for the funding.

In 2017, BACD originally sought €172k in funding and after the process were awarded €29k. In 2017, BACD applied for €26,000 and were granted €20,000.

In 2018, as part of the Rural Regeneration Fund, BACD requested for 2 projects to be submitted. A Category 1 project for the construction of new ATU building on the IDA site (funding of €2m sought) and a feasibility Study (category 2) for St Brigid's campus (€90k funding). These projects along with 10 others were submitted by GCC in one application overall seeking €3.4m in funds for Ballinasloe. No

funding was granted.

As one can see the Development Company and Town Team are not shy of ideas or applications but we have not been successful.

"We've met with the Manager and Senior Officials at Galway County Council and conveyed our frustration at what is the perceived side-lining of our prioritised development bids. We feel that as Ballinasloe is on the periphery of the county and the fact we are in a different electoral area to rest of the county we are being left behind. Following from the meeting, there is a renewed sense of commitment to redouble our efforts in a focused way with our local authority partners as there is more National Government funding becoming available" stated Seamus Duffy Chair.

There are a host of Town Team ideas in IDA site Development, Heritage, Tourism, Hidden Heartlands, River Walks, Cycleways, St. Brigid's Campus Development and micro enterprise that have been identified and the group will be reviewing the towns Action Plan with the stakeholders in anticipation of more national calls and to have more projects shovel ready.

Keith is currently working for Irish Rugby, and more specifically the Senior Men's National Team, a post he has held for the last seven years. He has enjoyed many successes in this time, including being part of a team responsible for winning three Six Nations titles, as well as one Triple Crown win, and one Grand Slam win. Keith was born in the local Portiuncula Hospital and has lived in Athlone for the majority of his life.

The business decided to expand to the area of Ballinasloe, with a team of three Chartered Physiotherapists to help cater for their patient population in the area. for the launch of their bio bags. Beechlawn are now a leading force in the retail sector in the fight to eradicate plastic packaging in the area of fresh fruit and veg. Their first batch of compostable labels will be delivered in mid-April making the whole bio bag veg pack completely compostable. They are also expecting compostable cling wrap for some of the veg packs that are in trays and by the end of 2019

their target is to have all pre packs in compostable packaging. In order for veg to be clearly traced and certified as organic it is required to be separated from chemically grown veg, thus causing the packaging problem which are being encountered but focussing on tackling this year. The business was awarded both the McKenna Guide 2018 and the Georgina Campbell Award last year, which further proves that the farm's growth is gaining huge industry recognition, local stockists are Eurospar in the Square and O'Connors Foodhall in Brackernagh.

After their Good Food Friday event, the next big day in the farm's calendar is the annual gardening festival, BLOOM, which takes place over the June Bank Holiday weekend. Beechlawn Organic Farm will host a stand to display their variety of products on a national stage under the Bord Bia Banner of excellence. They will also hold a harvest fair on Sunday Sept 15th this year.

€5 MILLION ALLOCATED TO ATHLONE – BALLINASLOE GREENWAY

The local campaign behind the 'Athlone to Ballinasloe Greenway' project saw breakthroughs recently. Members from the initiative, John Kelly and Antoinette Gallagher, recently met with Transport Infrastructure Ireland to discuss the local run of the country-spanning Greenway, in a meeting facilitated by Senator Maura Hopkins.

The 'Athlone to Ballinasloe Greenway' will run through the south of Roscommon and the eastern Galway region, is part of the larger Dublin to Galway greenway and is currently in the pre-planning stages of development. Over €5 million has been allocated to progress the 'Athlone to Ballinasloe' portion of the cycling path, but the project remains in limbo as not even a public project office has been established yet, although Transport Infrastructure Ireland has announced that one is to be set up, although the whereabouts of such is yet unknown.

Senator Hopkins has suggested that Ballinasloe, as the focal point of this initiative, should house the project office. She said that "It is essential that communities are engaged with at the earliest possible opportunity to ensure that we can achieve the greatest possible support for this development" stated Senator Maura.

The €5 million already allocated to the cycleway would allow for the construction of the railway underpass in Athlone to be finished. Not only that, but it will also mean that plans will progress on the bridge crossing the Shannon, which is located near to Athlone Castle. Last of all, these funds will go towards the appointment of dedicated staff for this project, who in turn will carry out the

delivery of this portion of the greenway. These works are scheduled to be completed by the middle of the year, and all plans afterward should ensure that the cycleway progresses west of the Shannon.

Senator Hopkins concluded: "This project has the potential to be the flagship tourism offering for Ballinasloe and the wider region. It will play a central

role in the connection between the Beara Breifne Way and linking this region into the New Ireland's Hidden Heartlands Tourism brand. In particular, the Athlone to Ballinasloe section of this greenway has so much to offer in terms of tourism development. The wake house at Nure, the Clonmacnoise monastic site, Shannonbridge as well as the wealth of history which exists in Ballinasloe itself, all should be key sites of interest on this National greenway route. We have seen how greenway development can revive communities through the examples in Waterford and Mayo and I want to see Ballinasloe and this region benefit fully from that potential", continued the Senator.

This meeting followed the news that Denis Naughten TD announced that the larger 'Athlone to Galway City Greenway' had received funding of up to €200,000 as part of the Outdoor Recreation Infrastructure Scheme for 2018, and was reaching the closing stages of finalisation. A major issue that this project was facing was reaching an agreement with all of the landowners whose land would be affected by the proposed route. However, almost half of the landowners between Galway and Connemara recently reached agreement in principle with the county council.

The Council acts as an advisory body to the clergy of the parish, and through meetings held over the past several months they have begun to implement views expressed in the survey. And he told the gathering they were all welcome during the tourist season at his Cois Cuain facility. 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OVER 40 TRAINED FIRST RESPONDERS VOLUNTEERS NOW IN COMMUNITY

A group of over 40 volunteers are currently available to respond to any cardiac or choking emergencies around the town. The Ballinasloe-Creagh CFR Group were set up in 2012, when they first fundraised for an Automatic External Defibrillator to be placed in Creagh. The first of these AEDs were placed at Dolan's Centra, in Kilgarve, and at the entrance to Ballinasloe Enterprise Centre, on the Creagh Road.

From there the group joined the National Ambulance Service scheme, which allowed local, trained volunteers to respond to

cardiac emergencies in their locality. On receiving a distress call, the ambulance dispatcher can inform the caller of their nearest AED, and its access code. The dispatcher will alert the paramedic service, and if a cardiac arrest or choking incident has happened, they will also alert the CFR group via a mass text system. Members that are free to respond will do so, and once on the scene they will provide CPR and AED use until the paramedics arrive.

AEDs are life-saving pieces of equipment used in the early treatment of cardiac arrest that can increase survival rates dramatically, through its delivery of an electric shock to the heart. If CPR and defibrillation are provided within three to five minutes of a victim collapsing, survival rates can be increased up to 74%. In Ireland about 100 people each week die from a sudden cardiac arrest, with 68% of these cardiac arrests occurring in the patient's home. Considering the high number of arrests that take place away from medical areas, it is greatly important to the community that efforts are being made to increase the availability of AEDs and to train the general public in both AED use, and CPR.

The group have identified a need for additional AEDs that have 24/7 availability throughout the area. While many local organisations and business have their own AEDs, these are generally not available outside of their business hours. Ballinasloe-Creagh CFR Group have now purchased five additional AEDs and located them strategically within the town, with the help from funders such as An Post, Bank of Ireland, Canada Life, Ballinasloe Credit Union, as well as Tesco, East Galway Cancer Care and the residents of Hymany.

The volunteers have yet to receive funding from the HSE or any other state body. In fact, in the event of using their equipment the group must fund the replacements themselves. AEDs, including the heated box in which they are stored, cost in the region of €1,800-€2,000 and have an average maintenance cost of €150 per unit. All the training is provided free by qualified instructors and none of the volunteers get any remuneration, even though it costs in the region of €500 per annum to keep all the members registered.

LOCAL WINNERS IN GARDA YOUTH AWARDS

The Garda Youth Awards, in conjunction with Supervalu, were held for the first time in Galway. These awards have been run in various Garda Divisions throughout the country for a number of years, and An Garda Síochána has now decided to roll out these awards nationally. They are designed to recognise the good work and positive contribution that youths make to their community and how they try to improve the place they live.

There are four awards in the national competition: the Individual Award, the Group Award, the Special Achievement Award, and the Community Safety Award.

Ballinasloe was very well represented on the awards night, as from the one hundred nominations which were received from across the county, the town had representatives on the night in three of the four categories, and two of these went on to win their respective awards.

Beibhinn Parsons, who was nominated for the Individual Person Award, is a student at Ardscoil Mhuire. She became Ireland's youngest ever senior rugby debutant, coming off the bench in a test match against the US at sixteen years of age. Her hard work on and off the pitch has shown as she has continued to be selected to represent Ireland and was the only scorer for the Irish senior team in the games against Wales when she scored a try in the opening minutes. She was nominated for the Individual Award by Lillian Hynes, Vice Principal of Ardscoil Mhuire, and although she unfortunately didn't win, Beibhinn has placed Ballinasloe on the sporting map of Ireland.

The Special Achievement Award is awarded to a person who overcomes incredibly difficult circumstances, and whose commitment deserves recognition. Sinéad Carty, a first year student in Ardscoil Mhuire, was diagnosed with a brain tumour in November 2018. Since then, she has undergone three major

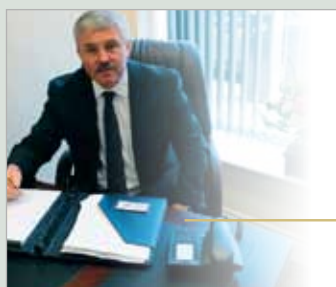

surgeries, showing immense courage and optimism throughout this difficult journey. Her class and school alike have been greatly moved by her plight, and have

supported her throughout her treatment. Sinead was awarded the Special Achievement Award at the Youth Awards, where she was accompanied by her extended family.

The Community Safety Award is handed out to a group or individual who have made their community a safer place to live, through the implementation of a crime prevention or a safety initiative. Irish Water Safety Ballinasloe is comprised of a group of young local adults who have all taken measures to improve the safety of their area. They have learned how to perform, and now deliver classes in cardio resuscitation, basic first aid, the use of an automated external defibrillator, and water safety principles, as well as practicing various water-based rescue scenarios. They meet every Saturday from September to Easter, to deliver various classes. The group have also managed to fund the Assistant Swim teacher course offered in the town entirely by themselves. All of these young people give their time voluntarily, for the good of the community. They are fostering a culture that encourages safer attitudes and behaviours in all of those who live, work and play near the water.

The Galway award winners will go through to the National Garda Youth Awards, which are due to be held at the end of April.



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ARD SCOIL MUIRE STUDENTS COMPETE IN NATIONAL RECYCLING FASHION EVENT



Junk Kouture is fashion competitions where inspiring young designers in second level education use everyday rubbish to create striking works of wearable art.

Three groups from Ard Scoil Mhuire, Ballinasloe recently got through to the regional finals of the Junk Kouture, held in TF Royal, Castlebar. The models performed on the catwalk in front of hundreds of people, including esteemed judges such as Louis Walsh and Doireann Garrihy. Only twenty designs got the chance to progress through to the glamorous grand finale held in the 3Arena, in Dublin. The girls were delighted that they got to this stage, as Junk Kouture has an extremely high standard, with over 1400 entries coming in from all over Ireland, and only 320 spaces in the regional finals. However, the girls were unlucky on the day not to be selected for the Grand Finals.

The three groups that got through to the regional finals are all comprised of TY students.



Give it Socks is made up of Ailbhe Hanlon, Megan Fitzpatrick and Alison Markham. Their dress was made with over 1,000 odd socks. This innovative design comprises of a dramatic tiered skirt, a structured top with a shoelace corset and an eccentric headpiece. The group chose this material, at they found that odd socks are a commonly wasted item - research shows that the average person loses approximately 1,264 socks in a lifetime.

CafQueen was the team of Martha Freehill and Orlaith Brennan. Their design was a powerful warrior outfit created using strong and durable coffee related materials which are near impossible to recycle. Up to 200 million single-use coffee cups are thrown away in Ireland every year. They created this powerful warrior outfit to highlight this ongoing issue and to encourage companies and individuals to fight against this unnecessary wastage. Approximately 150 coffee pods were used to create their design. These came from a weekly collection from the school community, parish and local coffee shops. All were willing to contribute as these pods are nearly impossible to dispose of.



The Final Straw consisted of Leah Hogarty, Clodagh Powell and Aoife Murray. This group's neon geometric dress represents their concept of sea pollution, a problem that affects over 817 sea species around the world. This major issue is a result of people disposing of single use materials into our seas. The girls wanted to pay tribute to this problem with their jellyfish-inspired skirt. The single use materials that were manipulated to make the design were collected from local pubs. The design entailed metal bottle caps which had holes punched into, weaving string through and bent wooden corks. The group cut, wrapped and tessellated Straws. They also individually weaved, folded, intertwined

and ironed these straws. A cereal box & paper cups were used as a base for the top and old wire, a hula hoop and foam underlay for the skirt.

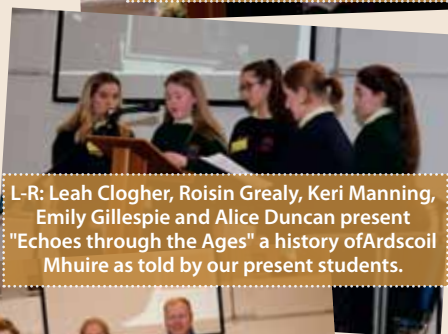

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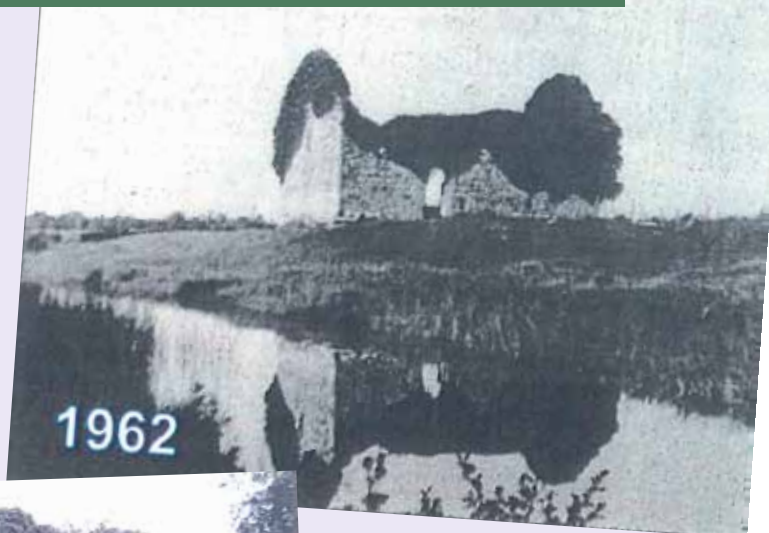
LOCAL ANGELS' PLOT BURIAL GROUND TO HAVE REFLECTION EVENT

The Teampoilin is the name given to the ruins of an early thirteenth century medieval church, which is lost in the midst of a tangle of bushes and trees and weighed down by a massive covering of ivy. It is located close to the banks of the old Grand Canal, about 400 metres from the canal bridge on the Pollboy road. It's not accessible to the public however, due to it being located on privately owned land. It is one of the very few remaining medieval ruins in the Ballinasloe area, and its existence is unknown to many of the local population.

The Teampoilin was one of the earliest churches built by the Order of St. Augustine after they came to the West of Ireland from the continent. It had a close association with the Clontuskert Priory, and was staffed by the Canons of St. Augustine who crossed the bog from the Priory to Pollboy. Evidence of a wooden walkway called the "togher" was uncovered in the Kellysgrove bog during drainage by the Land Commission in 1946, and from then it was known locally as the "Monks' Pass".

The original building was constructed of stone and measured 57 feet long and 21 feet wide, and to date the east, south and west walls are all still standing, probably held together by the growth of ivy, while most of the north wall has fallen away. Some of the original features are still to be seen, including the transitional pointed doorway on the south wall, as well as aumbries for the keeping of the church vessels at the east end.



Some time after this, it fell into disuse as a church, and it became a burial place for stillborn, unbaptised babies, although there is some evidence that other infants may also be buried there. Burials reportedly ceased there in the 1950s. One headstone lies within the ruin, bearing the inscription: "Here lies Walter Joseph, infant son of Rob Pilkington. Died 12 September 1828".

In more recent times a number of families in the area have become aware that older siblings or relatives are buried at the Teampoilin and are now organising a time to reflect and remember all infants who are resting there. This event will take place in Gullane's Hotel on Friday 5th April at 7pm, and all are welcome to attend.

All therapists are fully qualified and operate out of Pieta centres nationwide, including those near Ballinasloe in Tuam and Athlone. The initiative also helps fund the 24 hour helpline, at 1800 247 247.

Brian Derrane, chairperson of the local organising committee believes that Darkness into Light is a fulfilling experience with a very important purpose. He sees it as a valuable opportunity for individuals, groups and families to come together as a community to dispel the stigma of suicide, to raise valuable awareness of the help available and to educate the community about the supports that Pieta House offers free of charge to its service users, by raising vital finances to allow the organisation to do all that it does.

"By participating, you make a difference in the lives of someone you love and care for, and even those you don't even know. You can change a person's life for the better and maybe even help save their life. You empower someone to take that first step from darkness toward the light, and thereby rekindle the light of hope in their dark despair. 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PORTIUNCULA AWAITING FINAL FUNDING APPROVAL FOR 50 BED UNIT BY DONOGH MOORE

Portiuncula Hospital is currently awaiting funding approval from the Minister of Health, Simon Harris, to begin work on a new fifty bed unit in the hospital. Planning permission for the project has been received by the Health Service Executive, and now the project lies in limbo until it has its funding approved by the Minister.

Denis Naughten TD recently raised the issue in a Parliamentary Question, where he asked the Minister the status of plans for the ward block extension, what stage the proposed development was at, and the timeframe for the completion of works. He added: "We are being told that the Department of Health will prioritise increasing capacity in our hospitals as part of the current review of all building projects as a result of the overspend on the National Children's Hospital. As the new 50 bed ward block at Portiuncula will increase bed usage and can also provide additional beds in the hospital system, I believe that this project should be prioritised."

Senator Maura Hopkins added: "This is a shovel ready project and it is essential that we see works progressing as soon as possible. Hospital management have confirmed to me the urgent need for this project to progress."

In response to Deputy Naughten's PQ, Jim Curran, Head of Estates at the HSE stated: "Tender documents are being prepared with a view to progressing the procurement process and commencing an enabling works contract in 2019, subject to the availability of funding. The 2019 Capital Plan is currently being finalised and no funding will be allocated to any project until the 2019 Cap Plan is agreed with the Department."

It is feared by many public representatives that the claw back in health capital spend due to the over run on the Children's National Hospital will see this project stalled.



RATE MY HOSPITAL

According to RateMyHospital, Portiuncula is sitting at a 74 percent approval rating. Ratings, which are submitted by the public upon visiting the local hospital, cited kind, caring and friendly staff as a huge bonus to their stay in PUH. However, every comment made in 2019 noted that while the staff were incredibly helpful and welcoming, they were constantly under pressure. St. Francis' Ward was mentioned repeatedly as being the busiest ward in the hospital, although the care that patients received was not compromised due to this.



TROLLEY WATCH:

The Irish Nurses and Midwives Organisation frequently publish their analysis of how many patients are left occupying trolleys throughout the country's various public hospitals. In February of this year, Portiuncula Hospital had 83 patients on trolleys. This is a lower figure than February 2018, which saw over 100 patients left waiting on temporary beds. This, in comparison with the Midland Regional Hospital in Tullamore's 329, and University Hospital Galway's 526 shows that while shortages are present in Portiuncula, in terms of both staff and facilities, statistically the hospital has less patients residing on trolleys than any nearby competitors.

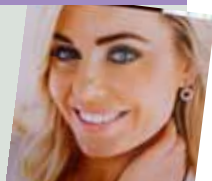

Simply Divine is one way of describing Ballinasloe Musical Society's acclaimed SELL OUT annual run of "Sister Act" at the Town Hall.

Whoopi Goldberg starred in the 1992 film, and its 1993 sequel, which is aired as regularly as "Chitty Chitty Bang Bang" on the Xmas Schedules. Following on from their production of Dolly Parton's "9 to 5" last year, cast and crew are continuing with the more modern musicals, in another first for the Society.

Whether it was the angelic faces in the habits that hooked the audience in a nostalgic trance of yesteryear – (it is some 12 years since nuns in large numbers were on the run in Society St!) , or the slick dance moves, fabulous castings, realistic set or uptempo modern music – the audience on most nights took to their feet with appreciation.

The buildup of story and establishment of characters took a lot of the focus the first half in this Paul Norton produced show but from once the adroit Emily Lohan as Deloris took the baton to conduct her disharmonious choir the energy and pace climbed to crescendo proportions. Rare on stage to see cast capture fully some of the verve and chutzpah of the silver screen version but this society nailed it; in every department.

Ordinarily when large amateur choruses sing and dance at the same time one activity tends to discommode the other – not so on this occasion – those habits, veils and heels moved with Carmelite precision and never lost a quaver, or crotchet which all could be fully heard. Full marks to Choreographer Aoife Clafferty and to Musical Director Shane Farrell who used the vocal dexterity and full range of the choruses and principals to interpret the score faithfully.

Strong sterling performances were turned in by all the principals – they all deserve mentions but Nick Lawless as Eddie, the accomplished and nuanced Madeline Flemming as Mother Superior, Lisa Whyte and Emma Greally all gave forceful, realistic studies. The Character Nuns added sublimely to the telling of the tale, weaving traits into their parts that could only have been gleaned from nun



watching in the schools of their formative years.

The male chorus were clearly outnumbered, did not have as much to do musically but got the lion share of the comic territory. Kay Purcell Award winner Seamus Feerick gave a Cavan version of a crusty but cash savvy

Monsignor, Mike O'Reilly (Joey) as ever led the hoods in timing and moves, while it was left to Paul Drysdale to take the role of the Baddie as Curtis. Cute Cameos from Brian Derrane as the Cop and Gerry Sweeney as Ernie all helped but two younger principals took their modest roles and milked them for every ounce of laughter – Barry Dune as Pablo and Ciaran Smith as TJ.

The chorus included over fifty talented individuals. All of these onstage stars, as well as the Stage Crew managed by redoubtable Pat McGovern. It gave Society St. a rollicking sell out run for five nights of cracking good entertainment.

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KILCONNELL NATIVE HONoured BY MUSIC FOR GALWAY AS INTERNATIONAL CONDUCTOR & COMPOSER

Kilconnell native Eimear Noone was recently received her Laochra Ceoil Cellissimo Honouree award from Music for Galway, in recognition for her work as a leading conductor and composer of video games music.

When she was 15, an army band played a concert for her and her Ardscoil Mhuire classmates in the Town Hall Theatre. She was already studying flute and piano and she was invited to sit in and sight-read a part with the band. Rather audaciously, she chose to play piccolo. During the performance, she was invited to take the role of conductor. Her friends assumed it was all part of a gimmick, but little did they know that Eimear had actually been studying scores at home for years. She said she had been "watching videos of conductors, anything I could get at the library, trying to figure out what on earth they were doing, looking at diagrams".

Eimear began learning music during her time at school in Kilconnell National School, first starting on tin whistle, playing traditional music, while at home she picked up themes from television by ear. She moved on to flute and piano, and travelled every Saturday to the Royal Irish Academy of Music in Dublin for lessons.

It was as a teenager, while she attended Ard Scoil Mhuire, that she also began composing and arranging. Eimear was a member of the local Town Band, who gave her huge opportunities to practice and perform throughout her formative adolescent years. The Town Hall Theatre also proved itself to be instrumental throughout these years, as for many years the theatre was one of the major places that the band could practice.

popular classical works, the orchestra gave the Irish premieres of a range of well-known scores. Their premiere performance was their renditions of the Braveheart score, of the Batman score and Empire of the Sun by John Williams.

Her further move into game and film music came via Screen Training Ireland in Dublin. Eimear then took a film composing course (part of the UCLA Extension Film Scoring programme), where she received training from renowned film composers such as Don Ray. She also met the orchestrator Steven Scott Smalley who had worked on the Batman score which she had just performed and knew well. Smalley hired her as an assistant and asked her to do some orchestration on a video game project that he had received. That project was the first 'World of Warcraft' game, which remains as one of the highest-grossing video games of all time.

Now based in Los Angeles, Noone has since recorded and composed the music for many video games, including World of Warcraft: Warlords of Draenor, StarCraft II, and Overwatch, and has written music for film thrillers such as Mirrors (2008) and The Hole (2012). She has conducted performances of games music all over the world, and she also co-founded the Dublin International Games Music Festival with her husband, composer Craig Stuart Garfinkle.

She has blazed a trail in the composing and conducting international world and was one of the first female conductors to perform at the National Concert Hall, Dublin.

In all of her international performance and collaborations – she was in Buenos Aires at the Callas Festivals for St. Patrick's Weekend she still takes an avid interest in matters local and is keen to acknowledge the musical ecology of East Galway and the activities and organisations that helped nurture her talent. "I can't overestimate how important the Ballinasloe Town Band was to me as a kid. Noel Madden and the senior band members were incredibly good to us kids and the work Noel did was constant and unflinching. He often threw clarinet parts or other instrumental parts for us to transpose and sight-read. The education we got, both musical and cultural was beyond description. Please support the continuation of this gem for the next generation" stated Eimear on her latest of many trips back to Kilconnell.

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TOWN BAND AMBITIOUS FUNDRAISING PROJECT CONTINUES TO ATTRACT SUPPORT

The Town's Band are in the midst of their latest fundraising campaign. Its aim is to raise €180,000 for the purchase and renovation of the local Parochial Hall, and so far €20,000 has already been raised since the beginning of the year.

At its March monthly meeting the Chair, Damien O'Neachtain, thanked the Town Band supporters who had returned their direct debit form to the credit union. (These forms were delivered with the Jan. issue of LIFE magazine). Additional forms are available in the credit union or from any member of the Band.

The Town Band Hall is an old 19th Century building which requires refurbishment and upgrading. A local engineer has examined the roof alongside dedicated roof specialists and a plan to repair the damage is underway.

Recent visitors to the Hall include Máiread McGuinness, MEP and Senator Maura Hopkins – both of whom advised on various grant schemes available. While these schemes are being looked into by the group, local fundraising is continuing – the Town Band held a table Quiz recently in the Shearwater Hotel, and a Progressive 25 will be held on the night of Good Friday, April 19th, in Gullane's Hotel.

An appeal for support to the business community is also progressing, as the Town Band requires the long-term commitment of individuals, businesses and supporters in general to maintain and develop the group future. They are asking for your support for the Town Band Hall project.

The Parochial Hall was the recreational hall for many in the locality and many over the age of 50 will remember the "hops" held there in the 1970s and 80s, and even more will remember the Irish dancing

Katie Dillon represented not only Ballinasloe, but the country when she competed in the Special Olympics which took place in Abu Dhabi this year and saw competitors from countries all around the world stake their claim in being the best in their sport. Katie, daughter of Mary and Billy, grew up in Aughrim alongside her brother Justyn and her sister Ciara.

After attending St. Catherine's National School and Woodford, Katie went on to complete various VEC courses, travelling independently to Galway four days a week, to attend programmes such as a Brothers of Charity drama/art group called 'The Blue Teapot' and the 'Arts Alive' course.

However, she is obviously talented in sport, to have been selected to represent Ireland for the second time this year in shot put and walking, with the first being in the European Special Olympic Games in Antwerp 2014, where she participated in boccee and won a silver medal for the country.

After winning both a silver and a gold medal at the National Games held in Dublin in June 2018, Katie was selected to represent her country in the World Olympic Games in Abu Dhabi, alongside over 7,000 fellow Olympians from 170 participating countries, including 90 other Irish athletes. She competed in the 400m walk, as well as the shotput in the largest sporting and humanitarian event of the year.

Katie has had a huge network of support around her throughout her life. Her family, friends and schoolmates have all been valuable

sources of aid and assistance over the years. None more so than the Mountbellew Tigers, however. The club is a Special Olympics athletics club, of which she has been a member of since 1999.

Having had a massive interest in sport all her life, she never ignored other activities to focus on just one, and she has participated in a myriad of different sports over the years, such as horse-riding, swimming, basketball and golfing. In recent years however, Katie has decided to focus on the shotput event, as well as walking.

Katie has met many famous athletes in recent year, such as professional rugby players and Ireland internationals Devin Toner, Cian Healy and Rob Kearney. Not only that, but she also met Joe Canning recently at the Ploughing Championships. None of these athletes have inspired her as much as her peers competing in the Special Olympics. These athletes, alongside her own family, have been her sources of inspiration in competing. Her parents, Mary and Billy, her brother Justyn, her sister Ciara and her partner Shane all made the journey over to Abu Dhabi to watch Katie represent Ireland.

Before setting off for the United Arab Emirates, Katie held a very successful coffee morning in Gullane's Hotel which raised funds in aid of the Special Olympics. To help with this, local schools also held non-uniform days, as well as various breakfast mornings. In all, Katie raised over €3,000 for the Special Olympics with the help and generosity of the local community.

Up to a few years ago it was costing Ballinasloe Golf Club €230,000 per year to maintain the course. The main costs were the repair/maintenance/finance of machinery, wages, fertilizers, chemicals, machinery hire and the use of outside agencies. With golf declining in popularity and rising costs, Ballinasloe like all other clubs in Ireland were finding it hard to meet financial demands.

Rather than let the high standard and presentation of the course decline members volunteered their services. These volunteer members worked with the course staff on a weekly basis and have greatly reduced running costs in the club. The work they do includes driving a tractor with gang mower to cut long grass, maintenance of machinery, spreading and brushing sand on the greens every few months, bunkers are raked and weeds removed, fences repaired & painted, shrubberies, cleaning drains, hedges and trees are maintained to name but just a few jobs undertaken by the male members of the club. The female

members also volunteer their services by decorating, cleaning, painting and maintaining flower beds around the clubhouse. It has been estimated that the work on the course undertaken by the "club volunteers" saves the club in excess of €70,000 per year.

When Club Captain Michael Ward decided to convert the old machinery shed building into a new office, meeting room, store and buggy area almost fifty club members again volunteered their services and financial assistance. Over the last few months the trades, services and machinery of volunteer members (block layers, plasterers, carpenters, roofers, electricians, welders, painters etc.) came to the fore to complete the renovation on time for the "Captains Drive In" on the 30th March at minimal cost to the club. Thanks to the "club spirit" of the members, Ballinasloe Golf Club has a well maintained course, clubhouse, new office, meeting room and buggy area.

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FIFTY YEARS OF HURLING IN KILTORMER

Many great players have contributed to the Kiltormer cause down through the years since they amalgamated with Clontuskert including the great Conor Hayes who captained Galway to All-Ireland glory in 1987 and 1988.

The celebrations get under way on Friday, 21st June with Mass in the Sports Complex, followed by various activities with special celebrities and musical entertainment. On Saturday there will be a coaching session followed by a senior hurling challenge match. In the evening there will be a full sit-down Gala Dinner, in the Sports Centre, with The High Kings providing the entertainment. It promises to be a nostalgic night, with former players coming from many continents to renew old acquaintances.

Former star Andy Fenton said "Every effort is being made to contact each of the 432 players who represented the club in various grades, hoping they can make the trip for the special occasion. If anybody has any old photos, mementos or souvenirs of the club's games over the past half century I would appreciate the loan of them for the June weekend." MOORE SCOUTS COMPLETE FIRST AID TRAINING

Local scout members recently attended and passed their Basic Life Support and CPR first aid course, which was delivered at Moore Hall by the members of Education Training Quality Assurance Solutions, and attended by fifteen scouts, aged between twelve and sixteen.

This is a substantial qualification for people so young. These scout members are now qualified in CPR (both Adult and Paediatric), Defibrillator Use (both Adult and Paediatric), and can deal with Choking, Stroke, Seizures, Burns, Bleeding, Convulsions, Shock and Anaphylaxis.

The scout members have also attained their Stage 6 Emergencies Badge. The journey to achieving this badge began back when the group first joined the scouts, starting as a Beaver or a Cub.

As well as undertaking lifesaving badges, the scouts have also worked

in conjunction with Ballinasloe Tidy Towns in the past, having cleaned up the local Marina as part of National Spring Week for the last two years.

The Scouts meet every Monday night in Moore Hall. Their youth members are from 12 to 16, and after that they progress on to be venture scouts.

The Moore Scouts will also be holding a 'duck race' on Easter Monday, on the River Suck. The funds raised from this event will go towards the cost of the Scouts' annual trip over to Scotland, which will take place in July.

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TAUGHMACONNELL NATIVE SPEARHEADING RATHCROGHAN VISITOR CENTRE



Recently married, Daniel Curley of Taughmaconell has found himself in a whirlwind of innovative heritage site and tourism facility development, in Rathcroghan Visitor Centre, Tulsk Co. Roscommon.

Son of Danny Curley, recently retired postal worker and Josephine Curley (Judge, Brackernagh) who works in

Dubarry, Daniel had his interest in history kindled since he took honours in the subject in Garbally under the then History Maître Stephen O'Reilly and Pat Johnston.

He describes his fervent love for ancient and medieval Irish History in simple terms of being "mad about every that happened here before the gun". His accomplished academic route through NUI Galway saw him immerse himself in his BA in History, and his MA in Medieval Irish Studies - which featured a study of local ruins, Dundonnell Castle, potentially in use from the 7th Century through to the seventeenth.

Having tried the teaching route post his studies, he applied for a post relatively local - to a Pobal-funded community initiative in Tulsk as Education Officer with the Visitor Centre in 2013. At the time, it was a small scale community enterprise with a manager and 3 crew and some 3,500 service users per annum.

In 2014, the Managers position fell vacant and he applied for the post and began an upwards trajectory of growth and development that is unprecedented in Community-led visitor development.

In four years, he has spearheaded the development of the only Annual Community Archaeology Conference in the country, which is a sellout and has a waiting list! Service users and visitor numbers have risen to 19,000 in 2018 and he has a team of 7 staff, 3 RSS, 2 Tús and some Solas Trainees on site. Turnover has grown from €40,000 in 2013 to €180,000 by the end of 2018.

Rathcroghan, a UNESCO-nominated heritage site - is the oldest and largest unexcavated Royal Complex in Europe, covering a sprawling site of 45 landowners, over 240 archaeological sites and 60 national monuments protected by the Office of Public Works.

It is the Royal Seat of the Iron Age and medieval Kings of Connacht and it is from here that Queen Meabh (Maeve) had her home and the origin point for our National Epic "An Táin Bó Cuaile", all this just under 60 kms away !!

The Centre is owned, managed and run by the Community through Daniel, while the majority of the site is owned by farming landowners, with 70 acres owned by the OPW. "It's interesting watching the growth in visitors, remember that we have been here for some time - nearly 3500 BC; so the Hidden Heartlands is only playing catch up. But we are getting a lot of second time visitors, fascinated by Ireland's past and searching for roots - American, Canadian, and Australian typically. Our Coach tours have grown significantly but we are nowhere near the 310,000 visitors a year that Clonmacnoise is at but getting there", states Daniel.

Key to the continuing success story has been the award of the first ever European Innovation Partnership in archaeological landscape preservation, sustainable farming and community development

which sees some €984,000 over three years being pumped into the area for the farming community, along with the employment of a dedicated project staff, adding to the positivity surrounding this rural area of the west of Ireland.

"The Board and I am very fortunate that we have hands on engagement and backing of Roscommon County Council, their Tourism Officer Eimear Dowd, and Heritage Officer Nollaig Feeney; Cultural Heritage is being championed in this county and we will reap jobs and economic investment from it" notes Daniel.

He is aghast that the lessons of Clonmacnoise or Tulsk, which are very replicable have not been adopted in East Galway with the Aughrim Interpretive Centre, the Abbeys of Clonfert, Clontuskert and Killconnell around Ballinasloe. "Heritage is obviously not valued as an economic driver on the Western bank of the Suck, I am personally very disappointed at the inaction of the authorities to promote and develop the key historical sites and community heritage tourism that seems to working well elsewhere", argues Daniel.

Not content with resting on his laurels, Daniel is completing a PHD backed by the Irish Research Council on the O'Kellys of Uí Maine (Hymany) - effectively the Starks of the Suck Valley in medieval times!

To this end he is urgently seeking information on the O'Kelly Clan from the 8th to the 17th Century especially on Forts, Wells, Burial Grounds, Bridges, Battle sites or such like and would really like to know if anyone at all, local or elsewhere know where St. Grellan's Crozier ever ended up!

When not playing soccer for his local Skyvalley Rovers, he can be found singing a few tunes or else enjoying the company of his new bride - Danielle, who is a nurse from nearby Ballinamore Bridge.

LAND, SEA AND MEMORY

An Exhibition of paintings by West of Ireland Artist, Pam Dolan.

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ARCHBISHOP HEALY

He was bishop of Clonfert and therefore ex officio parish priest of Ballinasloe. By far the most colourful prelate to rule the See of Brendan over the past two hundred years, John Healy was born in Ballinacorney, County Sligo, on 14th November 1842 to parents who were both schoolteachers.

After secondary education in Summerhill College, he entered Maynooth where he was ordained for the diocese of Elphin in 1867. A brief stint of teaching in Summerhill ensued, after which he served successively as curate in Ballygar and Grange, both in County Galway. Following closely on his appointment as rector of St. Asaph's classical school in Elphin, he went on to occupy the chair of theology at Maynooth in 1879.

He moved to Portumna in 1884 when he became coadjutor with right of succession to Patrick Duggan, the ailing bishop of Clonfert. Apparently in his youth Healy had been suspected of holding revolutionary nationalist views, but by now he was an inveterate conservative, a stout upholder of the union with Britain. Though guardedly approving of the idea of Home Rule, he vigorously opposed the tactics of the Land League and succeeded in making himself so unpopular with agrarian agitators that he narrowly escaped assassination when a bullet was fired through his bedroom window as he prepared to retire for the night. Later he was to prove an enthusiastic supporter of recruitment to the British armed forces during the Great War, declaring: "We owe Belgium a debt that can never be repaid in full. Now is the time to repay it in part, and in this diocese we shall not fail to do our own duty." Duggan's political philosophy could not have been more antagonistic, thus setting the scene for a fraught relationship that continued up to the latter's death in 1896.

Healy took up residence at Mount Bernard, Ballymacward, in 1891, a year after assuming the administration from Duggan who was becoming increasingly incapacitated. While there, to use a phrase current at the time, he "killed his own meat", and had the priests of the parish to dinner every Sunday. His contempt for ascetics was undisguised. Few things pleased him more than a dinner of many courses, rounded off with several brandies and a flavoursome cigar. "Hospitality," he often said, "was one of the episcopal virtues recommended by St. Paul who was good enough to advise Timothy to take a little wine for his

stomach's sake. I'd like to know what those good teetotallers I see around me have to say to that." A story is told of how he undermined the efforts of a team of visiting preachers who had spent a week exercising their oratorical skills to persuade a congregation to embrace the ideal of total abstinence from alcohol. In the course of the concluding ceremonies of the retreat, Healy announced from the pulpit that in his considered opinion every man was entitled to drink three pints of Guinness after his day's work.

During his time in Clonfert it was his custom to preach in Ballinasloe one Sunday every month and to preside at the Asylum Board next day. He was instrumental in the construction of the presbytery in Dunlo Street, as well as the commencement of work on Loughrea cathedral. In 1902 he oversaw the purchase of The Pines in Creagh for use as a diocesan seminary.

On his translation to the archbishopric of Tuam in 1903 he was reported as saying: "I leave Clonfert with great reluctance, because I had there a loyal and obedient clergy, who never gave me any trouble, but always obeyed me with the utmost docility and reverence." As archbishop, one of his first acts was to revive the annual Croagh Patrick pilgrimage, which his predecessor had tried to suppress. Healy initiated the restored event by ascending the sacred mountain on horseback. He built a new episcopal residence for himself in Tuam and bought a seaside house in Clifden. Healy also owned a yacht but was an inept sailor, who, though a strong swimmer, almost drowned on two occasions.

The antiquities of Ireland were amongst his lifelong interests, and he became a frequent contributor on the subject to learned journals. In 1890 he published his magnum opus, "Ireland's Ancient Schools and Scholars", employing students in the diocesan seminary as proof readers by offering a sixpence reward for each error detected. He had taught himself to read Old Irish, but never mastered the modern vernacular, and was opposed to the inclusion of Irish as a compulsory matriculation subject for the new National University of Ireland in 1909.

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Healy was tall and fair-haired, with a ruddy complexion. Though sturdily built, he was inclined to waddle in his gait. For recreation he roamed the woods and bogs with dog and gun. Inordinately fond of hunting, he would drop whatever he was doing on hearing that a chase was in progress and rush outside to join in pursuit of the quarry.

A bully not averse to the use of firearms, he once shot a pig that had the misfortune to wander into his garden from a neighbouring farm. On another occasion, on the island of Inishmurray off the Sligo coast, he rounded up a group of women, whose menfolk were all drunk and incapable, and compelled them at gunpoint to row him to the mainland in the teeth of a storm at sea. Members of his household had reason to tremble at the prospect of incurring His Grace's displeasure, since

any perceived neglect of duty was sure to draw down a thunderous reprimand well laced with epithets of opprobrium.

The archbishop's health began to deteriorate in 1909, and in 1913 he suffered a stroke. By 1916 he had been diagnosed with dementia, two years before his death on 16th March 1918. Summing up his career, Patrick Maume, his most recent biographer, has written: "Healy's extreme conservatism has overshadowed his reputation; but in other respects he was the most representative voice of the increasingly confident, institution-building generation of Catholic clergy that consolidated the post-famine 'devotional revolution'. He also represents the arrogant paternalism, intellectual sloppiness and contempt for alternative viewpoints that flawed this achievement."



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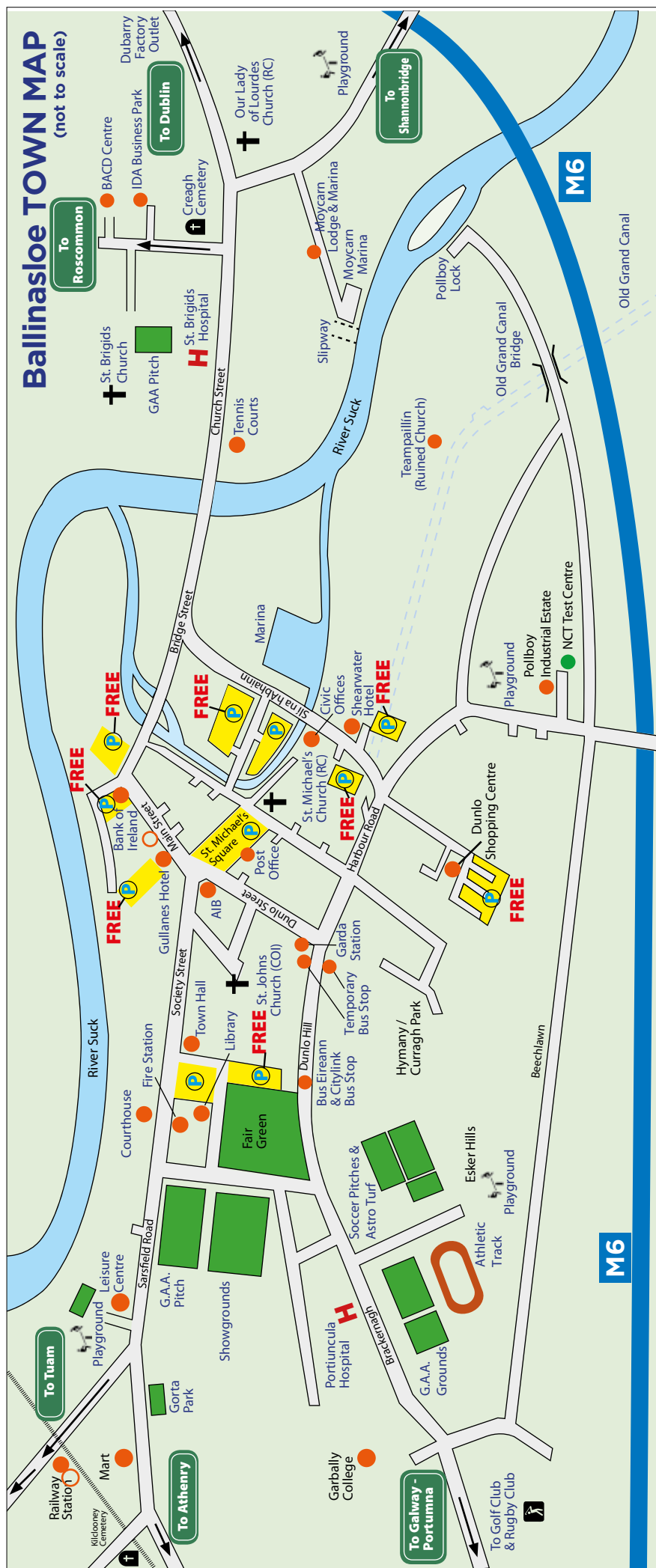
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Ballinasloe History Walk

1 – Start at the statue known as *The Man with the Horse*, where Main Street joins St. Michael's Square. From the crossing near the statue, continue by turning right onto Main Street. The prosperity of Ballinasloe in Georgian times can be seen in the scale and classical style of the buildings here. A fine group of four frontages stand across from the statue of The Man with the Horse. With shops and pubs on the ground floor for the most part, these Main Street premises have several floors above.

2 – Walking along Main Street, lift your eyes above the shop frontages for one of the town's characteristic sights. There are the Diocletian windows that grace several facades. They are from the years after 1805 when the 2nd Earl was in charge. A window of this sort is formed under a semi-circular arch with two upright divisions so that the whole opening is divided into three parts.

3 – As you stand at the meeting point of Bridge Street and Main Street, you will see the Victorian frontage of a commercial premises, originally the Masonic Hall. Next to it stands a classical looking, beautifully-crafted, early 19th century stone house, currently a guest house. Beside these is a tall, fine stone-fronted classical mansion, which is now the Bank of Ireland. It was originally the town mansion of the Lord of all of Ballinasloe, the Earl of Clancarty. A friend of king George IV, the Earl was one of the architects of the resistance to the emperor Napoleon. It could be said that he was the person to whom most credit is due for the layout, growth and architectural character of Ballinasloe as we see it today.

4 – At the end of Main Street, head along Bridge Street, then turn to the right to the pathway which runs to the riverscape where you can see channels flowing through the several arches of the long stone bridge over the river Suck, one of the town's most precious monuments. The Bridge has been in continuous use since the 16th century and its extension in 1754 prepared it structurally to carry even the heaviest juggernauts of today.

5 – Walk through to the far end of the park; you will approach St Michael's Church (1852-58) that stands in a commanding position over the Square. Its architect was J.J. McCarthy, a follower of Augustus Pugin (famed for other Neo-Gothic churches in Ireland) – and the design is said to have been revised by Pugin himself. Inside are many fine stained glass window. Of particular quality are those of St. Patrick and St. Rose of Lima, of 1925, by the renowned Dublin Stained glass artist, Harry Clarke and The Raising of the daughter of Jairus by Patrick Pollen, inserted in 1958.

6 – From St. Michael's Church now walk up St. Michael's Square back towards the Man with the Horse Statue. Take a left into Dunlo Street, an important street in the history of the town, which contains, together with other buildings of about the same date, the late-Georgian Garda Station. The Station is towards the far end of the street, on the right hand side. Also on this street, over Dolan's Electrical Shop, you can see another fine example of Diocletian windows.

7 – Halfway up Dunlo Street, turn right up Duggan Street, which will take you to St. John's Church (Church of Ireland, 1843). It dominates the vast Fair Green which becomes a hive of activity during one week every year when up to 100,000 people throng to the October fair. Look out over the Fair Green and admire one of the grandest freestanding classical monuments in the region. Dedicated to Charles Le Poer Trench, it was designed in the Neo-Greek style by the English architect George Papworth (1781-1855). A mile past this monument on the Main Galway road, South West of the town, the Earl of Clancarty's former country house is situated, where imposing gates mark the entrance to Garbally Court. It has been a school since 1923.

Walk down Church Hill onto Society Street and turn left, arriving at the Courthouse on the right. Society Street, like Main Street, was the 19th century location for the professional classes. As well as The Courthouse, it contains the former Bridewell (or gaol) from the 1840s. Further along this street, Ballinasloe Railway Station is a must. Constructed in 1851, it is a Neo-Gothic limestone tour-de-force and a fine example of the quality of rural Irish railway architecture in the mid-19th century.



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
