The team toiled on this with the torrid back drop of burning of Immigrant Asylum Seeker tents and belongings in Dublin, and citizens illegally effecting road closure orders in Inch, Clare. I was rather hoping the C.S.O full Census would be released, but it will show that rather than our core urban centre population of 15% non-ethnic Irish (2016 figures) it will be slightly higher I suspect that the national average of 20%. Not being smug but we are doing the little things right.

We are hospitable and somewhat generous in continuing to make space for "the other", don't take my word for it, read here in these pages. There are 39 countries and ethnicities took part in the Creagh NS Intercultural Day, our growing and hard-working Indian Community hosting their Cultural Events in our Community Centres, Members of the Polish and Indian Christian faith traditions using our churches for special religious services in their own languages. The upsurge of good will to the new Travellers Women's Group. To top it off, two centuries after it was begun on the ISLAND on our fair green; our Indian Immigrant Community have re-established our Cricket Tradition.

There are challenges in the road that communally we must share together. We have solid foundations that ought to leave social media grabbing consawing incidents and car theft to the very, very small spectrum of human behaviour.

I am not troubled as to who will be lucky enough to get the keys to the new apartments, houses and residences that are being finished in the town centre, wherever these people will come from on whatever list.

We have had good interplay with the unknown and "the other", we have 200 years of being a caring town for the sick and the demented, the Ford of

The Countryside was never as Green as it has been the last few weeks and similarly there are many green shoots of economic development happening in our area.

As per every issue since we began 13 years ago, new Businesses are opening up, as are new clubs and organisations. We need to grasp the nettle while individuals and corporates are prepared to invest in our town as this will not always be the case as Economic Development take its meandering direction.

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Creagh N.S. has been granted permission to proceed to tender for two additional classrooms which includes their first ever Special Education Needs Class, as well as an additional mainstream schoolroom.

The teaching staff are currently taking advantage of every space available indoors and outdoors, reducing their own canteen to help cater for over 440 pupils. Tender are being sought over the Summer months and hope to have extra accommodation space by September for their growing waiting list.

The Department of Education has announced funding close to €700,000 for the expansion. Judging by similar classroom facilities on site, units will cover approx .025 hectares. The design for the modular units suggest installation by the available space towards Creagh Junction, but the school aims to maintain its green space and allocate room for a proposed softplay area.

In other planning developments, the Ballinasloe Wastewater Treatment Plant have applied for major upgrades to their facility to improve water quality for the town. UISCE Eireann hope to demolish existing inlet works and rebuild them with duty standby five screens, a screening handling unit, a vortex grid trap, a grit classifier, a storm overflow chamber, storm feeding station and a bypass channel with a manual bar screen. The developments will surround the full facility located north of town, Derrymullen comprising of 1.32 hectares.

A Natura Impact Statement for the proposed development has been prepared to guarantee no adverse effects occur in accordance to Uisce Eireann's Water Services Strategic Plan, ensuring safe drinking water for consumers. The planning application for such developments are currently being inspected by Galway County Council and a decision is due by June 20.

Since our last issue, further information has been requested from the new technology plant at the IDA site and for the Euro Giant, Old Woods store merger. Additional details have been received by Galway County Council for a .10 hectare site in Moycarn comprising of the 3 single terraced houses, 8 units, and on-site parking via applicant Raymond Sheridan.

An Bord Pleanála are still to rule on the 165 units behind Tesco, originally due last December 2022. The agency is currently facing a backlog in strategic housing development.

ECO PARK IN FORMER LANDFILL SITE

Plans to transform the former Kilconnell Landfill site are underway, developing the grounds into an outdoor recreational amenity and biodiversity park as a local and regional attraction.


The East Galway Eco Park will cover 60 hectares, nine times the size of Croke Park, offering multiple walking trails suitable for all ages, and other outdoor amenities including a cycling hub, adventure play trails, picnic areas and more. The park intends on being public and accessible to all at no cost.

Consultants Brady Shipman Martin and Fehily Timoney, have been scoping with the local community on these proposed developments, hosting a public information day in Kilconnell Hall. A budget of €108,370 has been allocated in the plan's early stages for the appointment of the design consultants, with funding of €50,000 being received through the DECC's Outdoor Recreation Infrastructure Scheme and a matching contribution from Galway County Council in the region of €59,000.

Following the consultation process, a landscape masterplan is to be finalized and submitted for approval through the European Protection Agency and Part 8 process in July, hopefully to tender Phase 1 works by October.

Project Manager at Galway County Council Mike Melody demonstrated the Eco Park progress to the local Ballinasloe Councillors during their Municipal District meeting in April. Cathaoirleach Cllr Evelyn Parsons welcomed the concept and requested a dog park be included.

Cllr Dermot Connolly concluded the presentation by paying tribute to all the hard work carried out by the East Galway Landfill Liaison Committee for making such developments possible for the Kilconnell community.



Councillor Declan Geraghty has been appointed as a representative on the Joint Policing Committee, a unique forum which gathers senior Gardaí with local politicians to discuss policing and crime issues from each respective county. Prior to his appointment, Ballinasloe was the only Municipal district in the county not to be represented.

Councillors from the Ballinasloe Municipal District have been vociferous in their appeals to have a voice on the committee, especially with the raft of recent break-ins and burglaries in the outskirts last Spring and indeed the impacts of the national crisis of police staffing, and drug problems endemic to all parts of the country.

Independent CIIr Declan Geraghty was promoted for this role as he has been hugely vocal in calling attention to crime and burglaries affecting rural communities surrounding town and been leading the set ups of Community Alerts in many of these neighbourhoods.

"There are critical issues that need to be addressed and there must always be a representative from our area speaking on people's behalf, looking for more resources, looking for more squad cars, looking for more gardaí to patrol the areas at times" states Councillor Geraghty.

Following his appointment, CIIr Declan represented Ballinasloe at his first Galway JPC Meeting. Chief Superintendent Gerry Roche was very transparent regarding difficulties in staffing in the Ballinasloe community, with the Counsellor and Superintendent engaging in robust debate in how to tackle crime in the area.

Regarding the epidemic of drugs locally, the primary means Declan feels to tackle these issues is through education. He hopes to promote the message to schools, local leaders,

youth clubs, sporting clubs about the dangers of drugs and the traffickers associated with them. "Drugs destroys communities, and it destroys people" Declan emphasised, "You do not realize what these criminals do".

He also believes it's important to target the supply of drugs, believing dealers are only getting craftier in distributing their stock, which is becoming more widespread throughout the M.D.C. region.

The next meeting of the Galway Joint Policing Committee is in early June, which Cllr Declan hopes will be an opportunity to push further for effective solutions on policing, crime and drug issues facing Ballinasloe.

St. Brigid's Nurses Home Campus in the 1940's

After a decade of neglect and various initiatives led by local Councillors, a Seminar by a Government Minister and The Town Team - the St. Brigid's Campus and associated grounds are to finally be sold by the HSE, with Galway County Council purchasing one derelict site and a lot of acres sweeping down to the River Suck on the southern side of the campus.

The HSE, who currently own the grounds, have indicated their interest to ready the Brigid's Campus for the market appointing a property sales advisor for the site.

Each of the three property campuses which include the 95 acre primary campus site under the clock tower, the 25 acre site surrounding the hospital premises across the Creagh Road, and the 62 acre Nurses Home campus situated opposite the main facility, are likely to be sold individually.

Galway County Council Director of Housing Liam Hanrahan confirmed at the May Municipal District Meeting stated that site will be acquired under the state register listing process to establish a domestic refuge for women and children in the old Nurses Home.

Galway County Council in collaboration with Safe Ireland and Government departments of Housing & Justice is finalising negotiating the acquisition of St Brigid's Hospital Nurses Home Campus for the development of a state-of-the-art regional domestic violence refuge in Ballinasloe.

This refuge aims to provide a safe haven for women and children fleeing domestic abuse, catering not only to victims in the county but also accommodating those who may prefer or benefit from sheltering outside their immediate vicinity. The refuge will offer short-term stays, ensuring a secure environment for survivors during their time of need.

Cllr Evelyn Parsons obtained confirmation through her seat on the HSE Forum that consultants are currently engaged in detailed survey work and valuations and that the project's funding mechanism will be facilitated through the Capital Acquisition Scheme (CAS), which supports the establishment and enhancement of essential community infrastructure.

By leveraging CAS funding, Galway County Council and its partners aim to create a secure and supportive environment for survivors of domestic violence, offering them a lifeline to rebuild their lives with access to a range of necessary services. Aspects of the Nurses Home building are protected and will require design before going for planning permission late 2024.

The refuge's development will involve close collaboration with Safe Ireland, a national organization dedicated to

supporting and advocating for victims of domestic violence. Safe Ireland ensure that best practices and expertise are incorporated into the refuge's design, operations, and support services, guaranteeing a holistic and survivor-centred approach.

"A regional domestic violence refuge is a very welcome vital safety measure for women and children fleeing domestic violence - an issue which has seen an alarming rise in recent years on a backdrop of the housing crisis and lack of refuge places. It's a vital & necessary response though not a solution to preventing the complex issue of domestic violence but offers protection to victim and survivors. Ballinasloe has a range of medical, social, educational, recreational, crime prevention

services - short term stays are being envisaged. However I also believe Ballinasloe now merits added consideration in view of its regional role in opening its arms to those in need yet again and that Government Depts should now ensure that

services are well resourced and every assistance given to have local capacities enabled", stated Cllr Dr. Evelyn Parsons.

"This refuge will serve as a beacon of hope for women and children fleeing domestic abuse, offering them safety, support, and the opportunity to rebuild their lives and to thrive in a society free from violence, where every individual can live with dignity and security", noted the M.D.C. Cathaoirleach whose work in highlighting the lack of resources and awareness in this area has been formidable.

Liam Conneally the new County Manager dangled the carrot of reform of doing business at his first meeting of the County Council - stressing the need to reduce Municipal District Matters clogging up main Council meetings.

In his previous posting in Clare he managed to get the Municipal Districts there to undertake more autonomy and direction over their own administrative and local needs within overall County Policies, amended Standing Orders and regulations - without recourse to changing the legacy of Phil Hogan's "reforms" of local Government, which in effect was more centralisation to County Hall and subservience to **Custom House.**

Cllr. Peter Keavney "Certainly welcomes it, wouldn't be no harm. We need more power in terms of housing and getting the most of our business done at the MDC meetings".

The oldest serving member of the M.D.C. Michael Connolly sated "I believe he hopes to spread work to the MDC's. he will make his changes slowly, potentially after Summer in August".

Clir Dermot Connolly was happy to hear of these proposed reforms "we also face staffing issues and are limited in what they achieve. I hope to see a greater focus coming forward regarding job creation, emphasising the fantastic infrastructure here from this new Manager ". noted Dermot.

"I would like to see more autonomy for the local Municipal District and ensure we have more freedom to receive funding without having to go through Galway County Council. For example, Ballinasloe is the only Municipal District in Galway to avail of the Just Transition Fund, but the most recent launch of the project was delivered county wide.", noted Cllr Timmy Broderick.

Councillor Declan Geraghty noted they do not have complete details on what these reforms entail but have faith in the decisions and direction of the new Chief Executive. "Chief **Executive Liam Connolly wants to work with Councillors which** is quite important, and is not attempting to limit the control of

the municipal local authority, which is welcome " expressed Declan.

Cathaoirleach of Ballinasloe MDC Cllr Dr. Evelyn Parsons welcomed these proposals and emphasised that each of the five Municipal Districts have their own separate needs and each require representation respective of their district. " We need more control and autonomy at MDC level over issues like the Active Travel mission and more freedom to control the Municipal Districts allowance's via Galway County Council in deciding which local community groups to support" stressed Clir Dr. Evelyn.

It's full steam ahead for the Ahascragh Distillery, which will be opening for tours of the premises this Summer, offering an elaborate tour of Ireland's newest and first ECO Energy Distillery of local whiskey and award-winning gin.

Just ten minutes outside of Ballinasloe, in a grain mill and store building dating back to the 19th century. The mill ceased operations in the 1950s and remained derelict until recent years when Gareth and Michelle McAllister restored the premises into a state-of-the-art craft distillery and visitor experience centre – a project worth over €6 million.

Gareth anticipates that on a five-day week schedule output will be 500,000 litres of pure alcohol (lpa) per annum, which will rise to 800,000 lpa when operations are 24/7. All going well, production could be expanded to 1.5 million lpa in a number of years.

Half a million litres of pure alcohol can make c.1.5m bottles of whiskey, which is a lot. "That would be our minimum, and that will have to grow" he insists. 15 jobs will be created at the distillery and visitor centre, with a further 60-70 indirect roles for suppliers, farmers, logistics providers and other local and national businesses.

Solar power installations are currently underway, with two out of five of their roofs being fitted with panels. The distillery will run entirely on renewable energy, with 70% being sourced offshore from wind farms and 30% from on-site solar panels and hydro wheels, enabling the team led by Cáit Baxter to

distil some of the first zeroemission spirits in Ireland.

Cait joined the team in late spring from her role as Senior Distiller with Dingle, in Kerry having worked her way up through all points of the Whiskey business since her first graduate experience as Tour Manager with Teelings.

Currently the rooftop on the fourth floor of their events and hospitality building is being replaced and restored. The space will be used for whiskey tasting, a bar, a retail space and for their visitor audio-visual experiences.

The exhibition area aims to celebrate the history of the building while also exploring Irish whiskey

making, the future of the Ahascragh spirit, and will include sample tastings of their UAIS, Clan Colla whiskey and Xin Gin products.

Similar guided distillery tours nationwide like Middleton in Cork and Bushmills in Antrim see basic admission prices around the €30 mark, with more being paid for more elaborate tastings – no doubt season one will be pitched appropriately and more information will be available on their social medias or website at ahascraghdistillery.com.

The distillery has the potential to deliver great tourism prospects to the village and locality with their tours. Marketing and Communications Manager Alison Greene emphasised that, along with dropping by their visitor centre, visitors should: "explore the locality during their stay, including the gorgeous walkways and scenic routes."

Meanwhile the Old Mill Shop and Café have their doors open – seven days a week Mon to Fri – 8 am to 4 pm, Sat 9 am to 4

pm and Sun 10 am to 3 p.m, offering appetising food and wonderful hot drinks. Their first batches of their premium spirits are expected to be finalised within the coming months.



"Over the past year the funds raised have meant that we can continue to deliver an extended curriculum to the children where they have many outside school learning opportunities. Our student buses have been subsidised to enable teams to represent the school at hurling, Gaelic football, volleyball, swimming and more, and this year we plan to use some of the funds to develop our play area and outside learning environment" explained Kate.

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Thirty-nine years from recalling when nearly 700 bicycles a day pedalled through town in the mid-80s between Garbally, Scoil Mhuire and the Vocational School, as well pelotons of cyclists from the National Schools - could be serviced from a zone 15 feet x 30 feet in John Fletchers old store - to today where very few cycle to school but our leading bike specialist needs 2400 square feet of space to cope with trade! tells us a lot.

For Managing Director Barry Taylor, just moving from his old 900 square foot premises on Sarsfield Road to the adjoining one - it's a lifetime of frames, pedals, helmets, ups and downs.

He started as a teenager for five years with Sean Fletcher's Dad, where they had 30 bikes on display and some 12 styles in the early 80s, through his first five years in Society Court on his own and then to his premises on Sarsfield Road, where he has been the epicentre of biking for 29 years!!

Today in the recently refurbished, gleaming new Bike Store -- he and his daughter Alanna - the new Store Manager keep an inventory of over 160 new bikes and over 20 styles with frames, spare parts and indeed complete bikes from their specialist suppliers deliverable with 48 hours of an online order!

"Since Gerry and Mike Barrett asked me to move in here 29 years ago I have had some wonderful years trading, some tough times - sure too, but I have seen three generations come to me for their bikes and made wonderful friendships. I'd say I safely knew 80 % of the town in the 80s and 90s - we all had to have the bike, and there were very few two-car families back then - but my how it has changed now - I would still know a lot, but there wonderfully so many new faces, new customers that I can't place or name ", he laughs.

While the school going age has no interest in biking, their parents and grandparents certainly do.

"Back then, it was either kid's bikes or racing bikes, now it's the leisure bike and the electric bike for the generation that is not on the road driving their kids everywhere anymore but want to enjoy cycling again and need a little help on some hills or on the homeward leg "explains Barry.

Since COVID and the development of specialised biking amenities nearby - they now sell a lot of Mountain bikes to cyclists who love the Slive Bloom Trails and other Western Cycle Ways - the growth of cycling clubs has really helped foster this new trade.

Alanna, the new store manager, is very proud to be walking into her Dad's footsteps and Barry is thrilled "herself and sister Rebecca grew up with me in the store and the way the business is gone so much online with ordering, banking, dealing with suppliers you need a wrench in one hand and the mouse in the other to manage it but Alanna has all those IT skills of her age and is putting them to huge effect here", states Barry.

Alanna is keen to stress that the store will not be losing any of its niche services "we are expanding our stock lines, our accessories and in time opening hours but quality servicing of bikes to a high standard will remain a key element of our business" she enthuses.

Currently opening hours are Tuesday to Friday 10 am to 6 pm and Saturday closing at 5.00 pm but they are examining changing their closed period once things settle down.

A lot of their new customers come from Tuam, Oranmore and Athenry - "they find it easier to come out to here for repairs or sales than using the clogged city zones", explains Alanna.

"I have to thank our loyal customers especially the people who helped us move in here and get everything up to shape, Mike and Gerry Barrett, John Donnelly, Noel Slevin, Aiden Dolan and of course, Alanna and Rebecca", states Barry.

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Numerous bus routes and new services for Ballinasloe have been underway since Spring as part of the Connecting Ireland Rural Mobility Plan 2023 and other policies developing public transport, providing the town with easy and accessible connections to other towns and cities within the vicinity.

TFI Ireland is now hosting a new bus route connecting Castlerea to Ballinasloe seven days a week. The 546 line operates three times a day at peak hours in each direction, leaving Portiuncula Hospital at 08:55, 12:30 and 15:00. The route covers Dunlo Hill, Castlerea, Williamstown, Glenamaddy, Kilkerrin, Moylough, Mountbellew, Caltra, Ahascragh, the Ballinasloe Train Station, Dunlo Hill and the Hospital, and costs €6.50 for the full journey, one way.

Other TFI lines, including Portumna-Ballinasloe and Loughrea-Ballinasloe, were included in the most recent Rural Mobility Plan for routes to receive major enhancements – chiefly more frequency of service.

Currently the Portumna Route 547 operates four times a day Monday to Saturday between 08:15 and 19:17 and twice every Sunday at 13:50 and 18:30, departing the train station for Eyrecourt and Laurencetown before arriving by the town's Castle gates.

Loughrea Route 548 operates three times week-round, leaving at 09:35, 16:46 and 19:15 and stopping by Kilconnell, Cappataggle and Kilreekil.

Final decisions are still awaiting to be made regarding the enhancements to be taken place, but Route 547 intends in adding Shannonbridge in its list of destinations. For an adult single, the Portumna to Ballinasloe line costs €5 and Loughrea to Ballinasloe is currently €2, with bookings being made at www.transportforireland.com.

Currently Senator Aisling Dolan is petitioning for a new route from Ballinasloe to Athlone along the old Dublin-Galway road. The line hopes to include the communities of Moore and Summerhill who currently do not have access to major facilities in the neighbouring towns including TÚS University and Portiuncula Hospital.

Following a motion sent to Minister for Transport Eamon Ryan emphasising this concern, Minister of State Josepha Madigan indicated that new



routes are currently under view. Senator Dolan emphasised that the Athlone-Ballinasloe route was a matter of urgency stating: "we need to see this happen sooner than 2024".

In other developments, a new bus service is now available by Citylink connecting to Galway city, stopping by Aughrim, Kilreekil, Loughrea, Craughwell and Oranmore. The bus departs from Creagh, Dunlo Hill and Portiuncula 10 times a day from Monday to Friday between 07:45 and 00:22, and 8 times a day Saturday and Sunday between 09:22 and 0:22.

The price for an adult ticket to the city costs €11.50, but reduced fares are available at €5 for their service departing Ballinasloe at 07:45 and their route leaving Galway at 18:30. Bookings and a full timetable can be found on their website at www.citvlink.ie.

Reduced fares are available for all the mentioned bus services through the TFI Young Adult and Student Leap Card, offering a 50% discount to graduates with a minimum of 16 hours of class time a week, or for commuters between ages 19 and 23. For those who qualify, applications can made to about. leapcard.ie.

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NAME THAT BUS

The East Galway and Midlands Cancer Support Centre are in the final laps of a creative new fundraiser, asking the wider community to help name their bus service which delivers patients for radiotherapy treatment in Galway.

Director Jacqueline Daly explained: "The routine of radiotherapy can be gruelling and draining on patients, as well as a worry for their families, but the support of the bus service can act to ease the patient's cancer journey and ensure the family support systems know they are in good hands".

Although undecided, three options have been shortlisted including 'The Sunshine Bus', 'Radium Gaga' and 'Bus Buddies', with a name to be decided in June. Their donation page remains open, already raising over €2,000, and contributions can be made at https://gofund.me/18784dca.





At the end of Main Street in Ballinasloe, a new café has opened at the former Masonic Lodge building; offering an alternative coffee spot for locals and a location to enjoy a variety of fresh treats and delicacies.

The vibrant and freshy decorated café of Pinky Moo Moos welcomes old and young to their establishment, with the interior space being designed akin to a retro milkshake parlour of the 50's.

On offer at the establishment are some speciality crepes, waffles, sandwiches, cakes, signature ice-creams, sundaes, as well as some hand shook drinks including milkshakes and slushies for the warmer summer months.

The Café is happily fully accessible for all, with a wheelchair ramp installed at the back door of the premises and a disabled toilet for customer use and space for some 50 patrons seated as well as offering takeaway.

The team behind the new venture aim to target morning workers in the vicinity who require a quick coffee or a wrap before their daily grind., the usual mid-morning tea merchants as well as catching some of the bustling lunchtime trade. The

café also aims to target a gap in the market for the youth of town who can now enjoy a crepe or milkshake with their friends after schools or indeed on the weekends.

Current opening times are still a bit fluid until they fully gauge



customer preferences. At the moment the café is running 6 days a week between the hours of 09:00 and 18:00, and eventually 10.30 am to early close on Sundays.

Plans to cater for kids' parties are currently on the cafés radar, who are considering having further menu options and deals for such occasions. Additionally special offers are planned for the June month, with more information being published across their social media channels or on the noticeboard at their store premises.

Supervisor / Duty Manager Deirdre Ryan has been encouraged by customer response so far. "The reaction from Ballinasloe has been brilliant, everyone seems delighted we have opened the doors up. Perfect timing just before the summer season" she noted.

For Deirdre what makes the café special, as opposed to other places, are the bright colours and the style of the place; "Many customers are often surprised by the fun theme when they enter and of course, Pinky Moo Moos claims to have not only the best coffee locally, but rather "the best in the world" explains Deirdre.

The business is still finalising some slots on their staff rota, seeking full-time, fully flexible staff and duty managers to work with them, preferably with prior Barista or Ice-Cream parlour experience. The long-awaited Ballinasloe Omniplex Theatre has finally opened to the public, with the cinema staff directing filmgoers to a variety of flicks suitable for all ages across their five screens.

It marks the return to commercial movie entertainment 26 years after the closure of Swanwicks – Central Cinema (where Utah is now) on Society St. This cinema was the younger of the town – with the Plaza Cinema in the Town Hall running from 1920 to 1983 prior to being decommissioned. Incidentally the last movie shown in the Plaza was David Attenborough's "Ghandi" and the last one in Swanwicks was "The Man behind the Iron Mask".

The Omniplex group is an Irish company owned by the Anderson family, being the largest cinema group operating on the island with over 37 locations nationwide. The movie theatre in Ballinasloe, opposite Aldi, offers a capacity of 448 people, showcasing the latest major movie releases and changing screenings approximately every four to six weeks. Screen 1 offers a MAXX Recline service, with each seat being fitted with an electric recliner.

"Guardians of the Galaxy" was the Premiere Feature movie for the opening days, Directed by James Gunn. The cinema will be providing some 11 full/part time jobs operational, with the premises kicking off with a soft launch on May 12. Ballinasloe Omniplex Manager Jamie Harkins stated "We had a busy first weekend and, although we were hoping for it, we were unsure we would get it with the soft opening."

Jamie Harkins, an Athlone native, is a great fan of film, taking a particular liking to horror flicks, comedies, and the occasional action film.

Starting with Omniplex, just over a week before their launch date, he quickly got settled into his new role and brandnew state of the art facilities. He could sense the buzz from the staff and audiences alike with the new prospect to town and worked well with his team in catering to their eager and enthusiastic customers over the initial few days. "We are all new to this Omniplex but as far as a settling in period it was quick. The staff did Trojan work and really pulled together to

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A new Extra Mural Education service has begun at the Ballinasloe Enterprise Centre called Mindfulness for Children, providing classes for kids on topics varying from dealing with emotions, remaining composed, learning about the brain and learning self-love and care.

The practice was established by Joanne Jordan, mother of three and a Newtown NS teacher. Approximately six years ago, Joanne discovered the world of mindfulness, helping her to cope with the hectic life of being a working parent. In 2021, she completed a diploma in Mindfulness and Positive Psychology and began teaching adult classes on the subject. Joanne soon realised children were in just as much need of the practise, having researched that it can mitigate effects

of bullying, help enhance focus for children with ADHD, and can improve mental health and wellbeing. She began teaching for children locally in March, taking classes every Friday and hosting ages 6 to 8 between 16:00 until 17:00 and ages 9 to 12 between 17:00 to 18:00.

Approved topics are taught through discussion, art, games and are concluded with gentle meditation. A typical class will begin with children sitting in a circle and sharing one positive moment from their week, helping to train their brains in having an optimistic view of their circumstances.

Following this, a new topic is thrown into the midst to discuss, such as how breathing can help regulate emotions. Art is usually intertwined with the topic and can provide children a means of expressing themselves.

Games and yoga are frequently held to help calm the kids and to enhance their mindfulness learning experience. These classes will help young ones to grow confidence, lead their own journeys and handle tricky emotions and thoughts.

Classes are one hour in duration at a cost of €10 per session, along with a discount for siblings of 10%. The business has just finished its second term, and will be recommencing in September 2023, but keep an eye out on their social media page thejoyofmindfulnessire on Instagram for updates on potential Summer activities.

Over 70 participants sweated to raise vital funds for training and maintaining the volunteer group's defibrillators in the The Ahascragh First Responders 5k Fun Run, recently.

Starting at the Old Mill Café and trekking past Topline Greens, they then looped the surrounds of Ahascragh.

Chairman Leroy Walker thanked the events sponsors and volunteers on the day, including Ballinasloe Civil Defence for demonstrating a CPR demo and providing first aid cover. The run raised in excess of €1,300.

The First Responders are formed of volunteers from Ahascragh who answer to 999/112 cardiac and Stroke calls within a 5km radius of the village. The emergency workers are trained in conjunction with the National Ambulance Service (NAS) alongside other local groups including the Creagh/ Ballinasloe responders and the Eyrecourt responders.

The group has been operating since 2008, originally established by James and Bernie Griffin. With the help of Padraig Glynn and Edel O'Brien, they have trained over 150 volunteers in the area throughout their lifetime, providing

valuable information in the locality to help others when required. The volunteers provide vital lifesaving before practitioners arrive from the NAS upon an emergency, and so far this year have been called out on 9 situations.

Currently the Ahascragh First Responders have defibrillations in Kilglass National School, O'Donnell's Pub, St. Cuan's Church, Killure School and Fohenagh Community Centre. Before the year is out, they hope to raise enough funds to install another defibrillation in the Eglish/Ervilla area to ensure they have the life-saving devices on all routes towards the village.

When the lockdown lifted, she realized her path in Reiki and took the leap, establishing her business in January 2023 in Tuam.

Reiki is a healing technique which uses gentle hand techniques to flow healthy energy from the therapist through the client's body to alleviate any blockages which may cause illness. According to practitioners, some benefits of the therapy include reduction of stress and anxiety in the body, helping with insomnia, treating depression, boosting morale and clearing negative thoughts, easing physical pain and helping relax a person suffering from illness or disease.

The Ballinasloe Cancer Support Centre, affiliated with the Irish Cancer Society, have begun this therapy at their hub on Cullen's Yard, just off Main Street, running from 10.00 until 14:00 every second week. Information on Reiki can be obtained from their office which is open at these hours every Monday. Wednesday and Friday. Louise will also be participating in the Sligo Camino on July 1, a challenging 36km hike from Dromahair Co. Leitrim to Cooloney Co. Sligo, to raise funds for the S centre.

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

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Methodist Minister Rev. Steven Foster recently moved to the area, living in Woodlawn. This was a very different and significant posting for the ordained minister, offering a whole new series of connections and a new circuit of Methodist churches to look after.

Steven and his family originally bordered North and South, living between Derrylin, Co. Fermanagh and Swanlinbar, Co. Cavan. He trained for the ordained ministry of the Methodist Church in Ireland 18 years ago and has served appointments in counties Fermanagh, Down, Longford, Wexford and most recently Tipperary, looking after the Roscrea, Cloughjordan, Borrisokane and Shinrone churches.

The Methodist churches were established as a critique of 18th century Anglicanism, having a stronger focus on spirituality, the ordinary needs of society, and a commitment to social justice. Steven believes that although the bible should be held in high regard and be respected, verses of the text should not be picked apart to suit ones opinions or agenda. There is currently a wide net of Methodist societies across Ireland, with about 212 churches North and South.

The founder of the Methodist Movement -John Wesley preached as part of his Irish Tour in a mound near where the SVDP Retail premises is, in 1785, members of his congregation built their first primitive chapel on the site after many of their sermons / events they would disperse tea and plum pudding. Thus the area's locale moniker became Tae Lane from the 1820s to 1923 when the street was named Jubilee after the Jubilee of the Holy Family Confraternity!

Our last formal link with the Methodists wound down with the congregation selling their then Chapel House in 1950s near where Divilly's stands today!

For a long time, Steven has been concerned about the place of the traditional church in wider society and the church's responsibility to grapple with the hard questions of attendance and engagement with the real intresting issues in our world. Contemplating on how he should address these problems, the disruption of the pandemic promoted him to step out and move into a new phase setting of ministry.

With the Methodist Minister based in Woodlawn, he is active across East Galway and the city, engaging with various community groups in the area. He also maintains commitments outside the county as Chaplain of Gurteen College in north Tipperary, as well as the Chairperson for the Council on Social Responsibility of the Methodist Church in Ireland, who consider the social issues of our country which the church needs to grapple and speak out upon. Steven has also been active with various programmes in school settings.

In addition, the local minister is the leader of Amach le Dia in the west, a network for LGBTQ+ people of faith. Steven himself became the first openly gay minister of the Methodist Church in Ireland a decade ago and has been active in promoting safe spaces for LGBTQ+ people to exercise their beliefs. Amach le Dia holds regular meetings in the West of Ireland and Dublin offering a pastoral care network, and will be hosting a Sunday morning service on RTE TV on June 4.

In his spare time, Steven is also a referee with Snooker and Billiards Ireland and recently refereed the final of the 2023 Irish Amateur Snooker Championship. Since arriving in the area, he has become a member of Ballinasloe Snooker Club.

Steven's overall aim is to continue to develop expressions

of pastoral care, social justice and spiritual leadership in a changing world. This year, his priority is to get to know as many people as possible and to engage with wider society in its various expressions.

Commenting on this new phase of ministry, Steven states: "I'm very excited about being here. This is a new chapter for me. I've been in a fairly structured form of ministry for eighteen years, so this is different. While feeling very much called to stepping out like this, I've also been nervous too. There are many uncertainties. However, my confidence about it all is based on recognising that there is so much human need. It's as if I can't but take some little risk myself when people live with various challenges. I'm genuinely excited about whatever lies ahead on the adventure."

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


KILGLASS NS HOST EU TEACHERS' VISIT

Hospitality and Community Development Group Representatives and members of Ballinasloe MDC and Athlone MDC and Roscommon MDC attended this year's National Suck Valley conference themed around "Inspiring Rural Creativity".

The two-day event delivered an exciting line-up of guest speakers, along with live performances showcasing the talent found in the rural Irish midlands.

With the success of the inaugural Suck Valley Conference last year focusing on rural regeneration in the post pandemic, the follow-up event was organized by Chairperson of Suck Valley Way, Cllr Anthony Waldron, with support from Roscommon Leader and Roscommon County Council. The event served to highlight the potential of Roscommon and East Galway to promote the region for regeneration and rural creativity.

It proved another welcome bridging point between Senior area leaders and Councillors to build on their agreed agenda of work that started in Gullanes Hotel in Spring with inaugural joint meetings of the Councillors and Officials from South Roscommon and East Galway.

Gleeson's Townhouse, Market Square was the venue for day one with guest speakers including Cllr Waldron, Chief Executive of Roscommon County Council Shane Tiernan, President of the Association of Irish Local Government Cllr

Pat Fitzpatrick, 'Join Our Boys Trust' Founder Paula Naughton and Senator Tom Clonan. The first sessions had a particular emphasis on the performing arts focusing on recognition and funding for music therapy for those with disabilities.

The Abbey Hotel, on day two was kicked off by Galway Cathaoirleach Cllr Michael 'Moegie' Maher and Cllr Anthony Waldron, with an open discussion following regarding Youth Participation in Rural Areas. Irish playwright,

novelist and columnist Michael Harding spoke about the concept of "Belonging" to a region. Other discussions on the day included examining Rural Tourism, the diminishing role of the county council, and protecting rural landscape and community.

Among the representatives of Ballinasloe in attendance included Cathaoirleach Cllr Evelyn Parsons, Cllr Declan Geraghty and Tidy Towns Heritage Officer Padraig Lyons.

Cllr Parsons was delighted to attend the conference sharing: "Stimulating content and contributions over two days from excellent speakers. Well done to independent colleague Cllr Anthony Waldron for his diligent work in organising this National Conference and keeping a focus on rural regeneration, especially around the Suck Valley Way in Roscommon East Galway."

Padraig Lyons commented on the unique prospects of developing the Suck Valley region stating he was "Delighted to see the first citizens of Galway and Roscommon sitting side by side fully supporting these new co-operation developments."

Cllr Waldron thanked all the contributors to the conference concluding: "We work closely with our friends over in County Galway at the Ballinasloe Municipal District, and Athlone and Roscommon Municipal District in developing the tourism and the enterprise in the totality of our inter county region".

"Portiuncula Hospital truly does belong to the people of Ballinasloe and the huge catchment area it serves" the 80th anniversary celebrations of the hospital's establishment was told by a Sister who worked there for many years.

Franciscan Sisters who served there over the years were special guests at the festivities and they were joined by former and present nurses, medical personnel, staff both indoor and outdoor, as well as friends of Portiuncula over the past eight decades.

Former matron and administrator at Portiuncula, 100-yearold Sr. Bridget Veale, was among the many Sisters who had trained in Portiuncula before serving in nearly every continent around the world, who came together as special guests for the historic celebrations in Gullane's Hotel.

Following mass, celebrated by Hospital Chaplain, Fr. Bernie Costelloe, with Archdeacon John Godfrey presiding, the Hospital Manager James Keane, welcomed everyone to the 80th Anniversary Celebrations of Portiuncula University Hospital, particularly the Franciscan Missionaries of the Divine Motherhood, as well as past and present members.

He said "Today is an opportunity for us all to mark this important milestone in the hospital's history. For the last 80 years it has been an integral part of the local and wider community in delivering healthcare. Today we acknowledge the significant contribution of the Franciscan Missionaries who were truly a remarkable group of women. In 1942 the sisters had a vision to build a hospital in the community and because of their courage, drive, energy and commitment their dream became a reality with the first building opening in Mount Pleasant in 1943. Their first patient was admitted on 11th February 1943 and later that month the first

baby was born there. It is now estimated that approximately 103,000 babies have been born in Portiuncula, to date.

"Portiuncula Hospital was the only Voluntary Hospital in the West of Ireland when it opened as a 36-bed unit in 1945 and patients were transferred from Mount Pleasant. Further extensions were added in 1953 and in the same year the Madonna School of Nursing was opened. The infrastructure has stood the test of time and we are currently upgrading and replacing it with modern accommodation for our patients to meet all the current day requirements" he concluded.

In 1942, Mother Margaret Keenan and Sr. Bernard Rudden, members of the FMDM's in Guildford, Surrey, arrived in Ballinasloe to start a foundation. They received the hospitality of the Sisters of Mercy in the town and, opened their first Nursing Home in Mount Pleasant, in two houses. They were later joined by five other Franciscan Sisters; with the help of the then Bishop of Clonfert, Dr. Dignan, "they bargained the price of eight acres of land at Brackernagh for £950 and Portiuncula was on its way!!!"

Sr. Chad McCollum, a former member of the staff in Portiuncula, said "It is a fact that the hospital would never have happened if the people of Ballinasloe and the surrounding areas had not supported it as wholeheartedly as they did. Again and again over the years, the Sisters, Staff and people of Ballinasloe and its catchment area came together to work and raise funds for the hospital, their generosity, huge effort and sheer hard work in this regard can never be forgotten. The

hospital truly does belong to the people of Ballinasloe and the huge catchment area it serves.

"I want to pay tribute to the extraordinary group of women who came to Ballinasloe 80 years ago. They were remarkable. They were courageous, strong-minded, feisty, energetic women. Their hearts were bigger than themselves and they brought with them the family spirit of our Congregation, which permeated the hospital and is still there today."

Concluding, she said "The Sisters and ALL the staff right through the hospital and those associated with the hospital, laid the foundation for what we have today. To each of you who work in Portiuncula today, we extend our gratitude for the extraordinary service you give. We know that Portiuncula is in safe hands as she begins a whole new era."

The anniversary celebrations provided a rare opportunity for former nursing sisters and staff members to meet up again, for a nostalgic reunion as Ballinasloe says thanks to all concerned for the service they have given over the last eighty years.

Ballinasloe and its surrounding towns have benefited to the tune of €54,562 from the Galway County Council Community and Support Schemes 2023, out of a total of €273,750 being allocated to voluntary activity across the county.

The Community and Support Schemes 2023 is the fund available to non-profit organisations in Galway to benefit local activity and events. There were three schemes available - economic development, community development and for cultural development, with applicants having a maximum choice of one support scheme.

Grants to individual organisation generally did not exceed €3000, with the exception of some projects.

The €54,562 amount was allocated for voluntary groups categorised under Ballinasloe, which includes 21 surrounding towns, such as neighbouring villages of Kilconnell, Aughrim and Laurencetown, along with northern Galway villages of Glenamaddy, Williamstown and Newbridge. A welcome total of €7,400 was distributed to voluntary groups within Ballinasloe town for cultural events, festivals and community efforts.

Within the Economic Development Support Scheme, there was €14,700 distributed to Ballinasloe from the county total of €69,250. Among the successful applicants in this category was the Ballinasloe Fair and Festival who received €2,000 for the supply and installation of a curtain side trailer as a soundstage and for branding, Féile Cheoil Larry Reynolds who were allocated €1,400 for the marketing, programming and developing costs of this year's festival; Ballinasloe Area Community Development who received €1,500 for the associated costs of the Tourism sample weekend, and the past Patrick's Day Parade who got €600 for the expenses of this year's parade.

The Community Development Support Scheme saw €26,312 for the Ballinasloe region out of a county total of €103,800. Funding for upgrades of community recreational areas were distributed including €3,000 for an upgrade of equipment at Colins Park Playground in Glenamaddy and €2,500 for Wheelchair Parking Spaces at the Cappataggle Community Association for Recreation and Sport. Additionally, the Tidy Towns groups in Creggs, Ballygar,

Killconnel, Ballinasloe, W i I I i a m s t o w n , Newbridge, Aughrim and Glenamaddy were all supported through the scheme for materials, planting and installation of community facilities.

The Cultural Development Scheme was split into three categories focusing



on Arts, Heritage and Irish Language, with the region benefitting from €13,550 of the €100,700 county total. As part of the Arts Grants, the Ballinasloe Musical Society received €400 for their staging of the 'Sound of Music'. Among the Heritage projects were €500 for the Battle of Aughrim 1691 site for speaker fees and €1,000 for the Mountbellew Vintage Club for their restoration of a steam engine. No funding was distributed to the Ballinasloe region for Irish Language projects.

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Artist Sean Kelly

Local painter/creative Sean Kelly recently collaborated with German artist Wiltrud Dull for a joint-exhibition held in the Library, displaying a unique selection of their talents and offering an insight into their creators motives.

Sean Kelly from Portnick, had a strong interest in painting early in his years but found it difficult to maintain a living in the craft. He was awarded a scholarship in the National College of Art in 1964 but curtailed his studies after two years due to economic issues.

Instead, he trained as an architect, working as a first assistant planner for Roscommon County Council for several years before running his own practice from 1969 to 1990.

Among his more notable achievements are drawing up the template for the foundation stone of N.I.H.E Limerick, now the University of Limerick, and the stained-glass windows in Creagh Church, Ballinasloe in collaboration with the Late Patrick Pye.

Sean also worked for a period of time as a computer aided

designer in the 90's, being invited to help establish foundation modules and lecture for education centres at Athlone IT and Roscommon VEC.

In 2007, he joined the Property Registration Authority and later was elected to their committee for the selection and purchase of artwork of their new Government Offices in Roscommon. It was this project that acted as the catalyst to lead him to return to the study of Art and Design at the Galway-Mayo Institute of technology and graduate with a Bachelor's degree in 2018.

In the past decade, Sean held an exhibition in Kilrush and had his work showcased twice before in Ballinasloe. Following his GMIT graduation showcase, he had one of his paintings from his DeProfundis collection bought by the State for inclusion in the national collection.

Sean's previous latest joint exhibition was hosted in Ballinmore at the Solas Gallery in 2022 collaborating with Sligo artist Pat Gillen.

About six years ago, Sean met Wiltrud Dull through a mutual friend in the village of Cross in Loophead, County Clare. Wiltrud is a German artist, now based in Woodford, who in her retirement has picked up painting and has showcased her work in many solo exhibits across the country.

The duo remained in contact through their shared fondness and ideals in the craft and in the last year Wiltrud approached Sean proposing a joint-exhibition of their work.

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A total of 52 paintings were on display in the church gallery of the Library. Their work shared a lot of similarities, with a strong emphasis on technique and use of acrylics and watercolours, although Sean Kelly is "happy to work in any medium that communicates to the public" he states.

The local artist is a staunch believer in having free exhibitions, welcoming an audience to his shows at no cost. 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The Battle of Aughrim 1691 Visitor Centre has reopened, chronicling the events of one the bloodiest conflicts of Irish history. In addition, walking tours will be available along the Aughrim trail this Summer and along with some events organized by the local history group Cath Eachroma 1691.

The Battle of Aughrim was fought between the Irish Jacobite army of James II against the Williamite Forces of William III in July 1691. The savage encounter was decisive in ending the rebellion of James II in Ireland and resulted in over 7000 people being killed on the surrounding fields.

Ronan Killeen has been appointed acting as curator for the summer since the reopening. The attraction revisits the battle through an audio-visual experience, offering interactive displays and information boards for an educational and recreational tour. Visitors get the chance to wear the uniforms and wield the weaponry of the 1691 soldiers, relieve their stories and take some pictures with the available photo stands.

The opening times for this Summer are from Tuesday to Saturday 10:30 to 16:30, and Sundays from 14:00 to 17:00. The cost is €5 for an adult, €2 for under 12s and €4 for a senior or student. For more details and bookings, you can contact Ronan at (090) 967 3939.



The prodigy athlete then led her team at Ardscoil Mhuire to glory with an All-Ireland Girls Seven's title and at the young age of 16 was the youngest player, male or female, to make her international debut for the Irish Rugby Football Union. Beibhinn played wing for Connacht with Blackrock College RFC, and followed with her current involvement in the Irish Women Seven's team.

Prior to the latest World series, she and her teammates trained extensively at the IRFU high performance centre. She is apparently "living on cloud nine" following their victory, with this triumph bringing her one step closer to living her childhood dream of being an Olympian.

Naturally the team's primary goal is to come home with the gold medal, therefore they have returned to training as they always have at the IRFU centre. The team will continue practicing throughout the year along with participating in some friendlies, with the Australian Women's team set to arrive for some play-offs by the end of the Summer.

For the moment, Beibhinn hopes to keep things simple, with nothing much changing in her day-to-day life. Although the prospect of being an Olympian is a personal dream of hers, the humble athlete will only accept the prestigious title after the big competition next year.

Along with her Rugby career, Beibhinn tries to keep up her studies at Dublin City University. Currently she is engaged in her first year in Communications, finding radio and podcasting to be very interesting. The undergraduate studied Biomedical Science for two years but felt it was too demanding to maintain both her intensive studies in medicine and her professional career in Rugby. "This year has been very difficult"said Beibhinn, "but the University has been very helpful and understanding for my unique circumstances".

One of her primary reasons for staying motivated and persuing the sport is the idea of her acting as an idol for young girls in the locality and beyond. "Just the thought of being a role model for them brings me joy" Parsons shared. Beibhinn was only recently appointed as the Ambassador for Coral Leisure, being an ideal representative for the sports company brand spanning nine locations nationwide.

Next up for the Seven's team is their three-week Euros tournament, along with their Hamburg Championship Series taking place this June. For the moment, it is back to routine for Beibhinn, training as she always has and representing Women's Rugby at home and abroad.



The newly founded Ballinasloe Cricket Club have been gathering regularly and training for upcoming competitions on the town's Fair Green, the same location where Ireland's first Cricket Team gathered to practice nearly 200 years ago in 1825.

Postings of this event on the Life Social Media pages brought about remarks from local historian Steve Dolan who has researched and written extensively on Cricket in Galway and provoked Jane Leslie whose grandfather, Frank Kempster, who was from Ballinasloe, played on the Green as a young man in the 1870s and played for Ireland twice. His brother, Jack, also played and was one of the team's best bowlers underarm!!

She like Steve and a great many others we thrilled to see cricket flourishing in town again.

The current Cricket Club has only been established in the past year, with members of the local Indian community to the fore-out of a love of the sport. The club trains every Tuesday afternoon in the Fair Green and sees about 40 players involved, although many members work in healthcare and cannot always make the time commitments.

The squad have been especially active lately, competing in the Connacht League against many worthy adversaries in Athlone and Galway. The Cricketers recently competed against Athlone in a hard ball competition but lost the game, just short of 17 runs.

Ballinasloe was Ireland's first ever Cricket club, being founded in 1825 under the patronage of Lord Dunlo, made up of the gentry and professional classes. Their team trekked all the way to the city capital to Phoneix Park and defeated Dublin in 1828. The sport was played regularly on the Fair Green throughout the century, but gradually declined in the 1900s, among other Cricket clubs, following the infamous ban of 'foreign' games by the Gaelic Athletic Association.

The Cricket Club hope to fundraise for a better facility as the current grounds are not ideal for playing the sport with a hard ball. The Committee are considering options and locations for a suitable pitch. Such a ground will enable the Cricket players to play at a professional level, growing and strengthening the club in the Connacht league.

For the moment, the players continue to practice extensively for a variety of competitions this Summer season. The club are always looking for more sportsmen to join them to build the team, and anyone interested in joining can contact coach Shijo George at (089) 423 5926.

The Committee and trustees gathered first with Keagan and Interim GAA Handball Manager Tom Moloney facilitating the prospect of having a community gathering to gauge interest in reinstating the club.

A second public meeting followed soon afterwards held in Gullanes Hotel, with strong interest in the revival project being demonstrated. Among the priorities for the revitalised club was making the sport accessible to younger generations who will carry on the future of Handball in the region.

An Interim Committee was appointed at the meeting, with Bernard Donnellan as Chairperson, Gary Kilcar as Treasurer, Collum Ward as PRO, Krystle Donnellan as Secretary and William Martin as Youth Officer.

The East Galway Hunt Pony Club have a busy few weeks ahead in anticipation for their upcoming Irish Pony Minimus Championships, with the young pony handlers training hard in a variety of categories for these national competitions.

The two-day Minimus Championships are held annually for U12 competitors, this year taking place in Kilkenny. The event consists of a variety of disciplines in three stages, the first being a two minute swim, the second a running cross-county covering a kilometre distance, and the third a cross-county pony ride.

The Championships can present a number of challenges to overcome for the riders. One of the primary challenges of participating in the riding event is having to dismount from the pony to manoeuvre the slip rail barrier and remount unaided.

The competition works based upon a points system, meaning there are no eliminations for mistakes, but rather your total score is deducted. The overall winner is the competitor with the most points after participating in all three disciplines.

In preparation for the Minimus, the East Galway Hunt Pony Club held an Intro Fun Competition last April. The swimming phase was first held at the Coral Leisure Ballinasloe centre, followed by a cross-country run along the Fair Green, and culminating in the arena-event riding phase on the Ballinasloe Showgrounds. The event offered experiences for all levels, including the novice minis, the under 10s, the under 12s and the over 12 participants.

Not only was it a great occasion to practise, but the young pony riders also had a great deal of fun and bonded with one another on the day. The event was organised by the local club and attracted competitors from all regions around the country, including the nearby Irish Pony Club districts. The official Irish Pony Minimus Championships are soon to follow, due to take place between June 17 and 18.



discovery by deep-sea explorers of the wreck of a World War II Japanese transport ship, the Montevideo Maru, which was torpedoed off the Philippines in 1942, killing nearly 1,000 Australian and other prisoners of war aboard, means the final resting place of a Ballinasloe native is now known.

Edward Caulfield Kelly was an agricultural inspector on New Ireland island, Papua New Guinea, where he was taken prisoner by the Japanese after they invaded in January 1942.

In June the Japanese rounded up the prisoners to board the Montevideo Maru, which was to take them to the Chinese island of Hainan. On 30 June, she was sighted by the US submarine Sturgeon, near the northern Philippine coast. Unaware that it was carrying prisoners and civilians, the Sturgeon fired four torpedoes, causing the vessel to sink in under

MV Montevideo Maru, around 1941.

11 minutes. In total, 1,054 people died on the vessel, including Kelly.

Kelly was born on 29 December 1895 on Dunlo Street, the eldest of three sons of Edward J. Kelly and Margaret Kelly née Caulfield, who

ran the Imperial Hotel (where the Deli Store and Hair Gallery are now).

He was educated at the Pines, Creagh (then the location of Garbally College), and Belvedere College, Dublin,

After the outbreak of the First World War, he received his first commission in the Royal Dublin Fusiliers. He later went to the front in France with the 7th Royal Irish Rifles. In July 1916, he was wounded and hospitalised, suffering from shellshock as well as other injuries.

In November 1916, he applied for a transfer to the Royal Flying Corps. By the following April, he was with No. 45 Squadron, flying over the Western Front, in a variety of aircraft, including the Sopwith 11/2 Strutter and Nieuport.

KELLY (Kavieng, New Ireland)-Lieut.-Colonel (Reserve) Edward C., eldest son Edward J. and late Margaret the Kelly, Ballinasloe, and brother of Father Antonine, O.F.M., Dublin, and Christopher Kelly, Land Commission, Ballina, lost at sea in June, 1942, when the prison ship Montevideo Maru en route from Rabaul to Japan was sunk by Allied action. 
In April 1917, he survived his first crash. Undeterred, he continued and on 9 May, he scored his first aerial victory, destroying a German Albatros D.III. During May 1917, he was to achieve five aerial victories. Kelly's last victory came on 28 May, when he shot down an Albatros D.V. But Kelly had a

In 1918, Kelly transferred to Egypt for pilot instruction. He joined No. 144 Squadron, assigned to the RAF's Palestine Brigade, flying DH.9 bombers. However, he was wounded again and in September 1918, returned to Base Depot, Middle East. In 1920, Kelly resigned his commission on the grounds of ill-health.

rough landing and was again hospitalised.

Kelly then applied for a position in the British Colonial Office and in March 1920, he embarked for the Federated Malay States (now Papua New Guinea), where he took up his new role as agricultural inspector, overseeing the shipping of copra (the dried, white flesh of the coconut from which coconut oil is extracted). He remained there until 1942, when he was taken prisoner.

It was the summer of 1985. The weather was bad and Ireland was in the depths of an economic recession. Reports began to circulate that statues had been observed to move at various Marian grottos around the country. Could it be that these phenomena were miraculous manifestations, or were they merely optical illusions? The jury is still out. Whatever the explanation, the people of Ballinasloe remained decidedly unimpressed because they had what could trump any collection of mobile plaster saints you'd care to name: a moving monument!

In the 1830s the Earl of Clancarty brought down a group of Ulster Presbyterians to work on his estate. Their numbers grew, and in 1845 they built their own church in Society Street, despite the opposition of the Earl who was strongly averse to the establishment of nonconformist places of worship. By the end of the century Ballinasloe could boast the largest Presbyterian congregation in the West of Ireland. They had been joined in 1872 by a coreligionist born in Cookstown, Co. Tyrone, some 26 years previously. His name was William Rutherford who had just qualified with medical degrees from the Queen's Colleges of Belfast and Galway. He was destined to spend the next four decades in general practice locally, during which time he earned the reputation of a highly respected member of his profession and became immensely popular with all classes and creeds.

Following his death in 1911, the townspeople, having decided to commemorate his memory with a public monument in limestone, commissioned a sculptor, William Kennedy, to execute the work. Unveiled two years later, it was initially located at the junction of Dunlo Street, Main Street and Society Street where it seems to have formed the base of a gas lamp. Its front included a watering trough for animals, and at the rear was a drinking fountain. An inscription above the trough read as follows: "Erected by the people of Ballinasloe and neighbourhood in memory of William Rutherford M.D.



F.R.P.C.E. He laboured unselfishly in their midst for 40 years. A sincerest friend, an eminent physician, public spirited and upright citizen. OBIIT July 22, 1911."

"The art work," according to Dr. Christy Cunniffe, "consists of a rich mix of Celtic Revival work that includes the use of interlace, strap-work, crocketing and a number of other medieval decorative devices. The inspiration for this is based very much on late Romanesque art. Rope mouldings and simple chevron devices adorn the outer frame while a carved



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head very much in keeping with what was used in the early thirteenth century forms a centre-piece."

After a number of years it came to be regarded as a traffic hazard at its original location and was re-sited at the southern end of Dunlo Street, remaining there for at least half a century until another move was on the cards, this time to the Town Hall car

park. Its sojourn there was comparatively short before its relocation to the present site at the top of the Harris (Burma) Road. Has the Rutherford memorial finally come to rest, its wandering days consigned to the pages of history? It would be foolish indeed to answer yes to that question, for once a monument gets itchy feet there's no telling where it might end up!



Ballinasloe History Walk

- 1 Start at the statue known as *The Man with the Horse*, where Main Street joins St. Michael's Square. From the crossing near the statue, continue by turning right onto Main Street. The prosperity of Ballinasloe in Georgian times can be seen in the scale and classical style of the buildings here. A fine group of four frontages stand across from the statue of The Man with the Horse. With shops and pubs on the ground floor for the most part, these Main Street premises have several floors above.
- 2 Walking along Main Street, lift your eyes above the shop frontages for one of the town's characteristic sights. There are the Diocletian windows that grace several facades. They are from the years after 1805 when the 2nd Earl was in charge. A window of this sort is formed under a semi-circular arch with two upright divisions so that the whole opening is divided into three parts.
- 3 As you stand at the meeting point of Bridge Street and Main Street, you will see the Victorian frontage of a commercial premises, originally the Masonic Hall. Next to it stands a classical looking, beautifully-crafted, early 19th century stone house, currently a guest house. Beside these is a tall, fine stone-fronted classical mansion, which is now the Bank of Ireland. It was originally the town mansion of the Lord of all of Ballinasloe, the Earl of Clancarty. A friend of king George IV, the Earl was one of the architects of the resistance to the emperor Napoleon. It could be said that he was the person to whom most credit is due for the layout, growth and architectural character of Ballinasloe as we see it today.
- 4 At the end of Main Street, head along Bridge Street, then turn to the right to the pathway which runs to the riverscape where you can see channels flowing through the several arches of the long stone bridge over the river Suck, one of the town's most precious monuments. The Bridge has been in continuous use since the 16th century and its extension in 1754 prepared it structurally to carry even the heaviest juggernauts of today.
- 5 Walk through to the far end of the park; you will approach St Michael's Church (1852-58) that stands in a commanding position over the Square. Its architect was J.J. McCarthy, a follower of Augustus Pugin (famed for other Neo-Gothic churches in Ireland) and the design is said to have been revised by Pugin himself. Inside are many fine stained glass window. Of particular quality are those of St. Patrick and St. Rose of Lima, of 1925, by the renowned Dublin Stained glass artist, Harry Clarke and The Raising of the daughter of Jairus by Patrick Pollen, inserted in 1958.
- **6** From St. Michael's Church now walk up St. Michael's Square back towards the Man with the Horse Statue. Take a left into Dunlo Street, an important street in the history of the town, which contains, together with other buildings of about the same date, the late-Georgian Garda Station. The Station is towards the far end of the street, on the right hand side. Also on this street, over Dolan's Electrical Shop, you can see another fine example of Diocletian windows.
- 7 Halfway up Dunlo Street, turn right up Duggan Street, which will take you to St. John's Church (Church of Ireland, 1843). It dominates the vast Fair Green which becomes a hive of activity during one week every year when up to 100,000 people throng to the October fair. Look out over the Fair Green and admire one of the grandest freestanding classical monuments in the region. Dedicated to Charles Le Poer Trench, it was designed in the Neo-Greek style by the English architect George Papworth (1781-1855). A mile past this monument on the Main Galway road, South West of the town, the Earl of Clancarty's former country house is situated, where imposing gates mark the entrance to Garbally Court. It has been a school since 1923.

Walk down Church Hill onto Society Street and turn left, arriving at the Courthouse on the right. Society Street, like Main Street, was the 19th century location for the professional classes. As well as The Courthouse, it contains the former Bridewell (or gaol) from the 1840s. Further along this street, Ballinasloe Railway Station is a must. Constructed in 1851, it is a Neo-Gothic limestone tour-de-force and a fine example of the quality of rural Irish railway architecture in the mid-19th century.









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
