Welcome to Volume 9 issue four

So the Autumn gathers in with the heralding of the oldest Agricultural Show and the Oldest Irish patented Horsefair, reminding us all starkly of the origins of our Market town and how some 3 centuries after it was laid out – it still relies heavily on the farming or agribusiness sector that surrounds it.

This year's Irish Examiner/ICMSA poll, the sixth, found only 32% of farmers imagined a positive future. That ratio has more than halved in 12 months. A year ago 66% were optimistic. Two-out-of-three have become one-in-three in what seems an unprecedented crisis of confidence even in an industry as cyclical as farming. Only 11% of suckler beef farmers as viable, with 46% sustainable, and 43% vulnerable, according to a Teagasc Report.

Economically viable means income generated can support family labour at the minimum wage, and provide a 5% return on capital held in non-land assets such as machinery or livestock.

The Beef Blockade Crisis is not over, even though the last of the pallets and camp fires have been removed from the processor gates. During the near seven weeks of the protest the Agi Supplies Firms were visibly quiet, the Mart Sales were negligible and our wellington clad friends were not out and about as much on the high street, for shopping or entertainment.

I find it extremely odd that our Government can talk daily about house prices, alcohol prices, insurance prices, health premium prices, education fees, prescription charges, medicine prices

but have found some legal shield that conveniently prevents them about talking at all about the price of beef!

I can recall my late Paternal Grandmother describing vividly the depravations visited upon the small farmers during the Economic War with Britain; when Dev refused to pay the land annuities agreed by Treaty and the UK Government Blockaded Irish Farm produce. Calves were routinely drowned whilst we were all encouraged to "burn everything British apart from their Coal".

Between Mercoser, Brexit and the undeniable fact that we are all eating less red meat our Government has to find a way to allow Irish Farm families, on small holdings to stay on the land. It is just as important as Broadband to towns like Ballinasloe.

It beggars belief that we have lines of products in our supermarkets from the third world signalling "fair trade" which means the producer has sufficient

income to rear a family; often 10,000 kms from here.

Is it to much of an ask for our own Irish producers?

Other funding is sought around further town enhancement, rejuvenation of older buildings and investment in Tourism in conjunction with Failte Ireland Hidden Heartland initiative. We expect to have further update on this application in our next issue.

Over the past month we have had several Music Festivals in the locality all well attended, bringing people from far and wide to enjoy local hospitality.

The Annual October Fair is also upon us with 10 days of activities, followed by a new enhanced Zombie Walk (Trail of Terror) on 1st

& 2 Nov and the bi-annual people of the year awards mid Nov. Our newly formed Pulse Club / Ballinasloe Retail Life Group are also hosting a showcase event early December.

On a final note I wish to remind you Businesses in Ballinasloe have had a turbulent 9 months with the ongoing enhancement works, which will continue well into next year. This has made trading circumstances very difficult. ROADS, JUNCTIONS AND RESOURCES



The meat and veg of Council business was in plentiful supply at the recently monthly meeting of the Municipal District Meeting – Roads, Surfaces, and the lack of money to keep doing same vexed representatives and officials in equal measure.

Cllr. Dermot Connolly sought an update on the previously agreed Road Safety Audit for the treacherous Creagh Junction. The Council had been promised a T.I.I. Survey.

Damien Quigley Engineer confirmed the procurement process was complete and that Consultants would be appointed shortly with a report to Council to ensue within a few months.

There were a few motions unanimously agreed by Councillors to take in charge previously private roads which provoked a long debate about procedures and the limitations of Councils Resources.

The Engineering Dept made the case that currently the Council has not got the wherewithal to repair, resurface and maintain the thousands of miles of roads that they currently have and just adding to that burden without cash to meet it was unwise.

A long discussion about the unfairness of Galway County Council's annual equalisation allocation from the Property Tax and they way it limits completely the type of annual Estimate they can produce took place. If Councillors want more activity covered they either get more money nationally or raise it from an increase in house tax or rates their pre Estimates District Council Budget meeting takes place on the 23rd of October with the full Annual Estimates meeting in late November.

Cllr. Dermot Connolly had lots of representations about the speeding on a link road from Portnick into the Moycarn Lodge through an estate with lots of young kids. He wanted it listed for traffic calming measures. The Engineers also suggested that the matter for speed enforcement is really one for the Garda Siochana in the intervening period.

Under Chairman's business, Cllr. Timmy Broderick queried how a decision unanimously agreed and passed at the budgetary meeting of the District last Autumn was not implemented.

He detailed how a submission was made by the St. John's Parish Vestry seeking annual funding for the ongoing maintenance of the Town Clock. The District Council undertook to provide €1,500 per annum towards those costs. When he went to draw down the funding in Summer this year he was informed that the funds could not be released until the Committee made a specific application to a Small Grants Fund.

"What is the point in us taking time out of busy day passing motions and providing resource if the officials at Aras an Chontae refuse to recognise those decisions" he questioned.

All the Councillors present previously agreed with the Chair's version of events.

Director of Services Alan Farrell promised to review the decision and its implementation with Corporate Services stating that "it was highly unusual".

There was unanimous welcome to invite Paddy Mathews CEO of Ireland's Hidden Heartlands to address the Council about his plans and priorities for Ballinasloe with the roll out of the new Marketing plan for the Shannon Corridor.

Alan Farrell confirmed to the meeting that a strong element of the application to the Dept of Rural and Community Affairs was the Tourism element as part of assisting the town capitalise on its strategic status vis a vis the Hidden Heartlands and members were pleased to hear that the Council were in the final stages of appointing a new Tourism Officer.

Finally the Director of Services reminded the members that the Council by law must prepare a Five Year Corporate Development Plan 2021 – 2026 to consider the strategic priorities for investment and focus in each of the Municipal District. This process was being led by the Corporate Section and Policy group, there would be a call for public proposals and consultation but that Councillors should be thinking about what they would wish to see prioritised.





COUNCILLORS PUSH FOR MORE IMPACT

At their September Municipal **District Council Meeting, Cllrs** questioned the impact the **European City of Culture Galway** 2020 may have on Cultural activity in the Eastern part of the County.



A sum of €4 million has been allocated by the previous County Council to the €30

million plus programme on the understanding that programmed events would take place in the County. County venues, communities and arts groups would be engaged with the programme, existing cultural events and festivals would be marketed and promoted by the European Programme and the county would benefit from the legacy programme.

Cllr. Dermot Connolly wanted the officials to detail what the calendar of events was for the municipal areas after the significant investment and "hoped that with all the discussions moving away from the year to legacy he was adamant that a % of the specific legacy funds or projects should be ring fenced for each of the Municipal District or else it would all be swallowed up by the City ".

Cllr Aisling Dolan wished to know if the arts and culture groups of the county understood the deadline for inclusion in the programme for the year, if the Small Town Big Ideas project would run for the duration of the 2020 year and "that many artistic and quality cultural events that animate our annual calendar year in and year out here in East Galway will be fully marketed and promoted as part of the campaign and programme; as they will add huge value to the year ".

Cllr Timmy Broderick, Chair of the District Council stated " from what I am seeing and hearing, the City will be the epicentre at the expense of the county, with 4 months out where is the omph and the lack of engagement with the business community is appalling".

Cllr. Peter Keaveny was aghast to learn that there is no specific available funding stream for cultural groups "so I am right in assuming

that there is no 2020 funding over the next 12 months for small cultural drama, cultural or music groups all over the county ".

Alan Farrell Director of Services for the District Area explained to the meeting that the "Small Town Big Ideas Project" was the principal

avenue for the County towns and villages to have engagement with the programme.

He pointed out that the Council were not in charge of the project, that it was a separate Company that was set to manage the whole progamme which had the Chair of the County on the Board. As he was not personally involved he could not give assurances as to what would or would not be in the official programme but confident that the programme would reach out to all parts of the county. He was also sure that the online programme would indeed list all the significant county festivals and events.

The Galway 2020 European Capital of Culture launched its 164 page Official programme at a gala outdoor ceremony in Eyre Square last month.

It may not be surprising to some to note the county town is not mentioned at all but then neither is Clifden, Loughrea, Gort, Ballygar, Mountbellew suffer from the same fate.

The regular annual cultural festivals that light up our calendar year in, year out - don't even receive a listing in the official programme but we are assured they will be listed on the website and in follow up marketing collateral.

Naturally, all the annual festivals of the City of the Tribes have their dates fully listed in the official programme!

RURAL REGENERATION DEVELOPMENT FUNDING BID 2019

Its fingers crossed that B.A.C.D. may be third time lucky, as the management team and Executive Board on the Advanced Technology Centre Project have put in huge hours researching and detailing a fresh application, since the last rejection of funding in Winter last year by the Department of Rural and Communit Development.

Ballinasloe is a proven incubation hub for high potential MedTech and engineering start-ups. MEIC/Glan Agua established in the Enterprise Centre in 2007 with 3 employees. They grew the business to employ 120 people and in 2016 relocated to a 15,000 sq ft workspace in Loughrea (as there was no suitable space offering locally). They are still rapidly expanding and now have over 200 employees.

The development of an advanced manufacturing enterprise facility of 15,000 sq is a long-standing multi agency ambition and should prevent future moves of successful start-ups.

Specifically targeting relocating medical technology and engineering companies it is also designed to act as a second site for the fastgrowth companies and a specific focus to attract Brexit relocations. More than just workspace, it is designed as an integrated package of supports including facilities, a talent pool and education partnership with access to agencies.

The application estimates that approximate €2.5 million funding request would secure – the creation of 220 new jobs,

injecting an additional €11 million per annum into the local economy.

The Total cost of all the projects under the three strands is an ambitious €4.6 mil of investment but the Lion's share of this – approx. €3.7 being focused on the Enterprising Community element.

The joint application process conducted for BACD and Galway County Council was led by independent Consultants Momentum and included subprograms as outlined in the table.

It is hoped that the Nationwide announcement on successful projects will be made by the Department in late November/Early December.

DOROTHY SCARRY - NEW BUSINESS FOUNDER

Mountbellew native Dorothy Scarry is married to Martin Scarry and they have three children. Daughter to Tommy and Carmel Quinn, she attended Holy Rosary College, Mountbellew and followed that with four years in NUI, Galway where she obtained a HDipED, a Dioploma sa Ghaeilge and a BA in English, Sociology and Politics. She later completed a PGCE in Primary Education at Oxford Brookes and followed her father into the pathway of teaching.

With the formation of her new venture, Workplace Health and Wellbeing Ltd, in November 2018, she soon joined The Pulse Club as the idea of being part of a local business network appealed to her. She is also a member of the Grow Remote Chapter of the town and the Network Ireland Galway Branch. Dorothy was a finalist in the "Emerging New Business" category in the Network Galway Business Woman of the Year 2019 Awards.

She completed an MSc in Workplace Health and Wellbeing in 2018 after identifying the need for regulation and structures in the whole area of workplace wellness. The first few months were figuring out the exact target audience, the professional services that could be provided, the brand and the basics like how to close a deal. Service delivery began in Spring of this year and she has achieved a lot in a short space of time working with both private and public organisations as a consultant,

and others that are looking to invest in resilience and wellbeing interventions. In a nutshell, Dorothy's business provides evidence-based and theory-driven benchmarking, frameworks and workshops. Workplace Health and Wellbeing Ltd can work as a stand-alone unit in smaller organisations or link in with Human Resources and Health & Safety departments in larger organisations. They hope to employ 3 people directly by this time next year and 10 by 2021.

Dorothy also founded "Next Step Forward" in May 2019, delivering workshops to schools directly and providing 1:1 coaching on school transitioning for children moving from primary to secondary school and young adults moving from leaving cert to college. The idea for the service came to her having seen heightened anxiety and worry experienced by both pupils and their parents when transitioning from primary to secondary school.

She hopes that Next Step Forward can become a social enterprise and is currently looking for the correct pathway to achieve this. Dorothy has represented Next Step Forward on Cork, Limerick and Dublin radio stations and her articles have been published in the Dublin People, The Galway Advertiser and the Cork Independent.

Dorothy is a member of the professional groups INTO, Teaching Council, Association of Health Promotion Ireland and Occupational Hygienists of Ireland and the Society of Occupational Medicine. She is a Mental Health First Aider and has also completed further CPD in Health Coaching, Mindfulness and Nutrition, and is further is involved by being the GAA Club Secretary of Pádraig Pearses GAA Club in Ballymacward and Gurteen and is involved in all aspects of club activities from club development, events, fundraising and administration.

Ita Naughton, the owner of Image Boutique on Society Street, retired after more than 40 years in business, having witnessed the changing face of the town and

the retail trade over many years.

She enjoyed every year of her fashion business, stating: "I loved every minute of it and I am leaving the business with so many fond memories of the people I have met and the customers I have come in contact with. Their loyalty is something that I will never forget"

Initially, she started off as an apprentice in Thomas Burgess & Sons in Athlone - an outlet founded in 1839, the longest established department store in the country - and moved up the ranks, becoming a buyer for various departments. Even before she started working for the company, Ita had had an interest in fashion since her early teens.

She worked there for 20 years, enjoying her job very much. She then decided to open up her own, familyrun business with the help of her husband Patsy in early 1977, with her daughters and granddaughters having worked there.

Ita also received tremendous help from her sister Veronica Brooks – in more recent years her daughter Michelle became more active in the business, and her loyal staff comprised of Mary Egan, Ita Fahy, Bridie Carty, and Mary Mannion made the operation seamless.


Ita had a customer base from all over county Galway, South Roscommon, and Westmeath, catering mainly for younger to middle aged customers in the early stages, having fared well over the years. She observed the changes of consumer behaviour and especially seen the significant shift to online shopping in recent years which has undermined the niche independent retailer in all goods.

Significantly this wasn't the only thing affecting her business, she comments: "The roadworks had a big impact on my business. And when I heard they were going to return to Society in January and February in 2020, that did it for me. The pay parking situation of the past few years also really didn't help" states Ita.

All these factors signposted her route to finally go into retirement after so many years, though she will very much miss all the loyal customers from the over the years and has very much appreciated their business over the last 42 years - even those who just popped in for a chat. Now that she is retiring, unfortunately the business will also retire.

Ita, originally from Kiltoom in South Roscommon now resides with her husband Patsy, a farmer, having two daughters, Sheila and Michaelle, and a son David. Now that she is retired, she will not sit by idly, but continue to live out her creative side through gardening and painting.

The shop will close for good at the end of first week of October, and she has a parting message to any customers: "Use up your gift vouchers at the stock clearance sale!"

GREENWAY PUBLIC OFFICE FOR LIBRARY

The new public project office for the Athlone to Galway Greenway project will be sited in the office space above Ballinasloe Library on Society Street.

In summer 2019, a budget of over €5 million was allocated to the

Greenway project and confirmed by Minister for OPW Kevin "Boxer" Moran T.D. This allowed for the building of an underpass at the railway station in Athlone and allows for the planning process to take place for a potential bridge over the River Shannon to create a link with Athlone Castle – consultants have been appointed already for these construction works.

The Planning Office will see some 8 to 10 fulltime staff, occupy the new top floor incubation unit of the Library for an anticipated 36 to 48 months until the Greenway is in place. The office is meant to make it easy for the public to stay informed on any progress and ensure a better consensus amongst the community, with consultants also putting an emphasis on planning with landowners and other stakeholders

Significantly since the last time a draft route plan was flagged, the Dept of Tourism and officials have used some key learnings from Greenways in Mayo, Donegal, Waterford and Carlow to come up with a new code of "Best Practice for Stakeholder Management". This code underpins the concept that C.P.O. (Compulsory Purchase Order) along Greenway routes is not a long term advisable solution. The code has also taken into account some of the positive changes



that have been negotiated by the State, and landowners over access rights, owner occupier indemnity and insurance legal issues.

Senator Maura Hopkins stated, "It is essential that communities are engaged with at the earliest possible stage to ensure maximum support for this project. I know that there is a significant groundswell of support on the ground in Ballinasloe and across the region. It is important now that we can utilise that momentum to deliver this project in a timely manner."

Senator Hopkins believes that "This project has the potential to be the flagship tourism offering for Ballinasloe and the wider region. It will play a central role in the connection between the Beara Breifne Way and linking this region into the New Ireland's Hidden Heartlands Tourism brand.

"In particular, the Athlone to Ballinasloe section of this greenway has so much to offer in terms of tourism development. The wake house at Nure, the Clonmacnoise monastic site, Shannonbridge as well as the wealth of history which exists in Ballinasloe itself, all should be key sites of interest on this national greenway route.", continued the Senator.

"Fáilte Ireland is doing a lot of work to promote the region – Ireland's Hidden Heartlands – but it is also important to have structured amenities to allow for people visiting the area, getting attracted to it and making it possible to visit the local sights and enjoying the tourism potential this location has to offer. We have seen how greenway development can revive communities through the examples in Waterford and Mayo and I want to see Ballinasloe and this region benefit fully from that potential" concluded Senator Hopkins.





TOWN CLOCK SET TO CHIME ANEW

The Ballinasloe Town Clock will be restored to its former glory and painstakingly preserved for decades to come in a special event. On the night, as the clock strikes seven, a historic civic ceremony will begin with a procession into St John's Church, accompanied by the Town Band.

A memorable evening of community celebrations will begin with an ecumenical Service of Thanksgiving in St John's Church.

"This service is for all the people of Ballinasloe," explained the Rector, Reverend John Godfrey. "Together, we want to show our gratitude to all who have invested their time, talent and money into this remarkable project. It's about making sacred time to bless the

fruits of all our labours, before offering them back with thanksgiving to the people of Ballinasloe and its visitors."

Immediately after the service there will be a reception in Gullane's Hotel, with music, refreshments, and a chance to hear some of the stories from the people who were involved in the project. The evening will

also showcase a short film about the clock itself, which includes unique insights from local craftsman Kevin Cunniffe, who has maintained the Town Clock for many years.

The celebrations will mark the culmination of a major renovation project launched in 2017 by the Ballinasloe Credit Union to mark its 50th anniversary, under the banner TIME FOR YOU. Chairman of Ballinasloe Credit Union Adrian Ahern said "We wanted to mark that anniversary by giving something lasting back to the people of Ballinasloe. It's such a unique landmark - no matter where you are in Ballinasloe, if you look up towards Church Hill you can see it."

The Town Clock was originally presented to the town and entrusted to the Town Commissioners in 1901 by the Earl of


Clancarty, replacing the original turret clock which had been destroyed by fire two years earlier. It is exceptional in having four clock faces driven by the one mechanism; and its workings have been compared with those of London's Big Ben.

Over the last two years, nearly €90,000 has been spent on this project,

including a €55,000 investment from the Ballinasloe Credit Union, supplemented by funds from St. John's Church and by a grant from Galway County Council under the Built Heritage Investment Scheme. Works have been carried out by Rainey's Height Access Specialists, contractors John & Shane Cahalan, and sign-writer Colm O'Connor, under the supervision of heritage architect Gerry McManus, engineer Gabor Molnar and project co-ordinator Martin O'Duffy.

New cut-stone surrounds have now replaced the old mortar ones, ensuring that the external clock structure will be safe for generations to come. The top section of the tower has been repointed, in order to reduce the risk of damp from seeping into the clock in the future. Each of the four clock faces and its hands have been restored and repainted in gold leaf. New structural supports have been added to the bell tower and a new motor fitted, in order to allow the Town Clock to chime the hour once more. Furthermore, minor repairs have been carried out to the clock mechanism itself; the pinnacles on top of the tower have been repaired; and the lightning conductor has been replaced.

CHRISTMAS LIGHTS PROJECT TRIAL FOR 2019

Three years out since the Town Team's re energising of the Xmas Lights programme with the signature Wooden Environmental Tree in the Square and other installations, the dilemma of what to do for this season is all too apparent with the big dig underway.

The BACD Board and Town Team have canvassed business opinion and believe that leaving no lights up would send completely the wrong signals, so a draft plan has emerged to try and deploy the old lighting stock and use the limited resources to best possible effect.

Given that Dunlo St. ought to be fully finished in the mid Nov period, it should be possible to trial or experiment with different limited new shapes and forms of lights that will for season 2020 evolve throughout all the completed streets.

With the changes to the way the streets are powered, trans thoroughfare festoons of lights will no longer be useable; so some pole external illumination will have to be experimented with.

So St. Michae's Square in full and Continental Tree will be bedecked as per usual. Dunlo Street will have some new look installations and if works allow some hanging or signature lights will be placed in Main St and Society Street.

The plan is to use the old lights in parts of the town centre that are quite dark and tree or installation lighting might work best - like the Marina, Sli na hAbhainn, Harris Road, the Fair Green, or indeed the monument. Businesses are asked to share their views with their Big Dig Street Reps before the 15th of October or to any member of the Town Team or BACD Board.

The Festive Gathering will still take place on the first Sunday in Dec at teatime with the usual Yuletide fun and games.

All of this of course is dependent on the success of the town team fundraising events and the subscriptions of the business community as there is a much depleted Galway County Council grant available this year!

TOURISM CLUSTER WORKING GROUP FORMED

Failte Ireland's new Hidden Heartland initiative is to drive tourism to the centre of Ireland. Their target markets are not only overseas tourists, but domestic visitors to come and explore this region for a few days.

After initial discussions with Failte Ireland, B.A.C.D. has decided to put a piloting structure in place which would eventually make Ballinasloe and the surrounding areas, a TOURISM HUB within the Hidden Heartlands strategy.

Compilation of all the wide variety of attractions within a 15km to 20 km radius of the town has begun at a seeding meeting in the **Shearwater Hotel last August.**

A follow up workshop was held at the Enterprise Centre with representatives from The Hidden Heartlands and Galway County Council in late Sept to examine what models of best practice that this cluster of interests could partner with the agencies in coming up with a targeted and focused tourism offering.

It was very clear that any marketing or product offering route the group go would have to fit in with the current branding and priority for segmented visitor and Hidden Heartlands Strategy.

The Group are interested in hearing from anyone in a service or visitor friendly business locally who has services or facilities that could be included in the initial mapping exercise, or indeed would like to be involved.



LOCAL MAN BUILDING CAMBODIAN SCHOOL

Creagh resident and well known proprietor of the former Clonfert Print, Edward "Eamon" Conway is a man on a mission. Semi-retired and with more time on his hands for travels, he has pledged to help the people of the poorest parts of Cambodia to build a Village School from scratch. He was inspired to support the cause by his visits to Cambodia, having visited the country for the first time in 2017 where he was struck by the people, their spirituality, and humane nature, considering their difficult circumstances.

He has managed to raise €9,500 to date through various local fundraising efforts (Facebook, Table Quizzes, a Family Fun Day, etc.) and now hopes to raise another €5,500 to finish the works.

Aspire, or the Irish School as it is also called, is a school in Siem Reap Province, for poor, homeless, and orphaned children, providing free education English, Arts & Crafts, Computer Skills,

Gardening, and Khmer Traditional Dancing. Currently, it has 75 students - 15 of which are orphaned and stay at the school. The works are not finished yet, but will be with the rest of the funds he hopes to raise though a special Fundraising Concert in the Town Hall Theatre on November 20th at 8 pm.

The night will feature uplifting, sing along, and maybe even some Christmas music including talents such as Christina O'Flynn (His Eye is on the Sparrow) and her husband John, Ukephoric (a Roscommon based Ukulele group); Cill Aodáin Choral Group, Kiltullagh Community Choir, and local talents Saidhbhe and Ailbhe Concannon among others. There will also be a raffle on the night.

Cambodia is an elective constitutional monarchy located in Southeast Asia with a population of 15 million people.

Eamon got to know the country quite well through his travels, having seen both the wonderful areas such as ancient temples, Tonle Sap Lake (the second largest freshwater lake in the world) and the floating village (a village on the lake with stilt houses, schools, and shops rising and falling with the water level), but has also seen the horrors the Cambodian people had to endure - indiscriminate use of landmines, years of war and terror during the Khmer Rouge Genocide and the subsequent 20 year-long civil war. As a result, the healthcare and education system are now in shambles, and Eamon is determined to help them.

In 2014, a new Minister for Education has been appointed, but the focus remains on big cities, rural areas are still neglected - Eamon got to experience them first-hand through his travels, also visiting rubber plantations (in colonial times, Cambodia was an important source of rubber

sap for companies like Michelin), got to see traditional silk production, and tried the local cuisine - one delicacy being sautéed spiders apparently the legs are tastier than the bodies.

Sister Aidan Killian, whose passing has occurred, served as a Secondary School Principal for more than 24 years in the Diocese of Clonfert. Though born in Dublin, in 1928, Maria Killian and her family moved to Drum, Co. Roscommon when she was 13 years old.

She received her secondary education, as a boarder, in Scoil Mhuire, Ballinasloe where her aunt, Sr. Celsus, was the principal before

entering the Convent of Mercy, Loughrea in 1946. Following her profession she received the name Aidan and her first teaching appointment was to Woodford Primary School where she spent two years, followed by a year in Eyrecourt before graduating with a Commerce degree from UCD in 1957.

A year later Sr. Aidan founded a secondary school in Eyrecourt, where she was teaching principal until 1971. She was then transferred to Ballinasloe, serving as principal there for four years, then back to Portumna for three years and in 1978 moved to St. Raphael's, Loughrea where she remained the Principal until 1985.


The Mercy Sister spent the final years of her education in Portumna Community College from 1985 to 1993, and following a Sabbatical she volunteered to help out the Clonfert Sisters in South Africa, where she spent six months. She was always passionate about helping the poor and dejected, and particularly the homeless, starving children in parts of the world.


Many of her past pupils spoke of Sr. Aidan as a "gifted teacher" and in her retirement years she did "Grinds" in Maths both in CANA, Garbally Drive, where she lived from 1995 and in Scoil Mhuire before the era of SNAs. She also took the VEC training course in Adult Literacy and went to the VEC Centre in Lawrencetown for up to 7 hears, helping adults with literacy and numeracy skills.

Bishop John Kirby who celebrated Sr. Aidan's funeral mass, assisted by sixteen priests from the diocese, praised the 90-year-old nun for her contribution to the education of so many

students throughout the Clonfert Diocese as well as her work overseas. Many past pupils and teaching colleagues turned up to bid farewell to a remarkable lady who was looking forward to "meeting a loving, merciful God."

Sr. Aidan Killian is survived by her sisters Sr. Antonia, Athlone and Pauline Nolan, Bealnamulla as well as many other relatives, past pupils and friends, together with the Sisters of Mercy, Western Province.

its inception, and brings considerable managerial experience and knowledge to the role.


On his election, Mr. Brien paid tribute to the founder John Kilcommins and thanked him for researching the need for a cancer support centre in the town in 2009, and for establishing a committee and company to meet that need. At that time, it was a pioneering initiative. The Centre now provides services like a drop-in centre, bereavement counselling, cancer care massage, reflexology and many more complementary therapies to cancer patients and their families.

Mr. Kilcommins stated that the time was now right for him to step down in the centre as it is now getting the full support from the Irish Cancer Society and the HSE for Ballinasloe and surrounding areas. The Centre is affiliated to the Irish Cancer Society and operates within its guidelines. It is now in the process of moving to a ground floor premises which will be wheelchair accessible.

Mr. Kilcommins thanked the new Chairman, the committee members, volunteers and the therapists for giving their time, energy and expertise over the last 10 years. In that time, they have tended caringly for the needs of many people in the town and surrounding areas. He was very grateful for their commitment, dedication, loyalty, and sense of service to the community. He

wished them all well for the future and he said he was delighted to be involved with them and the Centre and to see it growing from strength to strength. He says he steps down now knowing that it is in safe hands with a caring and committed Chairman and team.

The Ballinasloe Cancer Support Centre is open 3 days a week but will be extending its hours when it moves to the new premises on Main Street in the coming months.





Each year, Galway City is numbed by the too frequent news of yet another tragic death due to drowning in the River Corrib. This city with many pubs and nightclubs near the water's edge has seen a chilling rise in the number of both accidental and suicidal deaths in the waterways over the past number of years, with five

lives claimed in three days earlier this year alone.

It was at this dark and seemingly helpless time, that two Ballinasloe locals decided it was time to act to prevent further loss of life.

Deborah and Arthur Carr have a long history of promoting mental health awareness in County Galway and founded the Galway East Life Support charity in Ballinasloe in 2013. They both looked at the situation in Galway and realised that at a person's most vulnerable and low point, there was no one there to help them. They decided that the city needed an 'early alert' system for potential water emergencies and together with a group of people who had experience of losing a loved one to the river, they formed a new charity - 'Claddagh Watch'.

Claddagh Watch, which came to fruition in the summer of this year, sees volunteers patrolling the most dangerous 'black spot' areas along the waterways at night time and into the early morning in an attempt to notice dangerous or concerning behaviour in people and to help them to safety. The Claddagh Watch volunteers look out

for vulnerable people who appear to be struggling due to alcohol or substance misuse or are showing signs of depression around the waterways, they approach them, and provide assistance and support if necessary.

Members of Claddagh Watch never enter the river, even in emergency situations. The main aim of the patrols is to prevent an incident and to notify the emergency services as

quickly as possible in the event of one. Currently, the organisation has around 70 volunteers which, in the first 10 weeks of the operation, assisted in 21 incidents, including 5 water rescues.

This charity would not have been possible without funding, equipment and the kindness of both strangers and friends including Wexford Marine Watch who donated the equipment that enabled the patrols to commence and the people of this town. The following businesses of Ballinasloe supported the enterprise so far: Gadget Tech, Main Street who donated an iPhone for use on patrol nights; Barry Taylor Cycles who donated two bicycles for mobile patrols on longer stretches of waterway, Signs and Systems who donated magnetic vehicle signs which are used to advertise the charity, Gullane's Hotel who provided funding for a long beam torch, an essential piece of equipment on nighttime patrols; Tomás & Caroline's daughter Eimear has been a dedicated Claddagh Watch volunteer since its inauguration.

This amazing support, along with the monetary donations online, is proof of how strong community spirit is in. City Hotels and Business have also been very helpful in supporting the work of the charity and volunteers.

It is already apparent how important and beneficial Claddagh Watch Patrol is to Galway City. This organisation is trying to make a difference, at what is a difficult period for mental health services in Ireland - It is so important that you simply talk - talk to your children, talk to your parents, talk to your friends and open up about how you

are feeling inside.

HOSPITAL WATCH - 50 BED UNIT CONFIRMED FOR

The 50 bed replacement unit at Portiuncula Hospital has been included under the new HSE Capital Plan 2019 – 2021, the works will include the replacement 50 bedded ward block, fire safety works, and lift replacement programme.

Maura Hopkins TD stated: "We know that the current ward block is simply not fit for purpose and this project is extremely important to improve conditions for patients and staff at the hospital."

Also included within the capital plan is the completion of two new houses for those with an intellectual disability in the town.


The ward block is on track to be completed by 2022, a commitment which was secured from the Government in Project Ireland 2040 by Denis Naughten.

"This is very welcome as it is now urgently required to address the chaotic situation that many patients, and staff, are facing in our local A&E Department. The enabling works required in advance of construction of the new ward block will commence with a followon commitment of funding to bring this long-promised project to completion. If we are to develop Athlone into a city then we must ensure that it has a hospital, and Portiuncula is that hospital, states Denis Naughten TD.

On top of this, a new heart failure service for the hospital has been approved, which will see patients diagnosed and treated quicker than in the past.

Working with local GPs the new pilot service funded by the Dept. of Health will see more patients treated locally by GPs with the support of the medical team.

The objective is to treat patients with heart failure quicker and before they need to go to hospital in the first place. For those who do



need hospital care this will be available to them far quicker and they will be discharged home in a shorter period of time.

The Irish Nurses and Midwives Organisation (INMO) Trolley Watch. Every morning at 8am, members count how many patients are waiting in the Emergency Department for a bed and how many are waiting in wards elsewhere in the hospital.

Data collected over the August months shows a 137% increase of patients having to wait on trolleys or elsewhere in the country over the last 10 years, with an increase of 20% from 2018 to 2019 throughout Ireland.

Portiuncula Hospital also experienced a significant increase in waiting patients, having gone from 67 in 2009 to 129 in 2019, with a significant spike of 162 in 2018, compared to 2017. This year's numbers have decreased to 129 and the new hospital ward should help the numbers decrease even further.

Meanwhile on Rate My Hospital .ie Portiuncula lies 29th of 69 public and private hospitals with an average score of 73% against the average of 71%. Roscommon is ranked 35th, Merlin Park is ranked 39th and University College Hospital Galway is 65th out of 69th with a score of just 60%.


As a heritage event, it has no equal. The town is very fortunate to host this unique gathering, a point acknowledged by President Michael

Nora Flaherty (treasurers), and Patricia Lawless.


To give the residents a goal and incentive to work towards, the estate entered the Best Kept Estate Award Scheme, showing off their pride and how much hard work has gone into it. Mary, the secretary,

stated she had been born with the ability to grow things – a skill that takes time to master as she discovered, saying: "I think I killed a few plants while waiting for my ability to catch up with my enthusiasm." She loves flowers and shrubs, seeing them everywhere looking pleasant and neat.

Popular plant choices for the group always include pollinator friendly flowers, such as heathers and roses, fuchsia (lovely ones that are an attractive feature during Summer and Autumn), as well as hydrangea and lavender as they require very little maintenance apart from pruning them back in Autumn.

The entrance and the top of the estate is mowed once a week, the flower beds are weeded, the estate is swept and paint jobs are being done regularly on the fence, walls, gate, etc. with other regular works being done as well; all by voluntary effort.

The ensuing campaign saw 2,000 odd signed objections delivered to the Environment Section of Galway County Council on the day of the deadline Monday 9th September. Combined with a number of other postal and over 150 objections submitted by email. This is equivalent to 1 in 3 people in town and could cover most

Under the Statutory Process, once processed, all of the objections will be submitted to the operator for a response over 25 working days.. These objections and response from the applicant will then be reviewed and evaluated by the Environment Section over the following 25 working days. A decision is expected towards the end of November 2019. In the meantime the Action Group are preparing for next steps depending on the outcome.

"Support is evident from all parts of our community. There was no proper consultation or Environmental Impact Assessment' completed for this development. We are committed to this campaign and to our vision of a safe and healthy Ballinasloe for all of the families in our town" stated Councillor Aisling Dolan.


Sean went to St Grellan's Boys School and then Killure National School where his late mother Nuala taught. He went to Garbally College and started playing golf

in his teens alongside his Dad in Ballinasloe Golf Club and is still a member to this day. He tries to get in some rounds with his father when he has the time.

He started in Templemore after school as a trainee Garda and was first stationed in Pearse St., Dublin. He went on to serve in Tullow, Co. Carlow, The Aran Islands, Croatia with the UN; Salthill, Clifden (on promotion to Sergeant) Galway, Newcastle West in Limerick (on promotion to Inspector), Galway, Westport (on promotion to Superintendent) and Tuam.

Before he was promoted to Chief Superintendent in Clare in July of this year he was the Crime Superintendent in the Galway Division.

Sean would like to see the Clare Garda Division keep its individual division status, but he also said the public shouldn't fear changes proposed under the Future of Policing Plan.



"The reason is they want the divisions to have more consistency. At the moment, you have some divisions that are very big, and you have somewhat smaller ones. So their recommendation is to look for bigger divisions and that allows them to be more autonomous in terms of resources, budgetary and financial expenditure and training.

"Any chief superintendent is supported by a divisional office here or in another division and it shouldn't really have an impact where that office is as long as his/her first line managers are based locally".

Last February Chief Supt Colleran was tasked with the responsibility for crime in the Galway division and out of that he said he intends to place more of a focus on economic fraud. "This is something we will

be focusing in on from September that people should never ever give out any sort of banking details. I've seen it in Galway and it's becoming a huge thing".

"My main job is to make sure that we are making best use of what we have, whatever it is, you'll always want more, and it is a natural thing. My main thing is to give comfort to the people that they're in a safe county that is well policed and that when something happens we can respond. The one thing I will be saying to any garda down here is that we try to treat people in the same way as we would like them to treat their own family and everyone is our customer," he said.

He said this year has been an eventful one for the division with the visit of President Trump, the Irish Open and later the visit of Vice President Mike Pence.

Hopefully he'll still get some time to play a few holes with Paddy in Rossgloss.

NATIONAL SCHOOL NUMBERS HOLDING



Since last September, the number of National Schools in the Life Magazine catchment (within the common bond area or a 15 km radius of the town) has dropped from 19 to 18 with the closure of Attyrory N.S.

However a quick analysis of enrolments at National Schools in the catchment area has remained consistent, with a steady number of students across the board. Data was collected from the 18 different National Schools.

Creagh NS remains the school with the largest number of pupils at 415, followed by Scoil an Chroi Naofa 294 and Gaelscoil Ui Cheithearnaigh 220 - all boys and girls mixed schools, under the Patronage of the Diocese.

The number of junior infants has remained steady, while there is some small increases and decreases as the table illustrates, with an increase of 1.76% of students enrolled; 207 children started junior infancy in 2018 and 216 in September of 2019.

All in all, 1896 students are enrolled in primary schools all over the catchment area, which is a lot of pick ups, collections, school lunches and school events!

"Any colour-once it's Black"

Seventy years ago, in 1949, Ballinasloe's last family-owned paper "The East Galway Democrat" ceased publication. Its last editor was the late Nicholas O'Carroll, a member of the well-known O'Carroll dynasty in the town.

"The Democrat" was described as "the local rag" for well over one hundred years, fearless in its reporting of news and sport in the community. It was renowned for its back page column "Under the Lamp" where it highlighted the highs and lows of the town's personalities, often revealing their individual lifestyles for their curious readers.

Located in Society Street, at the rear of O'Carroll's Hotel, "The Democrat" offered a limited commercial printing service. Like Henry Ford they produced literature "in any colour once it was black!"

Seventy years ago, in 1949, Colour Printing was introduced to Ballinasloe when a 33-year-old man established Kelly's Printing Works in St. Michael's Square. Later Kellys purchased the old Democrat premises and 30 years after moved to Poolboy. Over the years the family-run business has invested heavily in modern technology, increased to a 30,000 sq. ft. plant on the Poolboy Industrial Estate and is a major employer in the town.

PAST PUPILS GATHER FOR 100th ANNIVERSARY





Ardscoil Mhuire in Ballinasloe, are celebrating their 100year anniversary of establishment in the town, and held a special day of celebration and commemoration for part pupils and public. The festivities took place at the school itself, where members of the public and, especially former students were greeted by today's prefects and many staff and former staff.

The day started with a short presentation from some of the students who gave an overview of the history of the school, followed by mass with Bishop John Kirby accompanied by music - a choir and a trad group made up of current students. Former Deputy Principal Phil Lally one of the Co-ordinators said: "It's a very historic day. The Mercy Sisters have contributed enormously to the town, and while there are no Mercy Nuns working here in the school now, their rich legacy has really continued."



"BLITHE SPIRIT" RELAYS 60th ANNIVERSARY PRODUCTION

The washout of three unique athletic meetings in the fifties, led to the establishment of the town's Relays Drama Group. Fr. Kevin Ryle, a professor of history in Garbally College a member of the World Athletic Coaches at the time, decided to introduce this new form of sports meetings to Ireland.

An emergency meeting of the athletic club was held after it became "financially embarrassed" because of the losses incurred annually. Fr. Ryle then came up with the solution. Being a townsman of John B. Keane, who had just written a play called "Sive" in which the priest's sister,

Nora Relihan, had a leading role. The play had been rejected by the Abbey Theatre but had got widespread publicity as a result and he believed it would be a success. He would be able to acquire the performing rights but he hadn't a cast to stage it.

A few people locally, who had stage experience, were approached. The late Dermot Connolly and Margaret Geraghty had appeared in several productions and with their help a group was formed to stage "Sive" in the Town Hall, for three nights in 1959

Fr. Ryle's sister from Listowel made a guest appearance in the role of Mena Glavin for the opening night. Little did the hastily-convened group realise then that they were to become an overnight success, leading to enquiries for them to stage the show in London and New York. Under the production of Fr. Ryle, the Keane play packed the Town Hall to the rafters and touring venues in the four provinces - to see only the second group in the country to stage the block-buster.

Members of the original group included Dermot Connolly, Margaret Geraghty, Michael Cooke, Liam Keller, Patty and Joan McGuire, Liam Keller, Billy Vaughan, Paddy Corban, Martin Greally with a stage crew of Peter Weafer, Seamus Darcy, Jack Quinn, Michael Cullen, Ken Kelly and Declan Rankin. The faces may have changed but the Relays Drama Group is still performing and sometimes touring with plays by different authors, continuing a tradition set up

The cast are currently rehearsing for their upcoming production of Noel Coward's comic play Blithe Spirit, being performed in the Town Hall Theatre Wednesday & Thursday October 16th & 17th

The play concerns the novelist Charles Condomine, who invites the eccentric medium and clairvoyant Madame Arcati to his home to perform a séance, hoping to gather information for his next book. The scheme backfires with the materialisation of his first wife Elvira, who attempts to disrupt his marriage to his second wife Ruth, who cannot see or hear the ghost.

The piece was first performed in London in 1941 and continues to be performed by both amateur and professional groups to this day. It is directed by Mary O'Connell and Mary Rose Finland and includes the actors Brendan Boland, Lucy Dolan. Emily Lohan, Dean Flanagan, and Zara Little-Campbell.

ALL SHOOK UP - NEW SPRING SHOW

Lily Kelly, owner of Lily Kelly's Art Studio, contributes greatly to the ecology of the town, both in a cultural and economical way. She works together with local businesses, supporting them and the local economy.

She first started her business about 6 years ago, when she opened her own studio. Back then, she was based in the Ballinasloe Enterprise Centre in Creagh, where the

Development Company offered her a small, but very affordable, studio space so she could set up shop. Since then, she has moved to her own Art House in Liscappul, feeling like it was the right time for it.

In 2017, Lily organised a project as part of Culture Night called "Happy Faces from Different Places", mainly focussing on old derelict buildings in town. 28 artists, children, adults, teens, a group from the Brothers of Charity, and families from Syria who had just moved to the town got involved, painting faces on the buildings, to some

With her shop, she closely works together with other local businesses, proving that keeping business local can have a knock-on effect. Her art supplies for example are purchased in Salmon's - keeping business in town rather than going to Athlone, as well as generally hiring Downey's as a catering company for different events.

Another firm impacted by Lily's Art Studio would be the Oat Gallery. They supply all the frames for the art works, having been in the picture framing business for 30 years. Lily gets advice in regards to frames from the owner, Michael, who runs a secondhand bookshop in the Gallery as well, featuring some good old art books.

J & S Photos on Society St also works closely with Lily, as she uses the shop for all photos, printing, and cards for the art studio.

Through the exposure being given to the artists through the studio, and now J & S Photos, opportunities open up for them as well. Emel, one of the featured artists, has had a commission for a window for the Angel shop this Autumn.

Lily also gets involved in the community in a variety of other ways. Every Wednesday, she hosts adult art classes in the morning and evening, children's art classes take place on Wednesday afternoons and she offers drop in classes for kids on Saturday mornings.

Lily also helps out junior and leaving cert students if they need assistance with their work, especially when it comes to drawing, which she loves to do. She has been working as a tutor with a group of artists at the Brothers of Charity Service in Clarenbridge who held their first group at the Art House earlier in the year.

As part of the clubs ongoing Development Plan, the club are currently in the process of drawing down a €48,000 Sports Capital Grant to purchase a new drive on mower to help maintain the clubs pitches and for upgrading of the main grass pitch floodlights.

The club are also hopeful of securing a grant under the 2019 scheme which is due to be announced very soon and if successful will use this grant for additional upgrading of floodlights on the astro turf pitches and a full upgrading of the fencing at the astro turf pitches.



GALWAY'S ALL-IRELAND ONE HUNDRED YEARS AGO

this years ago **Galway** month, senior footballers contested their first ever **All-Ireland** final but thev hammered by Kildare on a scoreline of to 0-1. A record Croke Park crowd of over 32,000 saw the mighty Larry Stanley lead the Lilywhites to victory

Sunday, 28th September 1919.

St. Grellan's Club in Ballinasloe had won seven Galway senior football championship titles in a row from 1913 to 1919 (a record still unbeaten), so it was no wonder that ten Ballinasloe players lined out in the maroon and white in Croke Park. They were captained by Tom Egan of Derrymullen, while the other team members were Denis Egan, John Egan, Peter Higgins and Mick "Knacker" Walsh (all Derrymullen), Paddy Roche, Jubilee; Jack Hanniffy, Creagh; Gilby Jennings, Town; Larry Raftery, Town and goalkeeper Tom McDonnell, Poolboy. The remainder of the team

comprised Harry Burke and Gerald Feeney (Tuam), Martin Cawley and Michael Walsh (Athenry) and Matt Flannery (Galway City).

On the way to Croke Park, Galway had beaten Mayo and Roscommon in the Connacht championship but it took a replay win over Kerry (4-2 to 2-2) to reach the decider. Galway's solitary score against

Kildare came from John Egan.

However six members of that 1919 team played major role Galway's first All-Ireland title success, against Mayo, in 1925. They were captained that day by Mick "Knacker" Walsh-one of eleven Ballinasloe players on the winning panel.


Football was strong in Ballinasloe at that time and

records show that thirty junior players were registered by the St. Grellan's Club in 1919, many of who went on to represent the county in later years. Ballinasloe footballers featured on every Galway All-Ireland senior success except in 1998. With wins in 1925, 1934, 1938, 1956, 1964, 1965, 1966, 1998

and 2001, football fans now fear it may some

time before the Sam Maguire returns to Suckside again, pointing out there is a dearth of footballing talent in the East Galway town.

HALCYON HEROES PLAYING IN DUGGAN PARK 3 BY KEN KELLY

GAA fans in many parts of the country are wondering why Ballinasloe's Duggan Park has failed to cater for major inter county matches over the last few decades. Once described by the doyen of Sports Reporters, the late John D. Hickey of the "Irish Independent" as the "best winter playing surface in Ireland" its failure to be selected for big games has had a major effect on the commercial life of the town and the hinterland.

Duggan Park regularly staged the Railway Cup semi-finals in February each year, in both hurling and football, while the local derby involving Galway and Roscommon, in any code, attracted a bumper attendance. Connacht championship, National League and Goode Cup competitions saw the cream of inter-county GAA play in the grounds that were first opened in 1934. One man that was the driving force in the development of the stadium was the late John "Tull" Dunne whose influence in attracting top games to Ballinasloe was legendary.

From an early age I was fortunate to see and report on the talents of some of Ireland's greatest GAA players, in both codes, playing in the Duggan Park. In my opinion the following were the best teams I would select from a multitude of sportsmen I saw in action over the past sixty plus years.

OUR PLACE IN TELECOMMUNICATIONS HISTO

In 1885, long before we got our first Telephone Exchange which was in 1914, a telephone line was erected along the Canal bank from Pollok's farm at Sycamore Hill, Lismany to the Hardware and Seed premises of Mr. P.M. Scanlon at Main Street, (near Kellers Hardware) in Ballinasloe.


The purpose of the line was to facilitate ordering the many items needed by Pollok and his Farmsteads which would subsequently be delivered to their own private Canal Depot. As such, the telephone would have been among the very first rural telephone lines anywhere in the country.

This however was not the basis for a claim made to The Guinness Book of Records, or

even the fact that Pollok's farm was arguably the most modern in Europe, a farm which earlier in the century caused one of the most powerful men in Europe, His Highness Prince Joseph Charles Napoleon, to visit. That event and the fact that His Highness was actually in Ballinasloe twice is an interesting story for another

I believe, and the Guinness people agree with me insofar as we can be sure, this particular private telephone line played a unique part in legal history. An extract from The Freemans Journal of Monday 30th of March 1885 and similar from The Westmeath Independent of April 4th recorded: "The use of the telephone was manifested in a striking manner the other day in the neighbourhood of Ballinasloe. Our local correspondent informs us that a tramp was charged at the Petty Sessions on Saturday with having stolen a coat and a five pound note belonging to Patrick Holland, in the employment of Mr. John Pollok, Sycamore Hill, Lismany".

It seems Mr. Holland left the coat which contained a five pound



note in the stables while he went to his dinner. The fact that a working man could afford to have a five pound note in his pocket is indicative of the standard of living available to those in the employment of Pollok, perhaps it was Pay Day.

When Mr. Holland returned to the stables he found his coat and money had gone! He immediately told the lady in the house of the theft and she 'phoned' the message through to the Hardware Store in Ballinasloe owned by Mr. P.M. Scanlon.

Mr. Scanlon lost no time in reporting the matter to Head Constable Henay. Men were subsequently set to watching the approaches to the town from Lismany. That evening Constable Deacon observed a man coming along the canal bank. He arrested him and found the stolen coat and the five pound note on his person.


The prisoner, John Murray of Abbeyleix, was charged - 'at the suit of The Queen' - with having on 27th March stolen the coat and money and other objects, the property of one Patrick Holland. He was sent forward to Loughrea Quarter Sessions on June 6th 1885 where he was found guilty and sentenced to Seven Years Penal Servitude. It was noted that Murray who was described as a Tramp had already served a similar sentence.

The reason I submitted the case to The Guinness Book of Records was that I felt it could well have been the first case of an arrest being made as a direct result of a telephone call.

Bringing the story up to date, I spent my entire working life in telecommunications. I have seen matters progress from our purchase of U.S. Army surplus equipment after the War right up to the introduction of Fibre Optic Systems.

My nephew John continues the tradition and is an engineer with

This year during which Ballinasloe's Ardscoil Mhuire celebrates its centenary it seems appropriate to recall the life of one of the school's lay teachers from its earlier days. The daughter of a boilerman at Cork Lunatic Asylum, Eileen Gould was born in Sunday's Well on 10th June 1900.

Eileen was described as a wilful, high-spirited, outdoors-loving extrovert with a classical profile, and deep brown eyes under a cloud of dark hair. She enrolled at University College Cork, but her studies were interrupted by the War of Independence when she joined Cumann na mBan. Taking the anti-Treaty side in 1922, she was arrested and jailed the following February. By now she had become totally disillusioned with her comrades-in-arms, judging them to be destitute of any genuine idealism. On her release she resumed her studies at UCC, graduating with a degree in economics.

While attending an Irish language summer school at Cork's Presentation College in 1918 she had met her future husband, Seán Ó Faoláin, who would go on to become a world-renowned short story writer as well as the founder and editor of "The Bell" literary magazine. He became a frequent visitor to Ballinasloe after Eileen had secured a teaching post at the Sisters of Mercy girls' secondary school (known colloquially at the time as "The Intermediate"). From his autobiography, published in 1963, it's evident that his impressions of the town were anything but favourable: "The last time I had seen Eileen before my return to Cork in January of 1924 was in Dublin, when she was returning from Cork after the Christmas holidays to her job as a teacher in Ballinasloe, a country town lobbed from a parachute into that flat, wind-swept and rainswept land known as East Galway, as often flooded as drained by the River Suck and other lesser tributaries of the Shannon. She had been there since the previous September. In her letters from this Irish middle west she had already evoked the town for me with a brilliant and hideous vividness born of a growing terror that she might never escape from it, or that if she did it would only be to another, identical Ballinasloe. In her talk she now evoked it again,

as if warning me of what lay in store for me as a teacher in a similar country town.

"Through her eyes I saw the long, wide street, lined by undistinguished houses mostly with shops on the ground floor, climbing the slight ridge that alone seemed to



keep the whole place from sinking into the bog to its chimney tops. She lived in a lodging house that catered to the town's bank clerks, a class that at that time was the nadir of depressed gentility. They dined together in a long room 'carpeted' with chilly linoleum, heated by a central stove, and they shared one small fire in one small parlour. She was the only girl in the house and found no interest in any of them, so she had to retreat every evening at seven o'clock to her bedroom after the usual supper of 'tea and something', meaning tea, bread, butter, jam, and an egg or two. When she closed her bedroom door, and thought of the damp, dark land all around her from the Shannon to Galway Bay, and the long, damp, empty street below her window, and the long, empty evening ahead of her, she confessed that she often used to feel within an inch of Ophelian dottiness, sitting there alone, thinking, in fury, of all that was happening elsewhere in Europe. Outside, the Irish wind came blowing down the slope of Main Street." (I suspect that the Main Street he refers to is in fact Dunlo Street.)

It is, however, reassuring to learn that the town had at least one redeeming feature: "When that summer ended Eileen went back to the full life of her Main Street and I set off for mine. On our last night together before that parting she said that she was looking forward to Ballinasloe's one picturesque week, when the most unlikely of all things happened to the town – an invasion of buyers





from continental Europe for its famous October horse fair, after which, she sighed, the town would sink back into the silence of its bog grave for the rest of the year."

For Eileen, escape from Ballinasloe was effected in 1925 by an appointment to a technical school in Naas, County Kildare. In 1927 she travelled to Boston to join her fiancé, a post-graduate student at Harvard. There she found secretarial work that kept her gainfully employed up to her wedding with Seán in the Cathedral of the Holy Cross, Boston, on 3rd June 1928. Four years later she gave birth to their first child, Julia, who inherited her parents' talents by carving out a successful career as a well-regarded novelist. Subsequently a son was born, Stephen, who grew up a troubled young man, eventually becoming estranged from his family.

By the 1940s the Ó Faoláins were domiciled in Dublin. Seán was secure in his reputation as an acclaimed author and Eileen had begun to blossom as a writer of children's fiction. Amongst her prolific output may be mentioned such titles as "The Shadowy Man", "The Children of the Crooked Castle", "High Sang the Sword", and "Children of the Salmon", together with what is generally considered her masterpiece, "Irish Sagas and Folk Tales".


An avid and artistic gardener, she was shrewd in financial matters

and regarded as a hospitable host. Unfortunately, the decade of her literary success coincided with the onset of near-chronic illness. She was afflicted with stomach ulcers and osteoarthritis, and became a prey to hypochondria, her mental equilibrium probably not at all helped by her husband's repeated infidelities.

In her eighty-ninth year Eileen was admitted with a recurrence of internal bleeding to St. Vincent's Hospital, Dublin, where she died of a stroke on 20th September 1988. Though Seán survived her by over two years, he soon developed dementia and was made a ward of court prior to his death on 20th April 1991.







Ballinasloe History Walk

- 1 Start at the statue known as The Man with the Horse, where Main Street joins St. Michael's Square. From the crossing near the statue, continue by turning right onto Main Street. The prosperity of Ballinasloe in Georgian times can be seen in the scale and classical style of the buildings here. A fine group of four frontages stand across from the statue of The Man with the Horse. With shops and pubs on the ground floor for the most part, these Main Street premises have several floors above.
- 2 Walking along Main Street, lift your eyes above the shop frontages for one of the town's characteristic sights. There are the Diocletian windows that grace several facades. They are from the years after 1805 when the 2nd Earl was in charge. A window of this sort is formed under a semi-circular arch with two upright divisions so that the whole opening is divided into three parts.
- 3 As you stand at the meeting point of Bridge Street and Main Street, you will see the Victorian frontage of a commercial premises, originally the Masonic Hall. Next to it stands a classical looking, beautifully-crafted, early 19th century stone house, currently a guest house. Beside these is a tall, fine stone-fronted classical mansion, which is now the Bank of Ireland. It was originally the town mansion of the Lord of all of Ballinasloe, the Earl of Clancarty. A friend of king George IV, the Earl was one of the architects of the resistance to the emperor Napoleon. It could be said that he was the person to whom most credit is due for the layout, growth and architectural character of Ballinasloe as we see it today.
- 4 At the end of Main Street, head along Bridge Street, then turn to the right to the pathway which runs to the riverscape where you can see channels flowing through the several arches of the long stone bridge over the river Suck, one of the town's most precious monuments. The Bridge has been in continuous use since the 16th century and its extension in 1754 prepared it structurally to carry even the heaviest juggernauts of today.
- 5 Walk through to the far end of the park; you will approach St Michael's Church (1852-58) that stands in a commanding position over the Square. Its architect was J.J. McCarthy, a follower of Augustus Pugin (famed for other Neo-Gothic churches in Ireland) - and the design is said to have been revised by Pugin himself. Inside are many fine stained glass window. Of particular quality are those of St. Patrick and St. Rose of Lima, of 1925, by the renowned Dublin Stained glass artist, Harry Clarke and The Raising of the daughter of Jairus by Patrick Pollen, inserted in 1958.
- 6 From St. Michael's Church now walk up St. Michael's Square back towards the Man with the Horse Statue. Take a left into Dunlo Street, an important street in the history of the town, which contains, together with other buildings of about the same date, the late-Georgian Garda Station. The Station is towards the far end of the street, on the right hand side. Also on this street, over Dolan's Electrical Shop, you can see another fine example of Diocletian windows.
- 7 Halfway up Dunlo Street, turn right up Duggan Street, which will take you to St. John's Church (Church of Ireland, 1843). It dominates the vast Fair Green which becomes a hive of activity during one week every year when up to 100,000 people throng to the October fair. Look out over the Fair Green and admire one of the grandest freestanding classical monuments in the region. Dedicated to Charles Le Poer Trench, it was designed in the Neo-Greek style by the English architect George Papworth (1781-1855). A mile past this monument on the Main Galway road, South West of the town, the Earl of Clancarty's former country house is situated, where imposing gates mark the entrance to Garbally Court. It has been a school since 1923.

Walk down Church Hill onto Society Street and turn left, arriving at the Courthouse on the right. Society Street, like Main Street, was the 19th century location for the professional classes. As well as The Courthouse, it contains the former Bridewell (or gaol) from the 1840s. Further along this street, Ballinasloe Railway Station is a must. Constructed in 1851, it is a Neo-Gothic limestone tour-de-force and a fine example of the quality of rural Irish railway architecture in the mid-19th century.
